# Associations of "Clientele" (30 Words)

Require or ask for as a price or condition.

**attorney** A solicitor.

**barrister** A British or Canadian lawyer who speaks in the higher courts of law on

behalf of either the defense or prosecution.

**booking**An act of reserving accommodation, a ticket, etc. in advance.

**buyout** The purchase of a controlling share in a company.

**freelancer** A person who works freelance.

A person staying at a hotel or guest house.

A regular **guest** on the morning show.

host Be the host of or for.

Your **host** is Stuart Macmillan.

Invite someone to one s house.

*We invite* to one s nouse.

We invited the neighbors in for a cup of coffee.

Practise law work as a lawyer.

There is always a danger that the deal will be **lawyer**ed to death.

**milkman** Someone who delivers milk.

offer Present or proffer something for someone to accept or reject as desired.

He had accepted Mallory s **offer** to buy him a drink.

**pawnbroker** A person who lends money at interest on the security of an article pawned.
