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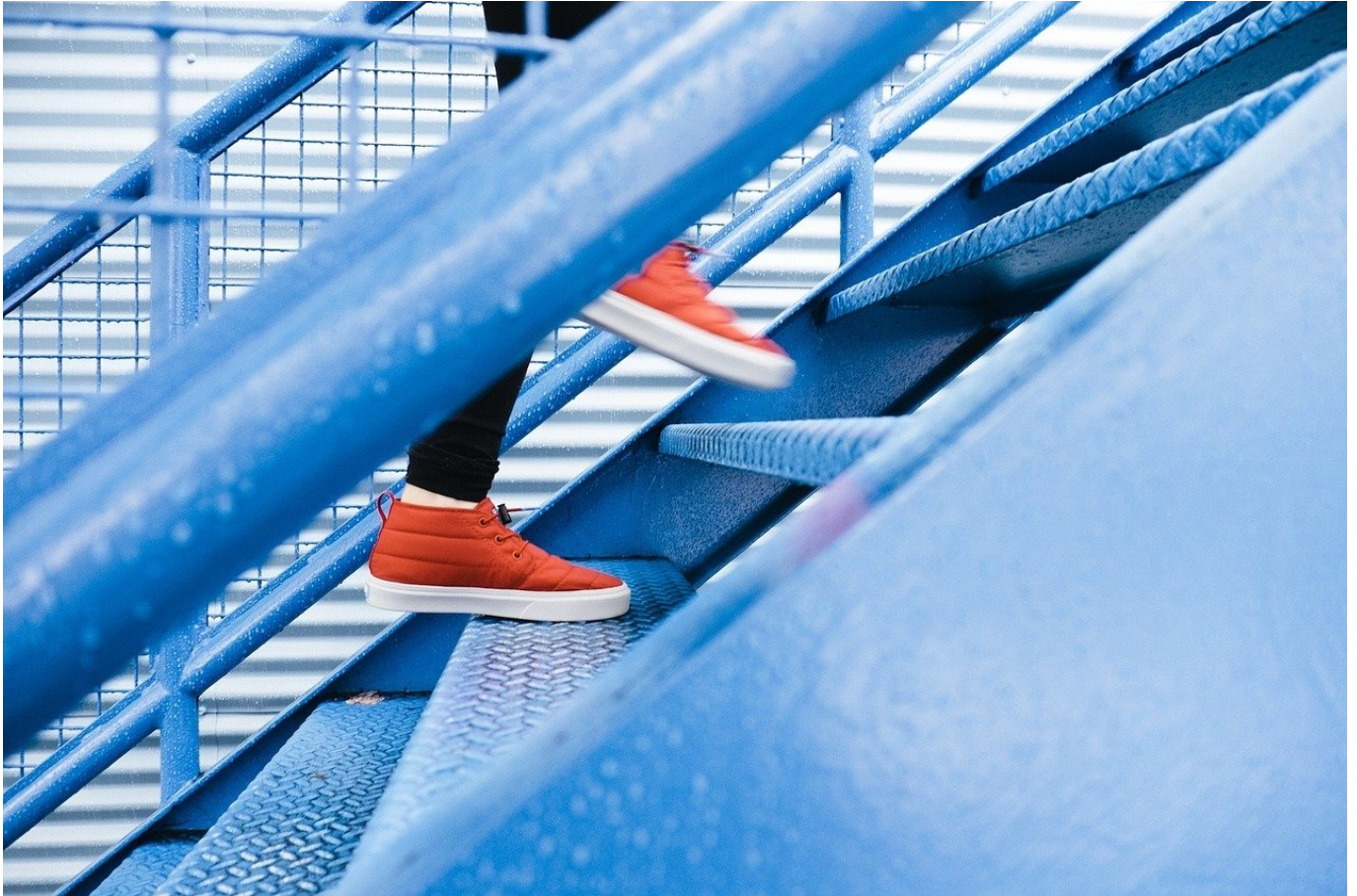
The synonyms of “Climbing” are: climb, mounting, departure, launch, taking off

Climbing as a Noun

Definitions of "Climbing" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “climbing” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *An event that involves rising to a higher point (as in altitude or temperature or intensity etc.*
- *The sport or activity of climbing mountains or cliffs.*



Synonyms of "Climbing" as a noun (5 Words)

climb An ascent especially of a mountain or hill by climbing.
*This walk involves a long moorland **climb**.*

departure A variation that deviates from the standard or norm.
*She made a hasty **departure**.*

launch An act or instance of launching something.
*The **launch** of a new campaign against drinking and driving.*

mounting The action of mounting something.
*The **mounting** of rapid fire guns.*

taking off The act of someone who picks up or takes something.



Usage Examples of "Climbing" as a noun

- *Climbing equipment.*
- *His other great interest was climbing, especially in the Alps.*



Associations of "Climbing" (30 Words)

alpine	Relating to high mountains. <i>Alpine</i> flowers.
ascend	Appear to be moving upward, as by means of tendrils. The mountaineers slowly ascended the steep slope.
ascending	The act of changing location in an upward direction. A gently ascending forest path.
ascent	A movement upward. The first ascent of the Matterhorn.
boost	Give a boost to be beneficial to. He gave her a boost over the fence.
clamber	Climb awkwardly, as if by scrambling. A clamber up the cliff path.

<u>climb</u>	The act of climbing something. <i>He climbed up the steps slowly.</i>
climber	A vine or climbing plant that readily grows up a support or over other plants. <i>Leopards are great tree climbers.</i>
guided	Subject to guidance or control especially after launching. <i>A guided tour of the castle.</i>
<u>hike</u>	An increase in cost. <i>It s such a hike from Adelaide to Perth.</i>
<u>hiking</u>	A long walk usually for exercise or pleasure. <i>She enjoys hiking and climbing in her spare time.</i>
<u>hill</u>	Form into a hill. <i>They loved to roam the hills of West Virginia.</i>
jog	A spell of jogging. <i>Jog along the canal.</i>
<u>mountain</u>	A large pile or quantity of something. <i>A mountain peak.</i>
mountaineer	A person who takes part in mountaineering.
mounting	The action of mounting something. <i>The mounting of rapid fire guns.</i>
picnic	Have or take part in a picnic. <i>Marketing this product will be no picnic.</i>
raise	Raise in rank or condition. <i>Divers have located and hope to raise the submarine.</i>
rise	The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. <i>I gained the crest of a rise and saw the plain stretched out before me.</i>
scale	Remove scale or scales from. <i>He scales the fish and removes the innards.</i>
ski	Move along on skis. <i>My children don t ski.</i>
skiing	The action of travelling over snow on skis especially as a sport or recreation Competitive skiing falls into two categories Nordic cross country racing jumping and biathlon and Alpine downhill or straight racing and slalom racing round a series of markers.
steeply	In a steep manner. <i>The walls of the gorge rise steeply on both sides.</i>
stepladder	A folding portable ladder hinged at the top.

- stroller** Someone who walks at a leisurely pace.
*Shady gardens where **strollers** could relax.*
- surmount** Be on top of.
*The scarf **surmounted** the gown.*
- trek** A haul of fish caught using a trek net.
*We **trekked** through the jungle.*
- uphill** Towards the top of a hill or slope.
*Follow the track **uphill**.*
- walking** Close enough to be walked to.
***Walking** distance.*
