their hostage.

attorney A solicitor.

barrister A British or Canadian lawyer who speaks in the higher courts of law on

behalf of either the defense or prosecution.

bookingAn act of reserving accommodation, a ticket, etc. in advance.

freelancer A person who works freelance.

A person staying at a hotel or guest house.

A regular **guest** on the morning show.

host Be the host of or for.

Your **host** is Stuart Macmillan.

Invite someone to one s house.

We invite to one s nouse.

We invited the neighbors in for a cup of coffee.

Practise law work as a lawyer.

There is always a danger that the deal will be **lawyer**ed to death.

milkman Someone who delivers milk.

offer Present or proffer something for someone to accept or reject as desired.

He had accepted Mallory s **offer** to buy him a drink.

The power to control appointments to office or the right to privileges.

The direct train link was ending because of poor **patronage**.

pawnbroker A person who lends money at interest on the security of an article pawned.

The department responsible for hiring and training and placing employees
