clearness	The state of being free of suspicion.
	The quality of forming a unified whole.
<u>coherence</u>	<i>The group began to lose coherence and the artists took separate directions.</i>
comprehensibility	The quality of comprehensible language or thought.
crispness	An expressive style that is direct and to the point. <i>Crispness of fresh lettuce.</i>
definition	Clarity of outline. <i>A dictionary definition of the verb.</i>
distinctness	The quality of being not alike; being distinct or different from that otherwise experienced or known.

intelligibility	The quality of language that is comprehensible. <i>Being able to see a speaker can improve intelligibility.</i>
limpidity	Free from obscurity and easy to understand; the comprehensibility of clear expression.
lucidity	A lucid state of mind; not confused. <i>She had moments of lucidity.</i>
lucidness	Free from obscurity and easy to understand; the comprehensibility of clear expression.
pellucidity	Free from obscurity and easy to understand; the comprehensibility of clear expression.
perspicuity	Clarity as a consequence of being perspicuous.
<u>precision</u>	The quality, condition, or fact of being exact and accurate. <i>Note the meticulous precision of his measurements.</i>
sharpness	The quality of being keenly and painfully felt. <i>The sharpness of strange spices.</i>
translucence	The quality of allowing light to pass diffusely.
transparency	A positive transparent photograph printed on transparent plastic or glass, able to be viewed using a slide projector. <i>The transparency of ice.</i>
uncloudedness	The quality of clear water.



Usage Examples of "Clarity" as a noun

- *The crystal clarity of water.*
- *It was clarity of purpose that he needed.*
- *When she awoke the clarity was back in her eyes.*
- *The clarity of the picture.*
- *For the sake of clarity, each of these strategies is dealt with separately.*

brevity

The attribute of being brief or fleeting.
*For **brevity** it is worth using these little symbols.*

candid

(of a photograph of a person) taken informally, especially without the subject's knowledge.
*It is better to let the photographer mingle among the guests and take **candid** shots.*

candor

Ability to make judgments free from discrimination or dishonesty.

candour

The quality of being honest and straightforward in attitude and speech.
*A man of refreshing **candour**.*

clear

Grant authorization or clearance for.
*Park staff **cleared** away dead trees.*

concise

Expressing much in few words.
*A **concise** account of the country's history.*

conciseness	Terseness and economy in writing and speaking achieved by expressing a great deal in just a few words.
directness	The quality of being honest and straightforward in attitude and speech. <i>I like the simplicity and directness of the image.</i>
<u>ease</u>	Of share prices interest rates etc decrease in value or amount. <i>Shares eased 6p to 224p.</i>
easiness	A feeling of refreshing tranquility and an absence of tension or worry. <i>A natural easiness of manner.</i>
forthrightness	The quality of being honest and straightforward in attitude and speech.
frank	Unmistakable; obvious. <i>A long and frank discussion.</i>
guileless	Devoid of guile; innocent and without deception. <i>His face once so open and guileless.</i>
<u>honesty</u>	Southeastern European plant cultivated for its fragrant purplish flowers and round flat papery silver-white seedpods that are used for indoor decoration. <i>It was not in all honesty an auspicious debut.</i>
laconic	(of a person, speech, or style of writing) using very few words. <i>His laconic reply suggested a lack of interest in the topic.</i>
<u>mortality</u>	Death, especially on a large scale. <i>The causes of mortality among infants and young children.</i>
pithiness	Terseness and economy in writing and speaking achieved by expressing a great deal in just a few words.
<u>pithy</u>	(of language or style) terse and vigorously expressive. <i>Welcomed her pithy comments.</i>
plain	Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness. <i>An insurance policy written in plain English.</i>
simple	(of interest) payable on the sum loaned only. <i>The gatherers of simples.</i>
simplicity	Absence of affectation or pretense. <i>They took advantage of her simplicity.</i>
<u>sincerity</u>	The trait of being serious- Robert Rice. <i>The simple sincerity of folk songs.</i>
<u>straightforward</u>	Pointed directly ahead. <i>In a straightforward case no fees will be charged.</i>
straightness	Freedom from crooks or curves or bends or angles.

succinctness	Terseness and economy in writing and speaking achieved by expressing a great deal in just a few words.
<u>terse</u>	Brief and to the point; effectively cut short. <i>A terse statement.</i>
transience	An impermanence that suggests the inevitability of ending or dying. <i>The transience of life and happiness.</i>
<u>transient</u>	A person who is staying or working in a place for a short time only. <i>A transient cold spell.</i>
<u>transparent</u>	Having thoughts or feelings that are easily perceived; open. <i>If you had transparent government procurement corruption would go away.</i>
well	Often used as a combining form in a good or proper or satisfactory manner or to a high standard good is a nonstandard dialectal variant for well. <i>You may well need your umbrella.</i>
