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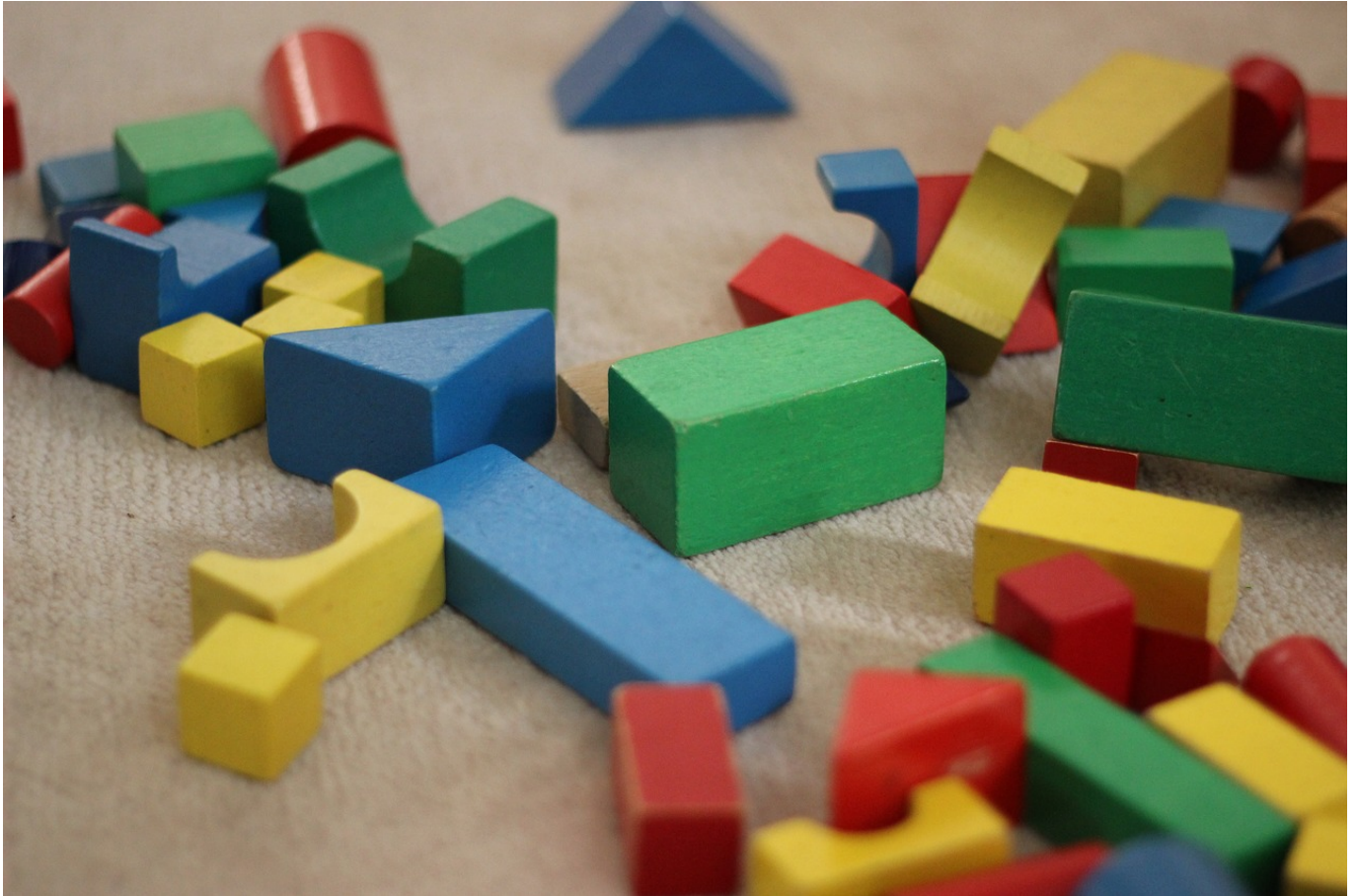

<b>chaos</b>	The first created being, from which came the primeval deities Gaia, Tartarus, Erebus, and Nyx. <i>Snow caused <b>chaos</b> in the region.</i>
<b>confusion</b>	A mistake that results from taking one thing to be another. <i>There is some <b>confusion</b> between unlawful and illegal.</i>
<b><u>disarray</u></b>	A state of disorganization or untidiness. <i>His plans have been thrown into <b>disarray</b>.</i>
<b>disorder</b>	A condition in which things are not in their expected places. <i>The doctor prescribed some medicine for the <b>disorder</b>.</i>
<b>disorderliness</b>	Untidiness (especially of clothing and appearance).
<b>farrago</b>	A motley assortment of things. <i>A <b>farrago</b> of fact and myth about Abraham Lincoln.</i>
<b>fuddle</b>	A state of confusion or intoxication. <i>Through the <b>fuddle</b> of wine he heard some of the conversation.</i>

