Definitions of "Closing" as a noun

- *Termination of operations.*
- *A concluding action.*
- *The act of closing something.*
- *Approaching a particular destination; a coming closer; a narrowing of a gap.*
- *The last section of a communication.*



Synonyms of "Closing" as a noun (12 Words)

close	The temporal end; the concluding time. <i>They were playing better at the close of the season.</i>
closedown	Termination of operations.
<u>closure</u>	Something settled or resolved; the outcome of decision making. <i>Road closures.</i>
completion	A concluding action. <i>The risk stays with the seller until completion.</i>
conclusion	A position or opinion or judgment reached after consideration. <i>He drew his conclusions quickly.</i>
culmination	A heavenly body's highest celestial point above an observer's horizon. <i>The deal marked the culmination of years of negotiation.</i>
end	The state of affairs that a plan is intended to achieve and that when achieved terminates behavior intended to achieve it. <i>You will go to church and there s an end of it.</i>

ending	The end of a word a suffix or inflectional ending or final morpheme. <i>The student has to choose the right plural endings.</i>
mop up	Cleaning implement consisting of absorbent material fastened to a handle; for cleaning floors.
shutdown	A closure of a factory or system, typically a temporary closure due to a fault or for maintenance. <i>The build up was pushing the reactor towards shutdown.</i>
shutting	The act of closing something.
windup	A concluding action.

- *The ship's rapid rate of closing gave them little time to avoid a collision.*

climactic	Consisting of or causing a climax. <i>The film s climactic scenes.</i>
closedown	Termination of operations.
completion	The state of being finished. <i>The risk stays with the seller until completion.</i>
conclusion	A judgement or decision reached by reasoning. <i>Each research group came to a similar conclusion.</i>
<u>culminate</u>	Rise to, or form, a summit. <i>The meeting culminated in a tearful embrace.</i>
culmination	The decisive moment in a novel or play. <i>Their achievements stand as a culmination of centuries of development.</i>
<u>decease</u>	Die. <i>He deceased at his palace of Croydon.</i>
<u>demise</u>	Conveyance or transfer of property or a title by will or lease. <i>The demised property.</i>

dying	In or associated with the process of passing from life or ceasing to be. <i>The making of valves is a dying art.</i>
end	Bring to an end or halt. <i>The ends justify the means.</i>
epilogue	A section or speech at the end of a book or play that serves as a comment on or a conclusion to what has happened. <i>A disastrous epilogue to the rest of his career.</i>
eventually	After an unspecified period of time or an especially long delay. <i>Eventually after midnight I arrived at the hotel.</i>
extremity	An extreme condition or state (especially of adversity or disease). <i>The extremity of despair.</i>
final	The final match between the winners of all previous matches in an elimination tournament. <i>The final answer.</i>
finale	The closing section of a musical composition. <i>The festival ends with a grand finale.</i>
finalize	Complete or agree on a finished and definitive version of. <i>Let s finalize the proposal.</i>
finally	After an unspecified period of time or an especially long delay. <i>He finally arrived to join us.</i>
fingertip	The tip of a finger. <i>Police made a fingertip search of the area.</i>
finis	The end (printed at the end of a book or shown at the end of a film). <i>The market was up at the finis.</i>
finish	The act of finishing. <i>The market was up at the finish.</i>
hemline	The line formed by the lower edge of a skirt or coat. <i>Modest dress means that hemlines must be below the knee.</i>
last	The last mention or sight of someone or something. <i>Whether they were accomplices in the last degree or a lesser one was to be determined individually.</i>
moribund	Being on the point of death; breathing your last. <i>A moribund patient.</i>
peak	The narrow part of a ship's hold at the bow or stern. <i>Tatters of fog clung to the peak of the mountain.</i>
peroration	(rhetoric) the concluding section of an oration. <i>He again invoked the theme in an emotional peroration.</i>

shutdown	<p>A closure of a factory or system, typically a temporary closure due to a fault or for maintenance.</p> <p><i>Engines should be allowed to cool down between a shutdown and the next start.</i></p>
terminate	<p>Terminate the employment of discharge from an office or position.</p> <p><i>He was advised to terminate the contract.</i></p>
termination	<p>An act of dismissing someone from employment.</p> <p><i>A good result and a happy termination.</i></p>
windup	<p>Operated by a mechanism.</p> <p><i>Windup toys.</i></p>
