## **Definitions of "Clobber" as a verb**

- Beat thoroughly and conclusively in a competition or fight.
- Treat or deal with harshly.
- Hit (someone) hard.
- Strike violently and repeatedly.
- Defeat heavily.

## Synonyms of "Clobber" as a verb (44 Words)

bang	Leap jerk bang. Someone was <b>bang</b> ing on the door.
baste	Strike violently and repeatedly. <i>Slip herbs under the skin and <b>baste</b> the chicken constantly.</i>
<u>bat</u>	Strike with or as if with a baseball bat. <i>He <b>bat</b>ted the flies away.</i>
batter	Subject (one's spouse, partner, or child) to repeated violence and assault. <i>He was <b>batter</b>ed at times by critics.</i>
beat	Give a beating to subject to a beating either as a punishment or as an act of aggression. <b>Beat</b> swords into ploughshares.
belabour	To work at or to absurd length. There is no need to <b>belabour</b> the point.
best	Outwit or get the better of (someone. She refused to allow herself to be <b>best</b> ed.
box someone's ears	Hit with the fist.
cane	Beat with a cane. Matthew was <b>cane</b> d for bullying by the headmaster.
conquer	Take possession of by force, as after an invasion. <i>He <b>conquer</b>ed Cyprus.</i>



<u>cream</u>	Work two or more ingredients typically butter and sugar together to form a creamy paste. <i>She creams her face every night.</i>
cuff	Confine or restrain with or as if with manacles or handcuffs. The man s hands were <b>cuff</b> ed behind his back.
drub	Hit or beat (someone) repeatedly. He was <b>drub</b> bed with tiresome regularity by his classmates.
flog	Beat (someone) with a whip or stick as a punishment. By 10 pm we had <b>flog</b> ged up the slopes to Grey Crag.
get the better of	Enter or assume a certain state or condition.
give someone a beating	Emit or utter.
give someone a drubbing	Propose.
give someone a good beating	Deliver in exchange or recompense.
give someone a good drubbing	Place into the hands or custody of.
hammer	Beat with or as if with a hammer. He <b>hammer</b> ed the tack in.
hit	Score a run or point by hitting a ball with a bat racket stick etc. If they re cops maybe it s not a good idea to have them <b>hit</b> .
hook	Bend into the shape of a hook so as to fasten around or to an object. <i>Her legs hooked around mine.</i>
knock	Knock against with force or violence. Don t <b>knock</b> the food it s free.
lick	Pass the tongue over. The dog <b>lick</b> ed her hand.
<u>pound</u>	Place or shut up in a pound. <b>Pound</b> the roots with a heavy flat stone.
prevail over	Be valid, applicable, or true.
pummel	Criticize severely. <i>He felt like a boxer who had been</i> <b>pummel</b> led mercilessly against <i>the ropes.</i>
punch	Drive forcibly as if by a punch. The nail <b>punch</b> ed through the wall.
rain blows on	Precipitate as rain.



<u>slam</u>	Dance the slam dance. He <b>slam</b> med out of the room.
<u>slap</u>	Hit against or into something with the sound of something being slapped. The impatient teacher <b>slap</b> ped the student.
smack	Strike (someone or something), typically with the palm of the hand and as a punishment. <i>His speeches</i> <b>smack</b> ed of racism.
<u>smash</u>	Overthrow or destroy (something considered evil or harmful. A firm that had <b>smash</b> ed for so tremendous an amount.
<u>strike</u>	Undertake strike action against an employer. Photoengravers voted to <b>strike</b> the New York Times.
swat	Hit (someone) with a sharp blow. She <b>swat</b> ted him over the head with a rolled up magazine.
<u>thrash</u>	Give a thrashing to beat hard. Newcastle were <b>thrash</b> ed 8 1 by the Czech team.
thump	Move rhythmically. She picked up the kettle then <b>thump</b> ed it down again.
triumph over	Prove superior.
vanquish	Come out better in a competition, race, or conflict. <i>He successfully</i> <b>vanquish</b> ed his rival.
welt	Provide with a welt. <i>His lip was beginning to thicken and <b>welt</b> from the blow.</i>
whip	Strike as if by whipping. The burly Warburton <b>whip</b> ped off his shirt.
win a victory over	Obtain advantages, such as points, etc.
win against	Attain success or reach a desired goal.
worst	Defeat thoroughly. This was not the time for a deep discussion she was tired and she would be <b>worst</b> ed.

- If he does that I'll clobber him!
- She clobbered the man who tried to attack her.
- The Braves clobbered the Cubs 23-10.
- The recession clobbered other parts of the business.
