| seaside | A place by the sea, especially a beach area or holiday resort. <i>A day at the seaside.</i> |
| shore | The land along the edge of a body of water. <i>I made for the shore.</i> |
| shoreline | The line along which a large body of water meets the land. <i>He walked along the shoreline.</i> |
| slide | Slide guitar. <i>Use an ice axe to halt a slide on ice and snow.</i> |
| water's edge | A slight competitive advantage. |
| waterfront | The area of a city (such as a harbor or dockyard) alongside a body of water. <i>A hotel on the waterfront.</i> |
| waterside | The edge of or area adjoining a sea, lake, or river. <i>Waterside vegetation.</i> |

- skim** Remove (a substance) from the surface of a liquid.
*She **skimmed** through the newspaper.*

- slip** Insert inconspicuously or quickly or quietly.
*They **slipped** the hounds the hare racing for the side of the hill.*
- taxi** Take a taxi as a means of transport.
*I would **taxi** home and sleep till eight.*

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| archipelago | An extensive group of islands. <i>The Indonesian archipelago.</i> |
| atlantic | The 2nd largest ocean; separates North and South America on the west from Europe and Africa on the east. |
| atoll | A ring-shaped reef, island, or chain of islands formed of coral. |
| bay | A broad inlet of the sea where the land curves inwards. <i>They put him in the sick bay.</i> |
| beach | Run or haul up a boat or ship on to a beach. <i>At the water's edge a rowing boat was beached.</i> |
| coastal | Of or relating to a coast. <i>Coastal waters.</i> |
| coral | The pinkish red colour of red coral. <i>The nearby coral islands lagoons and atolls.</i> |
| foreshore | The part of a shore between high- and low-water marks, or between the water and cultivated or developed land. |

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| gulf | A large difference or division between two people or groups, or between viewpoints, concepts, or situations. <i>He felt a gulf between himself and his former friends.</i> |
| insular | Relating to a form of Latin handwriting used in Britain and Ireland in the early Middle Ages. <i>Goods of insular origin.</i> |
| island | A zone or area resembling an island. <i>This island nation.</i> |
| isle | A small island. <i>Crusoe s fabled isle.</i> |
| islet | A small island. |
| isthmus | A relatively narrow strip of land (with water on both sides) connecting two larger land areas. |
| kelp | The calcined ashes of seaweed, used as a source of various salts. <i>A large bed of kelp.</i> |
| lagoon | A small freshwater lake near a larger lake or river. |
| north | The compass point corresponding to north. <i>They were sheltering from the north winds.</i> |
| northernmost | Situated furthest to the north. <i>Alaska is our northernmost state.</i> |
| ocean | A very large expanse of sea, in particular each of the main areas into which the sea is divided geographically. <i>They scramble across the beach to the ocean and plunge into the surf.</i> |
| offshore | (of a wind) blowing towards the sea from the land. <i>He predicts that 750 000 UK jobs will be offshored in the next 10 years.</i> |
| peninsula | A piece of land almost surrounded by water or projecting out into a body of water. |
| peninsular | Of or forming or resembling a peninsula. <i>The counties of peninsular Florida.</i> |
| reef | Reduce a sail by taking in a reef. <i>Reef the sailboat s mast.</i> |
| seabed | The ground under the sea; the ocean floor. |
| seashore | The land between high- and low-water marks. |
| seaweed | Plant growing in the sea, especially marine algae. <i>Seaweeds abound on most shores.</i> |
