### Definitions of "Coalition" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “coalition” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The union of diverse things into one body or form or group; the growing together of parts.*
- *The state of being combined into one body.*
- *An organization of people (or countries) involved in a pact or treaty.*
- *A temporary alliance for combined action, especially of political parties forming a government.*



## Synonyms of "Coalition" as a noun (13 Words)

<b>affiliation</b>	The act of becoming formally connected or joined. <i>His political <b>affiliations</b>.</i>
<b><u>alignment</u></b>	The route or course of a railway or road. <i>The uncertain nature of political <b>alignments</b>.</i>
<b>alinement</b>	An organization of people (or countries) involved in a pact or treaty.
<b>alliance</b>	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>Divisions within the <b>alliance</b>.</i>
<b>bloc</b>	A group of countries in special alliance. <i>The Soviet <b>bloc</b>.</i>
<b>caucus</b>	An informal group composed of legislators who have shared concerns or interests. <i>Mr Kerry attended the morning <b>caucus</b> in the Old Senate Chamber where his fellow Democrats selected the new minority leadership.</i>

<b>coalescence</b>	The joining or merging of elements to form one mass or whole. <i>The lack of <b>coalescence</b> among fields of science.</i>
<b>coalescency</b>	The union of diverse things into one body or form or group; the growing together of parts.
<b>concretion</b>	A hard lump produced by the concretion of mineral salts found in hollow organs or ducts of the body. <i>Nodular <b>concretions</b> of siderite growing within the sediments.</i>
<b>conglutination</b>	Healing process involving the growing together of the edges of a wound or the growing together of broken bones.
<u><b>fusion</b></u>	Correction of an unstable part of the spine by joining two or more vertebrae; usually done surgically but sometimes done by traction or immobilization. <i><b>Fusion</b> cuisine.</i>
<b>partnership</b>	The number of runs added by a pair of batsmen before one of them is dismissed or the innings ends. <i>An increase in <b>partnerships</b> with housing associations.</i>
<u><b>union</b></u>	A trade union. <i>Let C be the <b>union</b> of the sets A and B.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Coalition" as a noun

- *A coalition between Liberals and Conservatives.*
- *They had a taste of government in coalition with the Social Democrats.*



## Associations of "Coalition" (30 Words)

<b>alliance</b>	A formal agreement establishing an association or alliance between nations or other groups to achieve a particular aim. <i>Divisions within the <b>alliance</b>.</i>
<b><u>ally</u></b>	Become an ally or associate as by a treaty or marriage. <i>He was forced to dismiss his closest political <b>ally</b>.</i>
<b>amalgamate</b>	Joined together into a whole. <i>Numerous small British railway companies <b>amalgamated</b>.</i>
<b><u>annex</u></b>	Take (territory) as if by conquest. <i>The school s one storey wooden <b>annex</b>.</i>
<b>association</b>	A connection or cooperative link between people or organizations. <i>There s nothing new in the <b>association</b> of fasting with spirituality.</i>

<b><u>coalesce</u></b>	Come together to form one mass or whole. <i>The puddles had <b>coalesced</b> into shallow streams.</i>
<b>coalescence</b>	The union of diverse things into one body or form or group; the growing together of parts. <i>A sophisticated <b>coalescence</b> of melodies and harmonies.</i>
<b>coalescing</b>	Growing together, fusing.
<b>combine</b>	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>Oxygen and hydrogen do not <b>combine</b> at room temperatures.</i>
<b>combined</b>	Made or joined or united into one.
<b>commingle</b>	Mix or blend. <i>His book <b>commingles</b> sarcasm and sadness.</i>
<b>confederacy</b>	A secret agreement between two or more people to perform an unlawful act. <i>The Yakuza is a secret <b>confederacy</b> of criminal fraternities.</i>
<b><u>confederation</u></b>	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>Canada became a <b>confederation</b> in 1867.</i>
<b><u>consolidate</u></b>	Combine (separate pieces of legislation) into a single legislative act. <i>The town and county schools are being <b>consolidated</b>.</i>
<b>consolidation</b>	The action or process of making something stronger or more solid. <i>The permanent <b>consolidation</b> of peace.</i>
<b><u>differentiation</u></b>	The process by which cells, tissue, and organs acquire specialized features, especially during embryonic development. <i>Packaging can be a source of product <b>differentiation</b>.</i>
<b><u>faction</u></b>	A small organized dissenting group within a larger one, especially in politics. <i>A council increasingly split by <b>faction</b>.</i>
<b>federate</b>	Relating to a federated state or organization. <i>He resisted British attempts to <b>federate</b> Barbados with neighbouring islands.</i>
<b><u>fusion</u></b>	An occurrence that involves the production of a union. <i>The film showed a perfect <b>fusion</b> of image and sound.</i>
<b>incorporation</b>	The process of constituting a company, city, or other organization as a legal corporation. <i>The software facilitates the <b>incorporation</b> of active learning in the course.</i>
<b>integrate</b>	Become one become integrated. <i>A fully equipped laboratory is being <b>integrated</b> into the development.</i>

<b>integration</b>	The finding of an integral or integrals. <i><b>Integration</b> is the best hope for both black and white Americans.</i>
<u><b>merge</b></u>	Join or combine. <i>He crouched low and endeavoured to <b>merge</b> into the darkness of the forest.</i>
<b>merger</b>	The combination of two or more commercial companies. <i>A <b>merger</b> between two supermarket chains.</i>
<b>reunify</b>	Unify again, as of a country. <i>Will Korea <b>reunify</b>.</i>
<b>unification</b>	An occurrence that involves the production of a union. <i>The costs of German <b>unification</b>.</i>
<u><b>unify</b></u>	Make or become united, uniform, or whole. <i>The government hoped to centralize and <b>unify</b> the nation.</i>
<u><b>union</b></u>	The operation of forming a union. <i>There is strength in <b>union</b>.</i>
<b>unite</b>	Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief. <i>The Democratic Party platform <b>united</b> several splinter groups.</i>
<u><b>united</b></u>	Of or relating to two people who are married to each other. <i>Presented a <b>united</b> front.</i>
