- *Used especially of mouth or eyes.*
- *(set theory) of an interval that contains both its endpoints.*
- *Limited to certain people; not open or available to all.*
- *Blocked against entry.*
- *Not open.*

- *Not having an open mind.*
- *(of a business) having ceased trading, especially for a short period.*
- *(of a curve or figure) formed from a single unbroken line.*
- *(of a society or system) not communicating with or influenced by others.*
- *Unwilling to accept new ideas.*

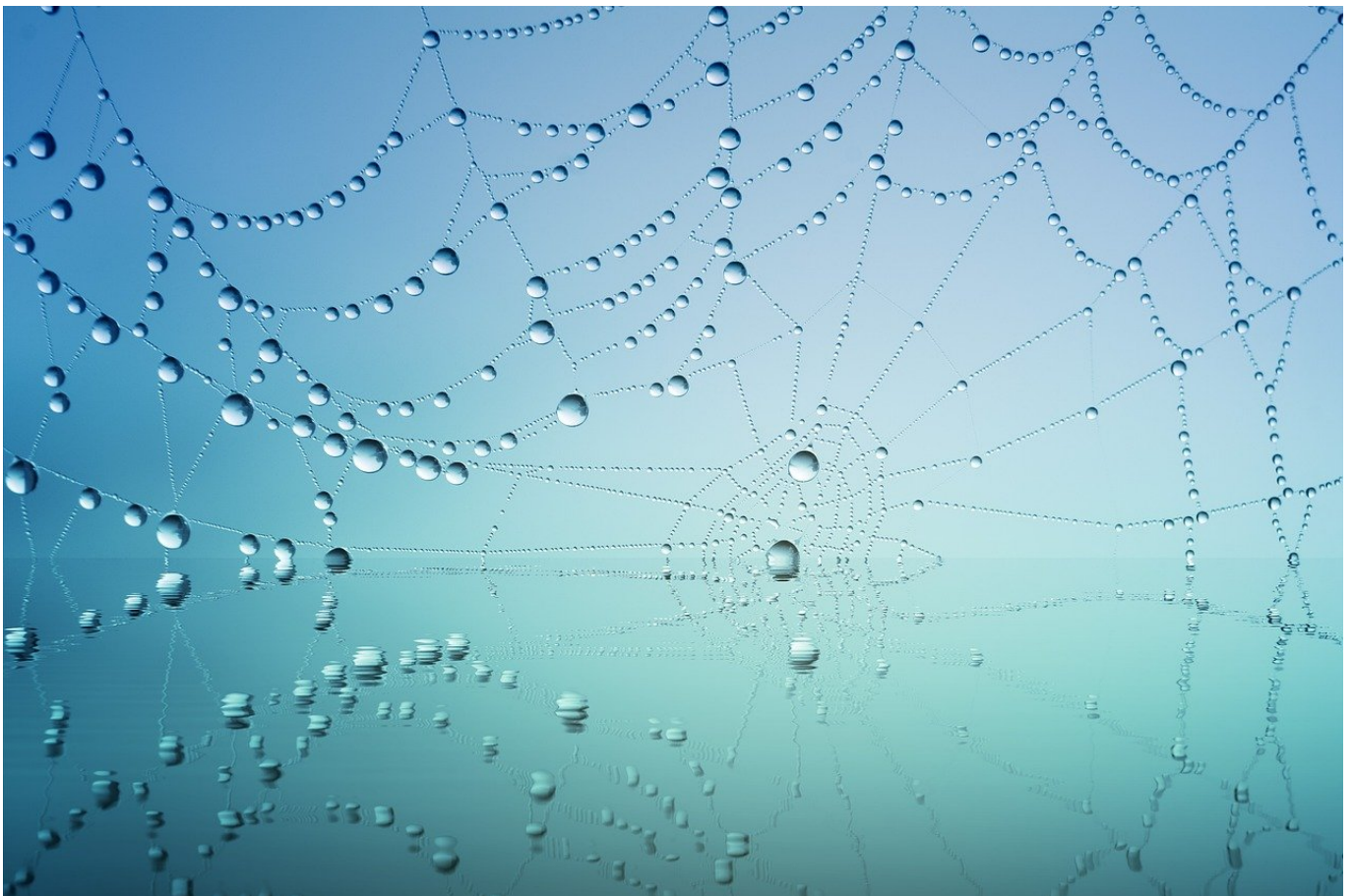

heedless of	Marked by or paying little heed or attention—Franklin D. Roosevelt.
high-class	Pretentiously elegant.
immune to	Relating to or conferring immunity (to disease or infection).
indifferent to	Marked by a lack of interest.
invulnerable to	Immune to attack; impregnable.
not susceptible to	Easily impressed emotionally.
oblivious to	Lacking conscious awareness of.
premier	Of earliest creation. <i>An architect of premier rank.</i>
proof against	Able to withstand.
resistant to	Disposed to or engaged in defiance of established authority. (of walls) covered with a coat of plaster.
sealed	<i>Sealed orders.</i>
select	Selected or chosen for special qualifications. <i>The opera was seen by a small and highly select audience.</i>
shut	Used especially of mouth or eyes. <i>The door slammed shut.</i>
special	Used to denote education for children with particular needs especially those with learning difficulties. <i>We want to preserve our town's special character.</i>
stylish	Fashionably elegant and sophisticated. <i>You don't have to be a designer to create a stylish look in your own small room.</i>
tight	Of a community or other group of people having close relations tight knit. <i>She released her tight hold on the dog.</i>
unaffected by	Unaware of or indifferent to.
unopen	Not open.

unsympathetic	Not sympathetic or disposed toward. <i>I m not being unsympathetic but I can t see why you put up with him.</i>
water-repellent	Hindering the penetration of water.
water-resistant	Hindering the penetration of water.
waterproof	Impervious to water. Waterproof ink.
watertight	Not allowing water to pass in or out. A watertight compartment.

Associations of "Closed" (30 Words)

airtight	Not allowing air to escape or pass through. <i>An airtight box.</i>
barred	Marked with stripes or bands. <i>A barred gate.</i>
blocked	(of email or a website) prevented from being accessed or used. <i>The repaving results in many blocked streets.</i>
