- fortification** Defensive structure consisting of walls or mounds built around a stronghold to strengthen it.
*The building and maintenance of **fortifications**.*

- fortress** A military stronghold, especially a strongly fortified town.
*He had proved himself to be a **fortress** of moral rectitude.*
- keep** Charge; control.
*Each child was expected to pay for their **keep**.*
- stronghold** A strongly fortified defensive structure.
*Their mountain **strongholds** fell to enemy attack.*
- tower** A fortress or stronghold in the form of or including a tower.
*A titanic **tower** of garbage.*

corral	Put or keep livestock in a corral. <i>Corralling votes for an election.</i>
<u>defensive</u>	An attitude of defensiveness especially in the phrase on the defensive. A defensive stance.
<u>empire</u>	Absolute control over a person or group. <i>Each ministry each department had its own empire its own agenda and worked to protect its turf.</i>
<u>fence</u>	Enclose with a fence. <i>Our garden was not fully fenced.</i>
<u>fort</u>	A fortified defensive structure. <i>The city was guarded by a ring of forts.</i>
<u>fortress</u>	A fortified defensive structure. <i>He had proved himself to be a fortress of moral rectitude.</i>
<u>frontier</u>	A line or border separating two countries. <i>The individualism of the frontier in Andrew Jackson s day.</i>
<u>garrison</u>	The building occupied by a garrison. <i>Air reconnaissance showed the Germans had not garrisoned the island.</i>
<u>guardian</u>	A person who is legally responsible for the care of someone who is unable to manage their own affairs, especially a child whose parents have died. <i>I am acting as guardian of my late brother s family.</i>
<u>legionary</u>	Of an ancient Roman legion. <i>The legionary fortress of Isca.</i>
<u>medieval</u>	Resembling or likened to the Middle Ages, especially in being cruel, uncivilized, or primitive. <i>Without other people around I would let my flat degenerate into medieval levels of squalor.</i>
<u>military</u>	The military forces of a nation. <i>As a young man he joined the military and pursued a career in the Army.</i>
<u>outpost</u>	A remote part of a country or empire. <i>Troops in some outposts have surrendered.</i>
<u>palace</u>	Official residence of an exalted person (as a sovereign). <i>The royal palace.</i>
<u>protector</u>	The title of the head of state in England during the later period of the Commonwealth between 1653 and 1659, first Oliver Cromwell (1653-8), then his son Richard (1658-9). <i>A man who became her protector adviser and friend.</i>
<u>rampart</u>	Fortify or surround with or as if with a rampart. <i>The open Pacific broke on the far off ramparts of the reef.</i>

recapture	Take back by force, as after a battle. <i>The author recaptures an old idea here.</i>
siege	The action of an armed force that surrounds a fortified place and isolates it while continuing to attack. <i>Two cult members have died so far in the four day siege.</i>
soldier	Serve as a soldier in the military. <i>I soldiered with your father on his last four campaigns.</i>
sortie	(military) an operational flight by a single aircraft (as in a military operation). <i>This latest book is the author's first sortie into non fiction.</i>
stockade	An enclosure bound by a stockade. <i>They built stockades around their towns.</i>
stronghold	A place where a particular cause or belief is strongly defended or upheld. <i>A Labour stronghold.</i>
warfare	An active struggle between competing entities. <i>Guerrilla warfare.</i>
warrior	Any of a number of standing poses in yoga in which the legs are held apart and the arms are stretched outwards. <i>The warrior heroes of ancient Greece.</i>
