<b>power</b>	A state powerful enough to influence events throughout the world. <i>The <b>power</b> of speech.</i>
<b>pull</b>	An act of pulling something. <i>He grabbed the <b>pull</b> and opened the drawer.</i>
<b>punch</b>	An iced mixed drink usually containing alcohol and prepared for multiple servings normally served in a punch bowl. <i>Photos give their arguments an extra visual <b>punch</b>.</i>
<b>say</b>	An opportunity to influence developments and policy. <i>She let him have his <b>say</b>.</i>
<b>slap</b>	A sound made or as if made by a slap. <i>I put a bit of <b>slap</b> on my face and we were ready to go.</i>
<b>slug</b>	A missile for an airgun. <i>He took a <b>slug</b> of hard liquor.</i>
<b>smack</b>	The act of smacking something a blow delivered with an open hand. <i>She gave Mark a <b>smack</b> across the face.</i>
<b>spank</b>	A slap or series of slaps with one's open hand or a flat object. <i>When his father caught him he got a <b>spank</b>.</i>
<b>spanking</b>	An act of slapping, especially on the buttocks as a punishment for children. <i>You deserve a good <b>spanking</b> like any spoiled child.</i>
<b>sway</b>	Rule; control. <i>The country was under the <b>sway</b> of rival warlords.</i>
<b>tap</b>	A small metal plate that attaches to the toe or heel of a shoe as in tap dancing. <i>She turned the cold <b>tap</b> on.</i>
<b>thump</b>	A heavy dull sound (as made by impact of heavy objects). <i>The bag landed on the floor with a <b>thump</b>.</i>
<b>weight</b>	A system of units used to express the weight of something. <i>She misjudged the <b>weight</b> of the book and dropped it.</i>

<b>bang</b>	Leap jerk bang. <i>The old man <b>banged</b> around the house.</i>
<b>batter</b>	Strike repeatedly with hard blows. <i>He was <b>battered</b> at times by critics.</i>
<b>beat</b>	Shape by beating. <i>The victims were <b>beaten</b> to death with baseball bats.</i>
<b>botch</b>	Make a mess of, destroy or ruin. <i>He was accused of <b>botching</b> the job.</i>

<b>hit</b>	Score a run or point by hitting a ball with a bat racket stick etc. <i>His career <b>hit</b> rock bottom.</i>
<b>knock</b>	Knock against with force or violence. <i>He's younger than his brother <b>knocking</b> seventy.</i>
<b>patch</b>	Mend or strengthen fabric or clothing with a patch. <i>The amblyopia may be treated by <b>patching</b> the good eye.</i>



<b>patch up</b>	Provide with a patch; also used metaphorically.
<b>piece together</b>	Eat intermittently; take small bites of.
<b>pound</b>	Place or shut up in a pound. <i>The salesman <b>pounded</b> the door knocker.</i>
<b>pummel</b>	Strike repeatedly with the fists. <i>He felt like a boxer who had been <b>pummelled</b> mercilessly against the ropes.</i>
<b>punch</b>	Drive forcibly as if by a punch. <i>He <b>punched</b> her in the face and ran off.</i>
<b>put back together</b>	Estimate.
<b>rap</b>	Strike a hard surface with a series of rapid audible blows especially in order to attract attention. <i>We could be here all night <b>rapping</b> about spiritualism.</i>
<b>repair</b>	Give new life or energy to. <i><b>Repair</b> an oversight.</i>
<b>restore</b>	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken. <i>The week at the spa <b>restored</b> me.</i>
<b>sew</b>	Make a garment by sewing. <i>I don't even <b>sew</b> very well.</i>
<b>sew up</b>	Fasten by sewing; do needlework.
<b>slap</b>	Hit against or into something with the sound of something being slapped. <i>He <b>slapped</b> a copy of the paper on to her desk.</i>
<b>smack</b>	Smash, drive, or put forcefully into or on to something. <i>The four postilions <b>smacked</b> their whips in concert.</i>
<b>spank</b>	Give a spanking to subject to a spanking. <i>She was <b>spanked</b> for spilling ink on the carpet.</i>
<b>stitch</b>	Make mend or join something with stitches. <i>They <b>stitched</b> the cut on her face.</i>
<b>strike</b>	Undertake strike action against an employer. <i>You have to <b>strike</b> a happy medium.</i>
<b>thrash</b>	Give a thrashing to beat hard. <i>I wrench the steering wheel back and <b>thrash</b> on up the hill.</i>
<b>thump</b>	Hit hard with the hand, fist, or some heavy instrument. <i>The Band of the Royal Marines was <b>thumping</b> out a selection from Oklahoma.</i>

<b>vamp</b>	Provide a shoe with a new vamp. <i>The production values have been <b>vamped</b> up.</i>
<b>vamp up</b>	Raise.

<b><u>invoke</u></b>	Summon into action or bring into existence, often as if by magic. <i>He <b>invoked</b> the law that would save him.</i>
<b><u>jolt</u></b>	Move with sudden lurches. <i>That information gave her a severe <b>jolt</b>.</i>
<b>leverage</b>	Mechanical advantage gained by leverage. <i>Use a metal bar to increase the <b>leverage</b>.</i>
<b>mighty</b>	Very; to a great degree. <i>A <b>mighty</b> 450.</i>
<b>militate</b>	(of a fact or circumstance) be a powerful or conclusive factor in preventing. <i>Politeness <b>militated</b> against this opinion being expressed.</i>
<b>moderating</b>	Lessening in intensity or strength.
<b>potentiate</b>	Increase the power, effect, or likelihood of (something, especially a drug or physiological reaction). <i><b>Potentiate</b> the drug.</i>
<b>power</b>	Of a government or government official holding an office means being in power. <i>Danger heightened his <b>powers</b> of discrimination.</i>
<b>predispose</b>	Make susceptible. <i>This illness <b>predisposes</b> you to gain weight.</i>
<b>punch</b>	An iced mixed drink usually containing alcohol and prepared for multiple servings normally served in a punch bowl. <i>He has the <b>punch</b> to knock out anyone in his division.</i>
<b><u>push</u></b>	An act of pushing someone or something in order to move them away from oneself. <i>The Dean is <b>pushing</b> for his favorite candidate.</i>
<b>pushing</b>	The act of applying force in order to move something away. <i>The <b>pushing</b> is good exercise.</i>
<b>repercussion</b>	An unintended consequence of an event or action, especially an unwelcome one. <i>The move would have grave <b>repercussions</b> for the entire region.</i>
<b>suggestible</b>	Open to suggestion; easily swayed. <i><b>Suggestible</b> young minds.</i>
