Officially join or become attached to an organization.
*The two colleges **affiliated**.*

amalgamate

To bring or combine together or with something else.
*He **amalgamated** his company with another.*

blend

Blend or harmonize.
*Add the grated cheese and **blend** well.*

combine	Combine so as to form a whole mix. Combine resources.
commingle	Mix; blend. His book commingles sarcasm and sadness.
conflate	Combine (two or more sets of information, texts, ideas, etc.) into one. The urban crisis conflates a number of different economic political and social issues.
consolidate	Make firm or secure; strengthen. The companies consolidated .
converge	Move or draw together at a certain location. A pair of lines of longitude are parallel at the equator but converge toward the poles.
flux	Treat a metal object with a flux to promote melting.
fuse	Of an electrical appliance stop working when a fuse melts. Intermarriage had fused the families into a large unit.
homogenize	Become homogeneous or similar, as by mixing. The two liquids homogenized in the blender.
immix	Mix together different elements.
integrate	Become one become integrated. The protest forced the bus companies to integrate the buses.
intermingle	Mix or mingle together. We don't intermingle much.
join together	Be or become joined or united or linked.
knit	Make textiles by knitting. Marcus knitted his brows.
knit together	Make (textiles) by knitting.
link up	Link with or as with a yoke.
meld	Mix together different elements. The nylon bristles shrivel and meld together.
merge	Blend or cause to blend gradually into something else so as to become indistinguishable from it. The merchant bank merged with another broker.
mingle	To bring or combine together or with something else. Resourcefully he mingled music and dance.
mix	Mix together different elements. Music was blaring and there was a DJ in the corner mixing and scratching.

synthesize	Combine (a number of things) into a coherent whole. <i>His operas synthesize music and drama in perfect harmony.</i>
unite	Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief. <i>Lady Midlothian united herself to a man of bad character.</i>

Usage Examples of "Coalesce" as a verb

- *His idea served to coalesce all that happened into one connected whole.*
- *The puddles had coalesced into shallow streams.*

add	Put in an additional element ingredient etc. <i>We would like to add our congratulations.</i>
agglomerate	A volcanic rock consisting of large fragments bonded together. <i>These small particles soon agglomerate together.</i>
<u>ally</u>	A state formally cooperating with another for a military or other purpose. <i>He s a good ally in fight.</i>
amalgamate	Combine or unite to form one organization or structure. <i>He amalgamated his company with another.</i>
<u>annex</u>	Take (territory) as if by conquest. <i>Extreme anointing hath neither ordinance of God to be grounded on nor promise of grace annexed.</i>
coalesced	Joined together into a whole.
coalescing	Growing together, fusing.
coeducation	Education of men and women in the same institutions.
<u>collective</u>	A collective farm. <i>Collective farms.</i>
combine	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>One of the world s biggest food and personal products combines.</i>
combined	Made or joined or united into one.
commingle	Mix; blend. <i>The part of the brain where the senses commingle.</i>
<u>consolidate</u>	Unite into one. <i>Consolidate one s gains.</i>
converge	(of lines) tend to meet at a point. <i>The lines converge at this point.</i>

federate	Relating to a federated state or organization. <i>He resisted British attempts to federate Barbados with neighbouring islands.</i>
incorporate	Make into a whole or make part of a whole. <i>She incorporated his suggestions into her proposal.</i>
incorporation	The inclusion of something as part of a whole. <i>The City Council opposed all new incorporations.</i>
integrate	Become one become integrated. <i>The stone will blend with the environment and integrate into the landscape.</i>
integrated	Resembling a living organism in organization or development. <i>Integrated education.</i>
integration	The finding of an integral or integrals. <i>Integration is the best hope for both black and white Americans.</i>
joint	Fasten with a joint. <i>He rolled a joint.</i>
<u>meld</u>	A thing formed by melding a combination. <i>Australia's winemakers have melded modern science with traditional art.</i>
<u>merge</u>	Mix together different elements. <i>He placed a sheet of paper over the fresh paint to merge the colours.</i>
reunify	Unify again, as of a country. <i>Will Korea reunify.</i>
synthesis	The tendency in a language to use inflected forms rather than word order to express grammatical structure. <i>The ideology represented a synthesis of certain ideas.</i>
<u>total</u>	Determine the sum of. <i>He almost totalled the car.</i>
<u>unify</u>	Bring together for a common purpose or action or ideology or in a shared situation. <i>Opposition groups struggling to unify around the goal of replacing the regime.</i>
unite	Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief. <i>Lady Midlothian united herself to a man of bad character.</i>
<u>united</u>	Of or relating to two people who are married to each other. <i>Women acting together in a united way.</i>
weld	Forge an article by welding. <i>Cross curricular themes would weld the curriculum together.</i>
