Cleared as an Adjective

Definitions of "Cleared" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “cleared” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Clear of charges or deductions.*
- *Characterized by freedom from troubling thoughts (especially guilt.*
- *Free from contact or proximity or connection.*
- *Clear and distinct to the senses; easily perceptible.*
- *Accurately stated or described.*
- *Easily deciphered.*
- *Free from clouds or mist or haze.*
- *Readily apparent to the mind.*
- *Free of restrictions or qualifications.*
- *Affording free passage or view.*
- *Free from flaw or blemish or impurity.*
- *Freed from any question of guilt.*
- *Free from anything that dulls or dims.*
- *Allowing light to pass through.*
- *Characterized by ease and quickness in perceiving.*
- *Free from any encumbrance or limitation that presents a question of fact or law.*
- *Rid of objects or obstructions such as e.g. trees and brush.*

- *Free from confusion or doubt.*



Synonyms of "Cleared" as an adjective (5 Words)

- absolved** Freed from any question of guilt.
*Is **absolved** from all blame.*
- clear** Clear of charges or deductions.
*As **clear** as a whistle.*
- exculpated** Freed from any question of guilt.
- exonerated** Freed from any question of guilt.
- vindicated** Freed from any question of guilt.
*His official honor is **vindicated**.*

Clearly visible or understood; obvious.

*For all his **apparent** wealth he had no money to pay the rent.*

assuredly

Without a doubt.

*The lad kept his cool and **assuredly** slipped the ball between the posts.*

candor

The quality of being honest and straightforward in attitude and speech.

certainly

Definitely or positively ('sure' is sometimes used informally for 'surely').

*The prestigious address **certainly** adds to the firm's appeal.*

clarity

The quality of being coherent and intelligible.

*The crystal **clarity** of water.*

clearly

Without doubt or question.

*On white paper the seeds are **clearly** visible.*

crystalline

Distinctly or sharply outlined- John Buchan.

*The cold **crystalline** water of melted snow.*

decidedly

In a decisive and confident way.

*It was **decidedly** too expensive.*

definitely	In a definite manner; clearly. <i>We couldn't plan to go elsewhere until we had heard from you more definitely.</i>
<u>doubtless</u>	Without doubt; certainly. <i>The company would doubtless find the reduced competition to their liking.</i>
<u>explicit</u>	Of a person stating something in an explicit manner. <i>She made her wishes explicit.</i>
expressly	For a specific purpose; solely. <i>She was expressly forbidden to use the stove.</i>
indubitable	Impossible to doubt; unquestionable. <i>An indubitable truth.</i>
indubitably	In a manner or to a degree that could not be doubted. <i>Indubitably liberalism parades under many guises.</i>
limpid	(of language) transparently clear; easily understandable. <i>The limpid waters of the Caribbean.</i>
<u>lucid</u>	Transmitting light; able to be seen through with clarity. <i>Lucid directions.</i>
obvious	Easily perceived by the senses or grasped by the mind. <i>Unemployment has been the most obvious cost of the recession.</i>
<u>overt</u>	Open and observable; not secret or hidden. <i>An overt act of aggression.</i>
pellucid	Easily understood; lucid. <i>Mountains reflected in the pellucid waters.</i>
perspicuity	Clarity as a consequence of being perspicuous.
perspicuous	Able to give an account or express an idea clearly. <i>A perspicuous argument.</i>
plain	Unmistakably plain is often used informally for plainly. <i>The main problem is just plain exhaustion.</i>
simple	Of very low intelligence. <i>Camcorders are now so simple to operate.</i>
<u>straightforward</u>	Uncomplicated and easy to do or understand. <i>A straightforward young man.</i>
<u>surely</u>	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i>If he did not heed the warning he would surely die.</i>
<u>transparent</u>	Easy to perceive or detect. <i>Transparent blue water.</i>

unambiguous

Not open to more than one interpretation.
*Instructions should be **unambiguous**.*

undoubtedly

Without doubt; certainly.
*It s **undoubtedly** very beautiful.*

unequivocal

Clearly defined or formulated.
***Unequivocal** evidence.*

unquestionably

Without question and beyond doubt.
*The claim is **unquestionably** true.*
