## Synonyms of "Cliff" as a noun (12 Words)

bluff	The act of bluffing in poker deception by a false show of confidence in the strength of your cards. <i>The offer was denounced as a <b>bluff</b>.</i>
crag	A steep rugged rock or cliff.
drop	An instance of falling or dropping. There was not a <b>drop</b> of water in sight.
drop-off	A change downward.
escarpment	A steep artificial slope in front of a fortification.
face	An expression shown on the face. I wish I had seen the look on his <b>face</b> when he got the news.



overhang	Projection that extends beyond or hangs over something else. <i>He crouched beneath an <b>overhang</b> of bushes.</i>
precipice	A very steep rock face or cliff, especially a tall one. <i>We swerved toward the edge of the <b>precipice</b>.</i>
<u>ridge</u>	The line or edge formed where the two sloping sides of a roof meet at the top. <i>The roof was unusual due to the relative heights of the eaves and the</i> <b>ridge</b> .
rock face	Material consisting of the aggregate of minerals like those making up the Earth's crust.
<u>scar</u>	A lasting effect of grief, fear, or other emotion left on a person's character by an unpleasant experience. Max could see <b>scar</b> s of the blast.
scarp	A very steep bank or slope an escarpment. The north face is a very steep <b>scarp</b> .



### Usage Examples of "Cliff" as a noun

• He stood on a high cliff overlooking the town.



• A coast path along the top of rugged cliffs.



# Associations of "Cliff" (30 Words)

arroyo	A steep-sided gully formed by the action of fast-flowing water in an arid or semi-arid region, found chiefly in the south-western US.
brae	A steep bank or hillside. A figure was spied struggling up the <b>brae</b> .
<u>canyon</u>	A deep gorge, typically one with a river flowing through it, as found in North America. <i>The Grand Canyon</i> .
<u>cascade</u>	Rush down in big quantities like a cascade. The waterfall raced down in a series of <b>cascade</b> s.
<u>chasm</u>	A profound difference between people, viewpoints, feelings, etc. <i>He was engulfed in a <b>chasm</b> of despair.</i>



declivity	A downward slope or bend. A thickly wooded <b>declivity</b> .
descending	Moving or sloping downwards. A passage of <b>descending</b> chords.
disgorge	(of a building or vehicle) discharge (the occupants. The combine <b>disgorge</b> d a steady stream of grain.
drop	An instance of falling or dropping. <b>Drop</b> names.
edge	Strike the ball with the edge of the bat strike a ball delivered by the bowler with the edge of the bat. <i>He rounded the edges of the box.</i>
foothill	A low hill at the base of a mountain or mountain range. The camp lies in the <b>foothill</b> s of the Andes.
glen	A narrow secluded valley (in the mountains.
gorge	A narrow valley between hills or mountains, typically with steep rocky walls and a stream running through it. <i>They</i> <b>gorge</b> <i>d</i> themselves on Cornish cream teas.
hasty	Done with very great haste and without due deliberation- Shakespeare- Arthur Geddes. <i>Rejected what was regarded as an over</i> <b>hasty</b> <i>plan for reconversion.</i>
<u>hill</u>	Form into a hill. <i>If frost threatens our new plants we <b>hill</b> them up.</i>
hurried	Done in a hurry; rushed. I ate a <b>hurried</b> breakfast.
ledge	A window ledge. A reef <b>ledge</b> .
<u>mountain</u>	A land mass that projects well above its surroundings; higher than a hill. They sought refuge in the <b>mountain</b> s.
<u>precipice</u>	A very steep cliff. We swerved toward the edge of the <b>precipice</b> .
precipitant	A cause of a particular action or event. Depression may be a <b>precipitant</b> in many cases.
precipitous	Extremely steep. The <b>precipitous</b> rapids of the upper river.
ravine	A deep narrow steep-sided valley (especially one formed by running water.
<u>ridge</u>	Spade into alternate ridges and troughs. <i>Ridge</i> the soil.



scarp	Provide a ditch in a fortification with a steep scarp and counterscarp. The <b>scarp</b> ed edge of the central plateau.
<u>steep</u>	A steep mountain slope. <i>Hair raising <b>steep</b>s.</i>
<u>trickle</u>	Cause (a liquid) to flow in a small stream. The traffic had dwindled to a <b>trickle</b> .
<u>vale</u>	A long depression in the surface of the land that usually contains a river. <i>The Vale of Glamorgan.</i>
<u>valley</u>	A long depression in the surface of the land that usually contains a river. <i>The valley floor.</i>
<u>waterfall</u>	Relating to or denoting a method of project management that is characterized by sequential stages and a fixed plan of work. Each phase of a <b>waterfall</b> project must be complete prior to moving to the next phase.