<b>heap</b>	A car that is old and unreliable. <i>We have <b>heaps</b> of room.</i>
<b>hodgepodge</b>	A confused mixture; a hotchpotch. <i>Rob s living room was a <b>hodgepodge</b> of modern furniture and antiques.</i>
<b>hotchpotch</b>	A motley assortment of things. <i>A <b>hotchpotch</b> of uncoordinated services.</i>
<b>jumble</b>	Articles collected for a jumble sale. <i>We are collecting <b>jumble</b> for charity.</i>
<b>litter</b>	Conveyance consisting of a chair or bed carried on two poles by bearers. <i>A plastic <b>litter</b> tray.</i>
<b>mare's nest</b>	A structure in which animals lay eggs or give birth to their young.
<b>medley</b>	A varied mixture of people or things. <i>The 400 m individual <b>medley</b>.</i>
<b>mess</b>	A meal eaten in a mess hall by service personnel. <i>Big time outfits that do a <b>mess</b> of printing.</i>
<b>mishmash</b>	A confused mixture. <i>A <b>mishmash</b> of outmoded ideas.</i>
<b>muddle</b>	A confused multitude of things. <i>A bureaucratic <b>muddle</b>.</i>
<b>smother</b>	A stifling cloud of smoke. <i>All this vanished in a <b>smother</b> of foam.</i>
<b>tangle</b>	A twisted and tangled mass that is highly interwoven. <i>The home team s defence got into an awful <b>tangle</b>.</i>
<b>untidiness</b>	The condition of being untidy.
<b>welter</b>	A large number of items in no order; a confused mass. <i>There s such a <b>welter</b> of conflicting rules.</i>

- *The room was in a clutter of smelly untidiness.*

### Definitions of "Clutter" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "clutter" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Cover or fill (something) with an untidy collection of things.*
- *Fill a space in a disorderly way.*



## Synonyms of "Clutter" as a verb (8 Words)

<b>clutter up</b>	Fill a space in a disorderly way.
<b>disarrange</b>	Disturb the arrangement of. <i>My son <b>disarranged</b> the papers on my desk.</i>
<b>jumble</b>	Be all mixed up or jumbled together. <i>A drawer full of letters <b>jumbled</b> together.</i>
<b>litter</b>	Give birth to a litter of animals. <i>Clothes and newspapers <b>littered</b> the floor.</i>
<b>make a mess of</b>	Head into a specified direction.
<b>make untidy</b>	Be suitable for.
<b>mess up</b>	Make a mess of or create disorder in.
<b>throw into disorder</b>	Cause to go on or to be engaged or set in operation.

- *The room was cluttered with his bric-a-brac.*



## Associations of "Clutter" (30 Words)

- addle** Mix up or confuse.  
*Being in love must have **addled** your brain.*
- champ** (of a horse) make a noisy biting or chewing action.  
*He **champed** on his sandwich.*
- chaos** (physics) a dynamical system that is extremely sensitive to its initial conditions.  
*Snow caused **chaos** in the region.*
- chaotic** Of or relating to a sensitive dependence on initial conditions.  
*The political situation was **chaotic**.*
- choke** A knob which controls the choke in a carburettor.  
*He was **choked** with fury.*



<b>confuse</b>	Assemble without order or sense. <i>Purchasers might <b>confuse</b> the two products.</i>
<b>crowding</b>	A situation in which people or things are crowded together. <i>He didn't like the <b>crowding</b> on the beach.</i>
<b>dirt</b>	Not leveled or drained; unsuitable for all year travel. <i>Jo wiped the <b>dirt</b> off her face.</i>
<b>disheveled</b>	In disarray; extremely disorderly. <i>Her clothing was <b>disheveled</b>.</i>
<b>disorder</b>	Bring disorder to. <i>An improved understanding of mental <b>disorder</b>.</i>
<b>disorderly</b>	Lacking organization; untidy. <i>His life was as <b>disorderly</b> as ever.</i>
<b><u>drown</u></b>	Deliberately kill a person or animal by drowning. <i>He immediately <b>drowned</b> four of the dogs.</i>
<b>jumble</b>	Articles collected for a jumble sale. <i>She <b>jumbles</b> the words when she is supposed to write a sentence.</i>
<b>lousy</b>	Very poor or bad. <i><b>Lousy</b> weather.</i>
<b>mess</b>	Have one's meals with a particular person especially as a member of an armed force's mess. <i>They had some problems with dogs <b>messing</b> in the store.</i>
<b><u>messy</u></b>	Untidy or dirty. <i>Stripping wallpaper can be a <b>messy</b> time consuming job.</i>
<b>muddle</b>	A mistake arising from or resulting in confusion. <i>She was able to cut through confusion and <b>muddle</b>.</i>
<b>muffle</b>	A receptacle in a furnace or kiln in which things can be heated without contact with combustion products. <i>Everyone was <b>muffled</b> up in coats and scarves.</i>
<b>rumple</b>	Become wrinkled or crumpled or creased. <i>Careful you'll <b>rumple</b> my outfit.</i>
<b>sloven</b>	A person who is habitually untidy or careless.
<b><u>smother</u></b>	Suppress in order to conceal or hide. <i><b>Smother</b> a yawn.</i>
<b><u>stifle</u></b>	Suppress in order to conceal or hide. <i>She <b>stifled</b> a giggle.</i>
<b>strangle</b>	Struggle for breath; have insufficient oxygen intake. <i>The victim was <b>strangled</b> with a scarf.</i>

- suffocate** Be asphyxiated; die from lack of oxygen.  
*The child **suffocated** herself with a plastic bag that the parents had left on the floor.*
- unkempt** Not neatly combed.  
*Native vistas and **unkempt** rambling paths.*
- untidy** Not neat and tidy.  
*Careless and **untidy** in her personal habits.*
- wallow** A depression containing mud or shallow water formed by the wallowing of large mammals.  
*He had been **wallowing** in self pity.*
- welter** A confused multitude of things.  
*The streams foam and **welter**.*
