- business** Business concerns collectively.

- clients** Someone who pays for goods or services.
- patronage** The rights and duties or position of a patron.
*A twang of self satisfaction even **patronage** about him.*

Associations of "Clientele" (30 Words)

ask	Require or ask for as a price or condition. <i>The kidnappers are asking a million dollars in return for the release of their hostage.</i>
attorney	A solicitor.
barrister	A British or Canadian lawyer who speaks in the higher courts of law on behalf of either the defense or prosecution.
<u>booking</u>	An act of reserving accommodation, a ticket, etc. in advance. <i>Wondered who had made the booking.</i>

buyout	The purchase of a controlling share in a company.
<u>chore</u>	A routine task, especially a household one. <i>The early risers were up and about doing their chores.</i>
client	Someone who pays for goods or services. A client referred for counselling.
contracted	Reduced in size or pulled together. <i>The contracted pupils of her eyes.</i>
customer	A person who buys goods or services from a shop or business. <i>Mr Harrison was a regular customer at the Golden Lion.</i>
errand	The purpose or object of an errand. <i>She asked Tim to run an errand for her.</i>
freelancer	A person who works freelance.
<u>guest</u>	A person staying at a hotel or guest house. <i>A regular guest on the morning show.</i>
<u>host</u>	Be the host of or for. <i>Your host is Stuart Macmillan.</i>
invite	Invite someone to one's house. <i>We invited the neighbors in for a cup of coffee.</i>
<u>lawyer</u>	Practise law work as a lawyer. <i>There is always a danger that the deal will be lawyered to death.</i>
milkman	Someone who delivers milk.
offer	Present or proffer something for someone to accept or reject as desired. <i>He had accepted Mallory's offer to buy him a drink.</i>
<u>patronage</u>	The power to control appointments to office or the right to privileges. <i>The direct train link was ending because of poor patronage.</i>
pawnbroker	A person who lends money at interest on the security of an article pawned.
personnel	The department responsible for hiring and training and placing employees and for setting policies for personnel management. <i>Sales personnel.</i>
proprietorship	An unincorporated business owned by a single person who is responsible for its liabilities and entitled to its profits. <i>The company was established in 1912 and is still under the proprietorship of the same family.</i>
reception	The first class in an infant or primary school. <i>Sensation is not the passive reception of stimuli.</i>
requisition	An official form on which a request is made. <i>I had to make various requisitions for staff and accommodation.</i>

reservation	The act of reserving (a place or passage) or engaging the services of (a person or group). <i>The retention of a right to enter the demised property will be a reservation.</i>
service	Perform a service or services for someone. <i>Service is included in the final bill.</i>
solicitor	A member of the legal profession qualified to deal with conveyancing the drawing up of wills and other legal matters A solicitor may also instruct barristers and represent clients in some courts. <i>She had been a telephone solicitor for a Chicago newspaper.</i>
<u>sponsor</u>	Assume sponsorship of. <i>Joe is being sponsored by a government training scheme.</i>
storekeeper	A shopkeeper.
visiting	(of an academic) working for a fixed period of time at another institution. <i>A visiting speaker.</i>
welcome	Bid welcome to greet upon arrival. <i>Don't outstay your welcome.</i>
