Skintight jeans.



tight-fitting Fitting snugly.








Usage Examples of "Clinging" as an adjective

Be attached be in contact with. attach

A good deal of prominence **attach**es to the central union federations.

Affection, fondness, or sympathy for someone or something. attachment

The students are placed on **attachment** to schools for one day a week.

Split or sever (something), especially along a natural line or grain. cleave

The egg **cleave**s to form a mulberry shaped cluster of cells.

(of an argument or theory) be logically consistent. cohere

The principles by which societies **cohere**.

Combine so as to form a whole mix. combine

Combine resources.

Connect fasten or put together two or more pieces. connect

The President of this university really **connect**s with the faculty.
