<a href="#">beach</a>	A pebbly or sandy shore, especially by the sea between high- and low-water marks. <i>Fabulous sandy <b>beaches</b>.</i>
<b>coastline</b>	The outline of a coast. <i>The hotel has wonderful views of the rugged <b>coastline</b>.</i>
<b>foreshore</b>	The part of the seashore between the highwater mark and the low-water mark.

<b>seaboard</b>	The shore of a sea or ocean regarded as a resort. <i>The eastern <b>seaboard</b> of the United States.</i>
<b>seacoast</b>	The shore of a sea or ocean.
<b>seashore</b>	An area of sandy, stony, or rocky land bordering and level with the sea.
<b>seaside</b>	A place by the sea, especially a beach area or holiday resort. <i>A day at the <b>seaside</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>shore</u></a>	The land along the edge of a body of water. <i>I made for the <b>shore</b>.</i>
<b>shoreline</b>	The line along which a large body of water meets the land. <i>He walked along the <b>shoreline</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>slide</u></a>	Slide guitar. <i>Use an ice axe to halt a <b>slide</b> on ice and snow.</i>
<b>water's edge</b>	A slight competitive advantage.
<b>waterfront</b>	The area of a city (such as a harbor or dockyard) alongside a body of water. <i>A hotel on the <b>waterfront</b>.</i>
<b>waterside</b>	The edge of or area adjoining a sea, lake, or river. <i><b>Waterside</b> vegetation.</i>

- *Sail along the coast, especially in order to carry cargo.*
- *Act or make progress without making much effort.*

- freewheel** Coast in a vehicle using the freewheel.  
*The postman came **freewheeling** down the track.*
- [glide](#) Make an unpowered flight either in a glider or in an aircraft with engine failure.  
*Slide your hands firmly across the shoulders then **glide** them down.*
- sail** Travel in a ship or boat using sails or engine power.  
*The QE2 will **sail** to Southampton tomorrow.*
- skate** Move along on skates.  
*Double eight figures **skated** entirely on one foot.*
- [skim](#) Remove (a substance) from the surface of a liquid.  
*She **skimmed** through the newspaper.*



- slip** Insert inconspicuously or quickly or quietly.  
*They **slipped** the hounds the hare racing for the side of the hill.*
- taxi** Take a taxi as a means of transport.  
*I would **taxi** home and sleep till eight.*

<a href="#">archipelago</a>	An extensive group of islands. <i>The Indonesian <b>archipelago</b>.</i>
<b>atlantic</b>	The 2nd largest ocean; separates North and South America on the west from Europe and Africa on the east.
<b>atoll</b>	A ring-shaped reef, island, or chain of islands formed of coral.
<a href="#">bay</a>	A broad inlet of the sea where the land curves inwards. <i>They put him in the sick <b>bay</b>.</i>
<a href="#">beach</a>	Run or haul up a boat or ship on to a beach. <i>At the water's edge a rowing boat was <b>beached</b>.</i>
<b>coastal</b>	Of or relating to a coast. <i><b>Coastal</b> waters.</i>
<b>coral</b>	The pinkish red colour of red coral. <i>The nearby <b>coral</b> islands lagoons and atolls.</i>
<b>foreshore</b>	The part of a shore between high- and low-water marks, or between the water and cultivated or developed land.



<b>gulf</b>	A large difference or division between two people or groups, or between viewpoints, concepts, or situations. <i>He felt a <b>gulf</b> between himself and his former friends.</i>
<b>insular</b>	Relating to a form of Latin handwriting used in Britain and Ireland in the early Middle Ages. <i>Goods of <b>insular</b> origin.</i>
<b><u>island</u></b>	A zone or area resembling an island. <i>This <b>island</b> nation.</i>
<b>isle</b>	A small island. <i>Crusoe s fabled <b>isle</b>.</i>
<b>islet</b>	A small island.
<b>isthmus</b>	A relatively narrow strip of land (with water on both sides) connecting two larger land areas.
<b>kelp</b>	The calcined ashes of seaweed, used as a source of various salts. <i>A large bed of <b>kelp</b>.</i>
<b>lagoon</b>	A small freshwater lake near a larger lake or river.
<b>north</b>	The compass point corresponding to north. <i>They were sheltering from the <b>north</b> winds.</i>
<b>northernmost</b>	Situated furthest to the north. <i>Alaska is our <b>northernmost</b> state.</i>
<b><u>ocean</u></b>	A very large expanse of sea, in particular each of the main areas into which the sea is divided geographically. <i>They scramble across the beach to the <b>ocean</b> and plunge into the surf.</i>
<b>offshore</b>	(of a wind) blowing towards the sea from the land. <i>He predicts that 750 000 UK jobs will be <b>offshored</b> in the next 10 years.</i>
<b>peninsula</b>	A piece of land almost surrounded by water or projecting out into a body of water.
<b>peninsular</b>	Of or forming or resembling a peninsula. <i>The counties of <b>peninsular</b> Florida.</i>
<b>reef</b>	Reduce a sail by taking in a reef. <i><b>Reef</b> the sailboat s mast.</i>
<b>seabed</b>	The ground under the sea; the ocean floor.
<b>seashore</b>	The land between high- and low-water marks.
<b>seaweed</b>	Plant growing in the sea, especially marine algae. <i><b>Seaweeds</b> abound on most shores.</i>
