## Definitions of "Clobber" as a verb

- *Treat or deal with harshly.*
- *Hit (someone) hard.*
- *Strike violently and repeatedly.*
- *Defeat heavily.*

## Synonyms of "Clobber" as a verb (44 Words)

<b>bang</b>	Leap jerk bang. <i>Someone was <b>banging</b> on the door.</i>
<b>baste</b>	Strike violently and repeatedly. <i>Slip herbs under the skin and <b>baste</b> the chicken constantly.</i>
<b>bat</b>	Strike with or as if with a baseball bat. <i>He <b>batted</b> the flies away.</i>
<b>batter</b>	Subject (one's spouse, partner, or child) to repeated violence and assault. <i>He was <b>battered</b> at times by critics.</i>
<b>beat</b>	Give a beating to subject to a beating either as a punishment or as an act of aggression. <i><b>Beat</b> swords into ploughshares.</i>
<b>belabour</b>	To work at or to absurd length. <i>There is no need to <b>belabour</b> the point.</i>
<b>best</b>	Outwit or get the better of (someone). <i>She refused to allow herself to be <b>bested</b>.</i>
<b>box someone's ears</b>	Hit with the fist.
<b>cane</b>	Beat with a cane. <i>Matthew was <b>canned</b> for bullying by the headmaster.</i>
<b>conquer</b>	Take possession of by force, as after an invasion. <i>He <b>conquered</b> Cyprus.</i>

<b><u>cream</u></b>	Work two or more ingredients typically butter and sugar together to form a creamy paste. <i>She <b>creams</b> her face every night.</i>
<b>cuff</b>	Confine or restrain with or as if with manacles or handcuffs. <i>The man s hands were <b>cuffed</b> behind his back.</i>
<b>drub</b>	Hit or beat (someone) repeatedly. <i>He was <b>drubbed</b> with tiresome regularity by his classmates.</i>
<b>flog</b>	Beat (someone) with a whip or stick as a punishment. <i>By 10 pm we had <b>flogged</b> up the slopes to Grey Crag.</i>
<b>get the better of</b>	Enter or assume a certain state or condition.
<b>give someone a beating</b>	Emit or utter.
<b>give someone a drubbing</b>	Propose.
<b>give someone a good beating</b>	Deliver in exchange or recompense.
<b>give someone a good drubbing</b>	Place into the hands or custody of.
<b>hammer</b>	Beat with or as if with a hammer. <i>He <b>hammered</b> the tack in.</i>
<b>hit</b>	Score a run or point by hitting a ball with a bat racket stick etc. <i>If they re cops maybe it s not a good idea to have them <b>hit</b>.</i>
<b>hook</b>	Bend into the shape of a hook so as to fasten around or to an object. <i>Her legs <b>hooked</b> around mine.</i>
<b>knock</b>	Knock against with force or violence. <i>Don t <b>knock</b> the food it s free.</i>
<b><u>lick</u></b>	Pass the tongue over. <i>The dog <b>licked</b> her hand.</i>
<b><u>pound</u></b>	Place or shut up in a pound. <i><b>Pound</b> the roots with a heavy flat stone.</i>
<b>prevail over</b>	Be valid, applicable, or true.
<b>pummel</b>	Criticize severely. <i>He felt like a boxer who had been <b>pummelled</b> mercilessly against the ropes.</i>
<b>punch</b>	Drive forcibly as if by a punch. <i>The nail <b>punched</b> through the wall.</i>
<b>rain blows on</b>	Precipitate as rain.

<b>slam</b>	Dance the slam dance. <i>He <b>slammed</b> out of the room.</i>
<b>slap</b>	Hit against or into something with the sound of something being slapped. <i>The impatient teacher <b>slapped</b> the student.</i>
<b>smack</b>	Strike (someone or something), typically with the palm of the hand and as a punishment. <i>His speeches <b>smacked</b> of racism.</i>
<b>smash</b>	Overthrow or destroy (something considered evil or harmful). <i>A firm that had <b>smashed</b> for so tremendous an amount.</i>
<b>strike</b>	Undertake strike action against an employer. <i>Photoengravers voted to <b>strike</b> the New York Times.</i>
<b>swat</b>	Hit (someone) with a sharp blow. <i>She <b>swatted</b> him over the head with a rolled up magazine.</i>
<b>thrash</b>	Give a thrashing to beat hard. <i>Newcastle were <b>thrashed</b> 8 1 by the Czech team.</i>
<b>thump</b>	Move rhythmically. <i>She picked up the kettle then <b>thumped</b> it down again.</i>
<b>triumph over</b>	Prove superior.
<b>vanquish</b>	Come out better in a competition, race, or conflict. <i>He successfully <b>vanquished</b> his rival.</i>
<b>welt</b>	Provide with a welt. <i>His lip was beginning to thicken and <b>welt</b> from the blow.</i>
<b>whip</b>	Strike as if by whipping. <i>The burly Warburton <b>whipped</b> off his shirt.</i>
<b>win a victory over</b>	Obtain advantages, such as points, etc.
<b>win against</b>	Attain success or reach a desired goal.
<b>worst</b>	Defeat thoroughly. <i>This was not the time for a deep discussion she was tired and she would be <b>worsted</b>.</i>

- *She clobbered the man who tried to attack her.*
- *The Braves clobbered the Cubs 23-10.*
- *The recession clobbered other parts of the business.*