capsule	Enclose in a capsule. <i>A capsule wardrobe.</i>
compressed	Reduced in volume by pressure. <i>Compressed air.</i>
compressor	A machine used to supply air or other gas at increased pressure, e.g. to power a gas turbine.
concealed	Kept secret; hidden. <i>A concealed compartment in his briefcase.</i>
coronary	Obstruction of blood flow in a coronary artery by a blood clot thrombus.
door	A doorway. <i>His office is the third door down the hall on the left.</i>
envelop	(of troops) surround (an enemy force). <i>A figure enveloped in a black cloak.</i>
envelope	The bag containing the gas in a balloon. <i>Test pilots try to push the envelope.</i>
fixed	Having a fixed and unchanging value. <i>How s the club fixed for money now.</i>
hermetic	Difficult to understand because intended for a small number of people with specialized knowledge. <i>A hermetic seal that ensures perfect waterproofing.</i>
hermetically	In a way that is completely airtight. <i>A hermetically closed society.</i>
immobile	Securely fixed in place. <i>An immobile workforce.</i>
lid	An eyelid. <i>I ve got a lid for you to try on.</i>
obstructed	Shut off to passage or view or hindered from action. <i>Justice obstructed is not justice.</i>

occluded	(of a substance) taken into and retained in another substance. <i>An occluded artery.</i>
seal	Close with or as if with a seal. <i>The pine boarding should be sealed with polyurethane.</i>
<u>sealed</u>	Undisclosed for the time being. <i>A sealed driveway.</i>
<u>shut</u>	Prevent from entering shut out. <i>The trees were shutting out all sunlight.</i>
stamp	A block for crushing ore in a stamp mill. <i>More men of his stamp are needed.</i>
<u>static</u>	Relating to statics. <i>She felt the tingle of static from the cat s fur.</i>
<u>stationary</u>	Not changing in quantity or condition. <i>Stationary machinery.</i>
<u>stiff</u>	In a stiff manner. <i>I was bored stiff with my project.</i>
<u>stuck</u>	Baffled. <i>This problem has me completely stuck.</i>
stuffy	(of a place) lacking fresh air or ventilation. <i>Inhaling vapour from a bowl of hot water may help to clear a stuffy nose.</i>
tight	Pulled or drawn tight. <i>She released her tight hold on the dog.</i>
unmoving	Not stirring any emotion. <i>This must be the most unmoving performance of Verdi s opera ever recorded.</i>
unopened	Not yet opened or unsealed. <i>Unopened mail.</i>
