Definitions of "Coalition" as a noun

- *The union of diverse things into one body or form or group; the growing together of parts.*
- *The state of being combined into one body.*
- *An organization of people (or countries) involved in a pact or treaty.*
- *A temporary alliance for combined action, especially of political parties forming a government.*

- affiliation** The act of becoming formally connected or joined.
*His political **affiliations**.*
- alignment** The route or course of a railway or road.
*The uncertain nature of political **alignments**.*
- alinement** An organization of people (or countries) involved in a pact or treaty.
- alliance** The act of forming an alliance or confederation.
*Divisions within the **alliance**.*
- bloc** A group of countries in special alliance.
*The Soviet **bloc**.*
- caucus** An informal group composed of legislators who have shared concerns or interests.
*Mr Kerry attended the morning **caucus** in the Old Senate Chamber where his fellow Democrats selected the new minority leadership.*

coalescence	The joining or merging of elements to form one mass or whole. <i>The lack of coalescence among fields of science.</i>
coalescency	The union of diverse things into one body or form or group; the growing together of parts.
concretion	A hard lump produced by the concretion of mineral salts found in hollow organs or ducts of the body. <i>Nodular concretions of siderite growing within the sediments.</i>
conglutination	Healing process involving the growing together of the edges of a wound or the growing together of broken bones.
<u>fusion</u>	Correction of an unstable part of the spine by joining two or more vertebrae; usually done surgically but sometimes done by traction or immobilization. <i>Fusion cuisine.</i>
partnership	The number of runs added by a pair of batsmen before one of them is dismissed or the innings ends. <i>An increase in partnerships with housing associations.</i>
<u>union</u>	A trade union. <i>Let C be the union of the sets A and B.</i>



Usage Examples of "Coalition" as a noun

Associations of "Coalition" (30 Words)

- alliance** A formal agreement establishing an association or alliance between nations or other groups to achieve a particular aim.
*Divisions within the **alliance**.*
- ally** Become an ally or associate as by a treaty or marriage.
*He was forced to dismiss his closest political **ally**.*
- amalgamate** Joined together into a whole.
*Numerous small British railway companies **amalgamated**.*
- annex** Take (territory) as if by conquest.

- association** A connection or cooperative link between people or organizations.

<u>coalesce</u>	Come together to form one mass or whole. <i>The puddles had coalesced into shallow streams.</i>
coalescence	The union of diverse things into one body or form or group; the growing together of parts. <i>A sophisticated coalescence of melodies and harmonies.</i>
coalescing	Growing together, fusing.
combine	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>Oxygen and hydrogen do not combine at room temperatures.</i>
combined	Made or joined or united into one.
commingle	Mix or blend. <i>His book commingles sarcasm and sadness.</i>
confederacy	A secret agreement between two or more people to perform an unlawful act. <i>The Yakuza is a secret confederacy of criminal fraternities.</i>
<u>confederation</u>	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>Canada became a confederation in 1867.</i>
<u>consolidate</u>	Combine (separate pieces of legislation) into a single legislative act. <i>The town and county schools are being consolidated.</i>
consolidation	The action or process of making something stronger or more solid. <i>The permanent consolidation of peace.</i>
<u>differentiation</u>	The process by which cells, tissue, and organs acquire specialized features, especially during embryonic development. <i>Packaging can be a source of product differentiation.</i>
<u>faction</u>	A small organized dissenting group within a larger one, especially in politics. <i>A council increasingly split by faction.</i>
federate	Relating to a federated state or organization. <i>He resisted British attempts to federate Barbados with neighbouring islands.</i>
<u>fusion</u>	An occurrence that involves the production of a union. <i>The film showed a perfect fusion of image and sound.</i>
incorporation	The process of constituting a company, city, or other organization as a legal corporation. <i>The software facilitates the incorporation of active learning in the course.</i>
integrate	Become one become integrated. <i>A fully equipped laboratory is being integrated into the development.</i>

integration	The finding of an integral or integrals. <i>Integration is the best hope for both black and white Americans.</i>
<u>merge</u>	Join or combine. <i>He crouched low and endeavoured to merge into the darkness of the forest.</i>
merger	The combination of two or more commercial companies. <i>A merger between two supermarket chains.</i>
reunify	Unify again, as of a country. <i>Will Korea reunify.</i>
unification	An occurrence that involves the production of a union. <i>The costs of German unification.</i>
<u>unify</u>	Make or become united, uniform, or whole. <i>The government hoped to centralize and unify the nation.</i>
<u>union</u>	The operation of forming a union. <i>There is strength in union.</i>
unite	Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief. <i>The Democratic Party platform united several splinter groups.</i>
<u>united</u>	Of or relating to two people who are married to each other. <i>Presented a united front.</i>
