- *A group of cases of a disease, especially an infectious disease or type of cancer, that occur close together in time or space.*
- *A group of consonants pronounced in immediate succession, as str in strong.*
- *A group of stars or galaxies forming a relatively close association.*
- *A grouping of a number of similar things.*
- *A natural subgroup of a population, used for statistical sampling or analysis.*

band	Any of several groups into which school pupils of the same age are divided on the basis of broadly similar ability. <i>The black and yellow banding of bees and wasps.</i>
body	A woman's close fitting stretch garment for the upper body fastening at the crotch. <i>A motherly body.</i>
bunch	A grouping of a number of similar things. <i>The bluesy style that earned him a bunch of 70s hits.</i>
bundle	A collection of things or quantity of material tied or wrapped up together. <i>A bundle of 15 desktop utilities.</i>
clump	A thick extra sole on a boot or shoe. <i>They sat on the wall in clumps of two and three.</i>

collection	A sum of money raised during a church or charity collection. <i>The collection of data.</i>
congregation	(in some universities) a general assembly of resident senior members. <i>Drought conditions lead to the congregation of animals around watering points.</i>
crowd	The mass or multitude of ordinary people. <i>He'd become just another face in the crowd.</i>
flock	An orderly crowd. <i>Thomas addressed his flock.</i>
gathering	The act of gathering something. <i>A family gathering.</i>
group	A number of people or things that are located, gathered, or classed together. <i>The bulbs should be planted in groups.</i>
huddle	A disorganized and densely packed crowd. <i>A huddle of frightened women.</i>
knot	A length marked by knots on a log line as a measure of speed. <i>Her stomach was in knots as she unlocked the door.</i>
mass	Any of the main portions in a painting or drawing that each have some unity in colour, lighting, or some other quality. <i>The mass of the people think that the problems are caused by government inefficiency.</i>

nest

A structure or place made or chosen by a bird for laying eggs and sheltering its young.

A **nest** of tables.

pack

A convenient package or parcel as of cigarettes or film.

A **pack** of wolves will encircle an ailing prey.

party

An occasion on which people can assemble for social interaction and entertainment.

They organized a **party** to search for food.

swarm

A group of many things in the air or on the ground.

A **swarm** of insects obscured the light.

throng

A large, densely packed crowd of people or animals.

A **throng** of birds.

troupe

A group of dancers, actors, or other entertainers who tour to different venues.

A **troupe** of singers.

- *(of data points) have similar numerical values.*
- *Come together as in a cluster or flock.*
- *Gather or cause to gather into a cluster.*
- *Form a cluster or clusters.*



Synonyms of "Cluster" as a verb (11 Words)

assemble

Translate (a program) from a higher-level programming language into machine code.

*The males **assemble** and hang by their front legs within a yard or two of the female.*

<u>bunch</u>	Form into a bunch. <i>The bedclothes had bunched up around his waist.</i>
bundle	Make into a bundle. <i>They were bundled up in thick sweaters.</i>
clump	Form a clump or clumps. <i>The particles tend to clump together.</i>
collect	Gather or collect. <i>By all best conjectures I collect Thou art to be my fatal enemy.</i>
come together	Come to one's mind; suggest itself.
<u>congregate</u>	Gather into a crowd or mass. <i>The crowds congregated in front of the Vatican on Christmas Eve.</i>
constellate	Come together as in a cluster or flock. <i>Their stories were never constellated.</i>
<u>flock</u>	Come together as in a cluster or flock. <i>Tourists flocked to the shrine where the statue was said to have shed tears.</i>
<u>gather</u>	Collect or gather. <i>She gathered her shawl around her shoulders.</i>
group	Form a group or groups. <i>Can you group these shapes together.</i>



Usage Examples of "Cluster" as a verb

- *There were dozens of people clustered around me.*
- *The rich are likely to cluster together in suburbs.*
- *The children clustered round her skirts.*
- *Students tended to have marks clustering around 70 per cent.*



Associations of "Cluster" (30 Words)

accrete	Grow or become attached by accretion. <i>The gas will cool and then accrete to the galaxy's core.</i>
accumulate	Collect or gather. <i>Her goal was to accumulate a huge fortune.</i>
accumulation	The acquisition or gradual gathering of something. <i>The accumulation of paperwork on her desk.</i>
agglomeration	A jumbled collection or mass. <i>The arts centre is an agglomeration of theatres, galleries, shops, restaurants and bars.</i>
amass	Gather together or accumulate (a large amount or number of material or things) over a period of time. <i>She is amassing a lot of data for her thesis.</i>

<u>assemble</u>	Get people together. <i>He assembled the surviving members of the group for a tour.</i>
batch	Batch together assemble or process as a batch. <i>A batch of letters.</i>
<u>bunch</u>	Form into a bunch. <i>She bunched her fingers into a fist.</i>
bundle	Make into a bundle. <i>He stopped occasionally in the villages to dance at country frolics and bundle with the lasses.</i>
caisson	A chest to hold ammunition.
collect	Gather or collect. <i>She returned to her room to collect her thoughts.</i>
collection	A sum of money raised during a church or charity collection. <i>A record collection.</i>
compost	Treat soil with compost. <i>Peat free composts.</i>
covey	A small flock of birds, especially partridge. <i>Coveys of actors rushed through the rooms.</i>
cumulate	An igneous rock formed by gravitational settling of particles in a magma. <i>The systems cumulate data over a period of years.</i>
<u>flock</u>	Of birds congregate in a flock. <i>A flock of gulls.</i>
<u>gather</u>	Collect or gather. <i>Gather the close family members.</i>
<u>heap</u>	Form a heap. <i>Heaped up in one corner was a pile of junk.</i>
<u>jam</u>	A hold obtained by jamming a part of the body such as a hand or foot into a crack in the rock. <i>The mechanism jammed.</i>
load	Fill or place a load on. <i>When we came to the quay the ship was still loading.</i>
nucleate	Form a nucleus. <i>Nucleated cells.</i>
<u>overload</u>	Become overloaded. <i>The staff are heavily overloaded with casework.</i>

<u>pack</u>	A quantity of fish fruit or other foods packed or canned in a particular season. <i>Pack a jury.</i>
packet	Make up into or wrap up in a packet. <i>Packeted fruit pies.</i>
pile	Place or lay as if in a pile. <i>She piled all the groceries on the counter.</i>
sheaf	A package of several things tied together for carrying or storing. <i>He waved a sheaf of papers in the air.</i>
<u>stack</u>	Arrange in stacks. <i>I know the cards are stacked.</i>
<u>stacked</u>	(of a stream of data) stored in such a way that the most recently stored item is the first to be retrieved. <i>The stacked shelves.</i>
ton	A unit of weight or volume of sea cargo equal to a metric ton 1 000 kg or 40 cu ft. <i>All of a sudden I had tons of friends.</i>
