## Clock as a Noun

### Definitions of "Clock" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “clock” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A person's face.*
- *A mechanical or electrical device for measuring time, indicating hours, minutes, and sometimes seconds by hands on a round dial or by displayed figures.*
- *Time taken as a factor in an activity, especially in competitive sports.*
- *A downy spherical seed head, especially that of a dandelion.*
- *A timepiece that shows the time of day.*
- *An electronic device used to initiate and synchronize internal operations.*
- *A measuring device such as a speedometer, taximeter, or milometer.*



## Synonyms of "Clock" as a noun (5 Words)

### counter

A long flat-topped fitment across which business is conducted in a shop or bank or refreshments are served in a cafeteria.

A **counter** may be used to stiffen the material around the heel and to give support to the foot.

### odometer

A meter that shows mileage traversed.

### timekeeper

A watch or clock regarded as recording time accurately or inaccurately.

Official **timekeepers**.

### timepiece

A measuring instrument or device for keeping time.

### timer

A regulator that activates or deactivates a mechanism at set times.

For most first **timers** the success rate is 45 per cent.

### Definitions of "Clock" as a verb

- *Wind back the milometer of (a car) illegally in order to make the vehicle appear to have travelled fewer miles than it really has.*
- *Attain or register (a specified time, distance, or speed).*
- *Measure the time or duration of an event or action or the person who performs an action in a certain period of time.*



- *Hit (someone), especially on the head.*
- *Achieve (a victory.*
- *Record as attaining a specified time or rate.*
- *Notice or watch.*

<b>notice</b>	Notice or perceive. <i>They were too drunk to <b>notice</b>.</i>
<b>observe</b>	Observe with care or pay close attention to. <i>Please <b>observe</b> the reaction of these two chemicals.</i>
<b>perceive</b>	Become aware of (something) by the use of one of the senses, especially that of sight. <i>She finally <b>perceived</b> the futility of her protest.</i>
<b>record</b>	Produce a programme or a piece or collection of music by recording a performance. <i>They <b>recorded</b> her singing.</i>
<b>register</b>	Put one's name in a register as a guest in a hotel. <i>34 500 <b>registered</b> to vote.</i>
<b>remark</b>	Regard with attention; notice. <i>The judges <b>remarked</b> on the high standard of the entries.</i>
<b>see</b>	Go to see a place as for entertainment. <i>Andrew couldn't <b>see</b> out of his left eye.</i>
<b>spot</b>	Mark with a spot or spots so as to allow easy recognition. <b>Spot</b> the areas that one should clearly identify.
<b>take notice of</b>	Develop a habit.
<b>time</b>	Measure the time or duration of an event or action or the person who performs an action in a certain period of time. <i>Williams <b>timed</b> his pass perfectly from about thirty yards.</i>





## Usage Examples of "Clock" as a verb

- *Someone clocked him for no good reason.*
- *I clocked nearly nine hours of uninterrupted sleep.*
- *The tower operators clocked a gust at 185 mph.*
- *Beware of motorists who clock their car before selling it.*
- *I noticed him clocking her in the mirror.*
- *She clocked her 39th victory of the season.*
- *They had sold clocked vehicles.*

*A **bedtime** story.*

### bob

Cause something to make a bobbing movement.  
*Bernice **bobs** her hair these days.*

### calculator

A small machine that is used for mathematical calculations; can be mechanical or electronic.  
*A pocket **calculator**.*



<b>centenary</b>	Of or relating to or completing a period of 100 years. <i>The <b>centenary</b> year of the artist's birth.</i>
<b>centennial</b>	Relating to a hundredth anniversary. <i><b>Centennial</b> celebrations.</i>
<b>chronometer</b>	An accurate clock (especially used in navigation).
<b>digital</b>	Relating to using or storing data or information in the form of digital signals. <i><b>Digital</b> computer.</i>
<b>epoch</b>	An arbitrarily fixed date relative to which planetary or stellar measurements are expressed. <i>These events marked an <b>epoch</b> in their history.</i>
<b>equinox</b>	The time or date (twice each year) at which the sun crosses the celestial equator, when day and night are of approximately equal length (about 22 September and 20 March).
<b>hour</b>	A time specified on the twenty four hour clock. <i>An organized life of prayer including the canonical <b>hours</b>.</i>
<b>inopportune</b>	Not opportune. <i>A storm blew up at an <b>inopportune</b> moment.</i>
<b>may</b>	Expressing possibility. <i><b>May</b> she rest in peace.</i>
<b>o'clock</b>	According to the clock.
<b>occasional</b>	Occurring on a temporary or irregular basis. <i>An <b>occasional</b> table.</i>
<b>pendulum</b>	An apparatus consisting of an object mounted so that it swings freely under the influence of gravity. <i>The <b>pendulum</b> of fashion.</i>
<b>periodical</b>	(of a magazine or newspaper) published at regular intervals. <i>Britain's best <b>periodical</b> art magazine.</i>
<b>periodicity</b>	The quality or character of being periodic; the tendency to recur at intervals. <i>The <b>periodicity</b> of the sunspot cycle.</i>
<b>proportional</b>	Properly related in size or degree or other measurable characteristics; usually followed by 'to'. <i>The punishment should be <b>proportional</b> to the crime.</i>
<b>record</b>	Make a record of set down in permanent form. <i>They were asked to keep a diary and <b>record</b> everything they ate or drank.</i>

<b>serrate</b>	Serrated. <i><b>Serrate</b> the edges of the teeth.</i>
<b>swing</b>	An act of swinging. <i>Neil took a <b>swing</b> at her.</i>
<b>synchronize</b>	Coordinate; combine. <i>The clocks <b>synchronize</b>.</i>
<b>time</b>	The favourable or appropriate time to do something. <i>They had a good <b>time</b> together.</i>
<b>timepiece</b>	An instrument, such as a clock or watch, for measuring time.
<b>visibility</b>	Capability of providing a clear unobstructed view. <i>A windshield with good <b>visibility</b>.</i>
<b>watch</b>	See or watch. <i>Credit card fraud is on the increase so <b>watch</b> out.</i>
<b>wristwatch</b>	A watch that is worn strapped to the wrist.
