### **Definitions of "Civic" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “civic” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Relating to the duties or activities of people in relation to their town, city, or local area.*
- *Of or relating to or befitting citizens as individuals.*
- *Of or relating or belonging to a city.*
- *Relating to a city or town, especially its administration; municipal.*



## Synonyms of "Civic" as an adjective (6 Words)

<b>civil</b>	Relating to civil law. <i>They were comparatively <b>civil</b> to their daughter.</i>
<b>federal</b>	Being of or having to do with the northern United States and those loyal to the Union during the American Civil War. <i>A <b>federal</b> Europe.</i>
<b>metropolitan</b>	Relating to or denoting a metropolitan or his see. <i>A <b>metropolitan</b> bishop.</i>
<b>municipal</b>	Relating or belonging to or characteristic of a municipality. <i>National and <b>municipal</b> elections.</i>
<b>national</b>	Of or relating to nationality. <i>The <b>national</b> highway system.</i>
<b>urban</b>	Relating to or concerned with a city or densely populated area. <i>The <b>urban</b> population.</i>

## Associations of "Civic" (30 Words)

<b>alderman</b>	A co-opted member of an English county or borough council, next in status to the Mayor.
<b>birmingham</b>	The largest city in Alabama; located in northeastern Alabama.
<b>capital</b>	The upper part of a column that supports the entablature. <i>Our <b>capital</b> concern was to avoid defeat.</i>
<b>center</b>	Ice hockey the person who plays center on a hockey team. <i>Her entire attention <b>centered</b> on her children.</i>
<b>central</b>	At the point or in the area that is in the middle of something. <i>You re in workaholic <b>central</b> here.</i>
<b>city</b>	A town created a city by charter and usually containing a cathedral. <i>The <b>city</b> council.</i>
<b>cityscape</b>	Painting depicting a city or urban area. <i>The dominant character of the <b>cityscape</b> is it poverty.</i>
<b>civilized</b>	Having a high state of culture and development both social and technological. <i>A <b>civilized</b> society.</i>

<b>community</b>	A group of people living together and practising common ownership. <i>Montreal s Italian <b>community</b>.</i>
<b>county</b>	Relating to or characteristic of aristocratic people with an ancestral home in a particular county. <i>A <b>county</b> grande dame.</i>
<b>depopulate</b>	Reduce in population. <i>The epidemic <b>depopulated</b> the countryside.</i>
<b>downtown</b>	In or into a downtown area. <i>The heart of Birmingham s <b>downtown</b>.</i>
<b><u>ghetto</u></b>	Formerly the restricted quarter of many European cities in which Jews were required to live. <i>The Warsaw <b>ghetto</b>.</i>
<b><u>hub</u></b>	A center of activity or interest or commerce or transportation; a focal point around which events revolve. <i>The playground is the <b>hub</b> of parental supervision.</i>
<b><u>local</u></b>	A local branch of an organization especially a trade union. <i>Migration can regulate the <b>local</b> density of animals.</i>
<b><u>main</u></b>	Capable of standing syntactically alone as a complete sentence. <i>The <b>main</b> doors were of solid glass.</i>
<b>major</b>	Of an interval equivalent to that between the tonic and another note of a major scale and greater by a semitone than the corresponding minor interval. <i>C to E is a <b>major</b> third.</i>
<b>manchester</b>	A city in northwestern England (30 miles to the east of Liverpool); heart of the most densely populated area of England.
<b>mayor</b>	(in England, Wales, and Northern Ireland) the head of a town, borough, or county council, elected by council members and generally having purely ceremonial duties.
<b>metropolis</b>	People living in a large densely populated municipality. <i>By the late eighteenth century Edo had grown to a <b>metropolis</b> with a population of nearly one million.</i>
<b>metropolitan</b>	Relating to or denoting a metropolitan or his see. <i><b>Metropolitan</b> Spain.</i>
<b>municipal</b>	Of or relating to the government of a municipality. <i>International law only authorizes a belligerent to punish a spy under its <b>municipal</b> law.</i>
<b>oxford</b>	A university in England.

<b>populous</b>	Densely populated. <i>The <b>populous</b> city of Shanghai.</i>
<b>prefecture</b>	A prefect's office or tenure. <i>Enraged fans besieged the <b>Prefecture</b> of Police.</i>
<b>provincial</b>	Local newspapers, as contrasted with national ones. <i><b>Provincial</b> elections.</i>
<b>slum</b>	A house or building unfit for human habitation. <i>Attending a motion picture show by the upper class was considered <b>sluming</b> in the early 20th century.</i>
<b>sophisticate</b>	Sophisticated. <i>Books of casuistry which <b>sophisticate</b> the understanding and defile the heart.</i>
<b>suburban</b>	Relating to or characteristic of or situated in suburbs. <i><b>Suburban</b> life.</i>
<b>urban</b>	Denoting or relating to popular dance music associated with black performers. <i><b>Urban</b> clothing and street wear.</i>
