Associations of "Civilly" (30 Words)

ascent	The act of changing location in an upward direction. <i>The first balloon ascent was in 1783.</i>
bourgeois	A bourgeois person. <i>A self confessed and proud bourgeois.</i>
burgess	A member of the assembly of colonial Maryland or Virginia.
burgher	A member of the middle class. <i>The poem is not the sort of thing the sturdy burghers of Manchester would wish to read.</i>
citizen	A legally recognized subject or national of a state or commonwealth, either native or naturalized. <i>The good citizens of Edinburgh.</i>
citizenship	Conduct as a citizen. <i>The refugees could be granted dual citizenship.</i>
civilian	Relating to civilians. <i>Civilian clothes.</i>
commoner	One of the ordinary or common people, as opposed to the aristocracy or to royalty. <i>Cattle and ponies owned by the commoners.</i>
commons	A pasture subject to common use. <i>The state was divided into clergy nobility and commons.</i>
constituent	Being a voting member of an organization and having the power to appoint or elect. <i>A constituent assembly.</i>
disfranchise	Deprive of voting rights.
disloyalty	The quality of being disloyal. <i>An accusation of disloyalty and betrayal.</i>

disunion	The termination or destruction of union. <i>His rejection of disunion was consistent with his nationalism.</i>
ensign	An emblem flown as a symbol of nationality. <i>All the ensigns of our greatness.</i>
ethnicity	An ethnic quality or affiliation resulting from racial or cultural ties. <i>The interrelationship between gender ethnicity and class.</i>
firebrand	Someone who deliberately foments trouble. <i>A political firebrand.</i>
instigator	A person who brings about or initiates something. <i>She was the instigator of their quarrel.</i>
insubordination	Defiance of authority; refusal to obey orders. <i>He was dismissed for insubordination.</i>
insurrection	Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another. <i>The insurrection was savagely put down.</i>
magistrate	A lay judge or civil authority who administers the law (especially one who conducts a court dealing with minor offenses).
mutiny	Engage in a mutiny against an authority. <i>A mutiny by those manning the weapons could trigger a global war.</i>
nationality	Distinctive national or ethnic character. <i>The change of a name does not discard nationality.</i>
penalty	A disadvantage suffered as the result of an action or situation. <i>The charge carries a maximum penalty of ten years imprisonment.</i>
plebeian	Of or associated with the great masses of people. <i>Two dancers one royal and one plebeian.</i>
rebellion	The action or process of resisting authority, control, or convention. <i>The Bretons rose in rebellion against the King.</i>
revolt	Cause aversion in; offend the moral sense of. <i>The people revolted when bread prices tripled again.</i>
rising	Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another. <i>Rising ground.</i>
secession	The withdrawal of eleven southern states from the US Union in 1860, leading to the Civil War. <i>The republics want secession from the union.</i>
uphill	Requiring great effort; difficult. <i>Follow the track uphill.</i>

Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another.
