According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "civil" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- Not rude; marked by satisfactory (or especially minimal) adherence to social usages and sufficient but not noteworthy consideration for others- W.S. Maugham.
- Relating to civil law.
- Of or in a condition of social order.
- Of or occurring within the state or between or among citizens of the state.
- Courteous and polite.
- Applying to ordinary citizens as contrasted with the military.
- Relating to ordinary citizens and their concerns, as distinct from military or ecclesiastical matters.
- (of conflict) occurring between citizens of the same country.
- *Relating to private relations between members of a community; non-criminal.*
- Legally recognized in ordinary affairs of life.
- (of time) fixed by custom or law rather than being natural or astronomical.
- Not rude; marked by satisfactory (or especially minimal) adherence to social usages and sufficient but not noteworthy consideration for others.

interior	Situated further in or within. The <b>interior</b> lighting is not adequate.
<u>internal</u>	Located inward- Leonard Bernstein- David Denby. <i>Internal</i> bleeding.
ladylike	Appropriate for or typical of a well-bred, decorous woman or girl. <i>Her antics were considered very undignified by her ladylike peers.</i>
lay	Characteristic of those who are not members of the clergy. <i>The lay ministry.</i>
<u>polite</u>	Marked by refinement in taste and manners. They thought she was wrong but were too <b>polite</b> to say so.
respectful	Feeling or manifesting veneration. They sit in <b>respectful</b> silence.
<u>secular</u>	Of or relating to clergy not bound by monastic vows. <i>Secular</i> attitudes to death.
well bred	In good health especially after having suffered illness or injury.
well mannered	In good health especially after having suffered illness or injury.



<u>bourgeois</u>	A bourgeois person. A rich bored <b>bourgeois</b> family.
burgess	A member of the assembly of colonial Maryland or Virginia.
burgher	A descendant of a Dutch or Portuguese colonist in Sri Lanka. The poem is not the sort of thing the sturdy <b>burgher</b> s of Manchester would wish to read.
<u>citizen</u>	A legally recognized subject or national of a state or commonwealth, either native or naturalized. A British <b>citizen</b> .
citizenship	Conduct as a citizen. Award for good <b>citizenship</b> .
<u>civilian</u>	Relating to civilians. <i>Civilian</i> clothes.
<u>commoner</u>	(at some British universities) an undergraduate who does not have a scholarship. A <b>commoner</b> s gown.
commons	A piece of open land for recreational use in an urban area. The mismanagement of a <b>commons</b> .
<u>constituent</u>	A member of a constituency; a citizen who is represented in a government by officials for whom he or she votes. A component or <b>constituent</b> element of a system.
disfranchise	Deprive of voting rights.
disloyalty	The quality of being disloyal. An accusation of <b>disloyalty</b> and betrayal.
disunion	The breaking up of something such as a federation. His rejection of <b>disunion</b> was consistent with his nationalism.
ensign	A flag or standard, especially a military or naval one indicating nationality. <i>All the <b>ensign</b>s of our greatness.</i>
<u>ethnicity</u>	The quality or fact of belonging to a population group or subgroup made up of people who share a common cultural background or descent. <b>Ethnicity</b> has a strong influence on community status relations.



<u>firebrand</u>	Someone who deliberately foments trouble. A political <b>firebrand</b> .
instigator	A person who initiates a course of action. Any <b>instigator</b> s of violence will be punished.
insubordination	An insubordinate act. <i>He was dismissed for <b>insubordination</b>.</i>
insurrection	Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another. The <b>insurrection</b> was savagely put down.
<u>magistrate</u>	A civil officer who administers the law, especially one who conducts a court that deals with minor offences and holds preliminary hearings for more serious ones.
mutiny	Engage in a mutiny against an authority. <i>The crew were on the verge of <b>mutiny</b>.</i>
nationality	People having common origins or traditions and often comprising a nation. Men of Spanish <b>nationality</b> .
<u>penalty</u>	The act of punishing. Neglected his health and paid the <b>penalty</b> .
<u>plebeian</u>	Lacking in refinement. His square <b>plebeian</b> nose.
<u>rebellion</u>	An act of armed resistance to an established government or leader. The Bretons rose in <b>rebellion</b> against the King.
<u>revolt</u>	Cause to feel disgust. A country wide <b>revolt</b> against the government.
rising	Advancing to maturity or high standing. <i>The <b>rising</b> generation.</i>
secession	Formal separation from an alliance or federation. <i>The republics want <b>secession</b> from the union.</i>
uphill	An upward slope. An <b>uphill</b> struggle to gain worldwide recognition.
<u>uprising</u>	Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another. An armed <b>uprising</b> .
