### Definitions of "Coexist" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “coexist” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Coexist peacefully, as of nations.*
- *(of nations or peoples) exist in harmony despite different ideologies or interests.*
- *Exist together.*
- *Exist at the same time or in the same place.*



## Synonyms of "Coexist" as a verb (10 Words)

<b>appear with</b>	Present oneself formally, as before a (judicial) authority.
<b>co-occur with</b>	Go or occur together.
<b>coexist with</b>	Exist together.
<b>cohabit</b>	Share living quarters; usually said of people who are not married and live together as a couple. <i>Mary is now <b>cohabiting</b> with Paul.</i>
<b>coincide with</b>	Be the same.
<b>go along with</b>	Be the right size or shape; fit correctly or as desired.
<b>go hand in hand with</b>	Be in the right place or situation.
<b>go together with</b>	Give support (to) or make a choice (of) one out of a group or number.
<b>go with</b>	Be abolished or discarded.
<b>occur with</b>	Come to pass.







## Usage Examples of "Coexist" as a verb

- *The task of diplomacy was to help different states to coexist.*
- *Dwarf mammoths may have survived in north-east Siberia to coexist with the Egyptian pharaohs.*



## Associations of "Coexist" (30 Words)

- be**                    Occupy a certain position or area *be* somewhere.  
*The opening event is on October **be** 16.*
- chromatic**        Of an instrument able to play all the notes of the chromatic scale.  
*A **chromatic** scale.*
- cohesion**         The intermolecular force that holds together the molecules in a solid or liquid.  
*The work at present lacks **cohesion**.*

<b><u>cohesive</u></b>	Causing cohesion. <i>Each parish was formerly a <b>cohesive</b> unit.</i>
<b><u>concord</u></b>	Arrange by concord or agreement. <i>Both philosophers <b>concord</b> on this point.</i>
<b>concordance</b>	Make a concordance of a text. <i>The <b>concordance</b> between the teams research results.</i>
<b>concurrent</b>	Agreeing or consistent. <i>She was given nine months <b>concurrent</b> for each offence.</i>
<b>consonance</b>	A combination of notes which are in harmony with each other due to the relationship between their frequencies. <i><b>Consonance</b> between conservation measures and existing agricultural practice.</i>
<b>dependent</b>	Requiring someone or something for financial or other support. <i>A <b>dependent</b> prince.</i>
<b>existing</b>	Existing in something specified. <i>The <b>existing</b> system.</i>
<b><u>extant</u></b>	Still in existence; not extinct or destroyed or lost. <i><b>Extant</b> manuscripts.</i>
<b><u>harmony</u></b>	An arrangement of the four Gospels, or of any parallel narratives, which presents a single continuous narrative text. <i>Delightful cities where old and new blend in <b>harmony</b>.</i>
<b><u>here</u></b>	In or at this place where the speaker or writer is. <i>Is everyone <b>here</b>.</i>
<b>homophonic</b>	Having a single melodic line with accompaniment.
<b>interaction</b>	Reciprocal action or influence. <i>Ongoing <b>interaction</b> between the two languages.</i>
<b>microbe</b>	A minute life form (especially a disease-causing bacterium); the term is not in technical use.
<b>odds</b>	The balance of advantage; superiority in strength, power, or resources. <i>The <b>odds</b> against this ever happening are high.</i>
<b>pacification</b>	A treaty to cease hostilities. <i>A wonderful skill in the <b>pacification</b> of crying infants.</i>
<b><u>pertain</u></b>	Be relevant to. <i>Their economic circumstances are vastly different from those which <b>pertained</b> in their land of origin.</i>
<b>polyphony</b>	A composition written played or sung in polyphony. <i>The <b>polyphony</b> is a standard 32 voice.</i>

<b>relation</b>	The principle that an act done at a later time is deemed by law to have occurred at an earlier time. <i>The meetings helped cement Anglo American <b>relations</b>.</i>
<b>reliant</b>	Dependent on someone or something. <i>The company is heavily <b>reliant</b> on the baby market.</i>
<b>solidarity</b>	A union of interests or purposes or sympathies among members of a group. <i>Factory workers voiced <b>solidarity</b> with the striking students.</i>
<b>somewhere</b>	In or at or to some place someplace is used informally for somewhere. <i>Can we go <b>somewhere</b> warm.</i>
<b>survive</b>	Live longer than. <i>Against all odds the child <b>survived</b>.</i>
<b>symbiotic</b>	Used of organisms (especially of different species) living together but not necessarily in a relation beneficial to each. <i>The reader can have a <b>symbiotic</b> relationship with the writer.</i>
<b>tonality</b>	The use of conventional keys and harmony as the basis of musical composition. <i>The five canvases are predominantly blue in <b>tonality</b>.</i>
<b>unison</b>	Performed in unison. <i>Yes sir said the girls in <b>unison</b>.</i>
<b>unity</b>	Each of the three dramatic principles requiring limitation of the supposed time of a drama to that occupied in acting it or to a single day unity of time use of one scene throughout unity of place and concentration on the development of a single plot unity of action. <i>European <b>unity</b>.</i>
<b>unlikely</b>	Having a probability too low to inspire belief. <i>A butcher is <b>unlikely</b> to preach vegetarianism.</i>
