## Associations of "Civilly" (30 Words)

<b>ascent</b>	The act of changing location in an upward direction. <i>The first balloon <b>ascent</b> was in 1783.</i>
<a href="#">bourgeois</a>	A bourgeois person. <i>A self confessed and proud <b>bourgeois</b>.</i>
<b>burgess</b>	A member of the assembly of colonial Maryland or Virginia.
<b>burgher</b>	A member of the middle class. <i>The poem is not the sort of thing the sturdy <b>burghers</b> of Manchester would wish to read.</i>
<a href="#">citizen</a>	A legally recognized subject or national of a state or commonwealth, either native or naturalized. <i>The good <b>citizens</b> of Edinburgh.</i>
<b>citizenship</b>	Conduct as a citizen. <i>The refugees could be granted dual <b>citizenship</b>.</i>
<a href="#">civilian</a>	Relating to civilians. <i><b>Civilian</b> clothes.</i>
<a href="#">commoner</a>	One of the ordinary or common people, as opposed to the aristocracy or to royalty. <i>Cattle and ponies owned by the <b>commoners</b>.</i>
<b>commons</b>	A pasture subject to common use. <i>The state was divided into clergy nobility and <b>commons</b>.</i>
<a href="#">constituent</a>	Being a voting member of an organization and having the power to appoint or elect. <i>A <b>constituent</b> assembly.</i>
<b>disfranchise</b>	Deprive of voting rights.
<b>disloyalty</b>	The quality of being disloyal. <i>An accusation of <b>disloyalty</b> and betrayal.</i>

<b>disunion</b>	The termination or destruction of union. <i>His rejection of <b>disunion</b> was consistent with his nationalism.</i>
<b>ensign</b>	An emblem flown as a symbol of nationality. <i>All the <b>ensigns</b> of our greatness.</i>
<b>ethnicity</b>	An ethnic quality or affiliation resulting from racial or cultural ties. <i>The interrelationship between gender <b>ethnicity</b> and class.</i>
<b>firebrand</b>	Someone who deliberately foments trouble. <i>A political <b>firebrand</b>.</i>
<b>instigator</b>	A person who brings about or initiates something. <i>She was the <b>instigator</b> of their quarrel.</i>
<b>insubordination</b>	Defiance of authority; refusal to obey orders. <i>He was dismissed for <b>insubordination</b>.</i>
<b>insurrection</b>	Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another. <i>The <b>insurrection</b> was savagely put down.</i>
<b>magistrate</b>	A lay judge or civil authority who administers the law (especially one who conducts a court dealing with minor offenses).
<b>mutiny</b>	Engage in a mutiny against an authority. <i>A <b>mutiny</b> by those manning the weapons could trigger a global war.</i>
<b>nationality</b>	Distinctive national or ethnic character. <i>The change of a name does not discard <b>nationality</b>.</i>
<b>penalty</b>	A disadvantage suffered as the result of an action or situation. <i>The charge carries a maximum <b>penalty</b> of ten years imprisonment.</i>
<b>plebeian</b>	Of or associated with the great masses of people. <i>Two dancers one royal and one <b>plebeian</b>.</i>
<b>rebellion</b>	The action or process of resisting authority, control, or convention. <i>The Bretons rose in <b>rebellion</b> against the King.</i>
<b>revolt</b>	Cause aversion in; offend the moral sense of. <i>The people <b>revolted</b> when bread prices tripled again.</i>
<b>rising</b>	Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another. <i><b>Rising</b> ground.</i>
<b>secession</b>	The withdrawal of eleven southern states from the US Union in 1860, leading to the Civil War. <i>The republics want <b>secession</b> from the union.</i>
<b>uphill</b>	Requiring great effort; difficult. <i>Follow the track <b>uphill</b>.</i>

**uprising**

Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another.
