cognizant	Having or showing knowledge or understanding or realization or perception. <i>Statesmen must be cognizant of the political boundaries within which they work.</i>

aware	Concerned and well informed about a particular situation or development. <i>Was aware of his opponent's hostility.</i>
awareness	State of elementary or undifferentiated consciousness. <i>The crash intruded on his awareness.</i>
<u>cognition</u>	A perception sensation idea or intuition resulting from the process of cognition.
cognitive	Of or being or relating to or involving cognition. <i>The cognitive processes involved in reading.</i>
cognizance	A distinctive emblem or badge formerly worn by retainers of a noble house. <i>The Renaissance cognizance of Greece was limited.</i>
conscious	Intentionally conceived. <i>Few voters seem conscious of the issue's importance.</i>
consciously	In a deliberate and intentional way. <i>We don't consciously perceive everything that happens to us.</i>
<u>consciousness</u>	The state of being aware of and responsive to one's surroundings. <i>She failed to regain consciousness and died two days later.</i>
dimly	With a faint light; not brightly. <i>A dimly lit room.</i>
informed	Having or showing knowledge of a subject or situation. <i>Obtaining informed consent from research participants is central to ethical research practice.</i>
<u>inkling</u>	A slight suggestion or vague understanding. <i>The records give us an inkling of how people saw the world.</i>
know	The fact of being aware of information that is known to few people. <i>A man who had known better times.</i>
knowledge	The psychological result of perception and learning and reasoning. <i>He denied all knowledge of the incidents.</i>
memory	The area of cognitive psychology that studies memory processes. <i>He can do it from memory.</i>
<u>mindful</u>	Inclined or willing to do something. <i>Ever mindful of her health.</i>

perception	The process of perceiving. <i>The perception of pain.</i>
receptiveness	Willingness or readiness to receive (especially impressions or ideas). <i>He was testing the government s receptiveness to reform.</i>
recognize	Perceive to be the same. <i>Julia hardly recognized Jill when they met.</i>
retentive	(of a substance) able to absorb and hold moisture. <i>He had a highly retentive memory and was an accomplished speaker.</i>
semiconscious	Partially conscious; not completely aware of sensations.
sensate	Perceiving or perceived by the senses. <i>Sensate creatures.</i>
<u>sensitive</u>	Easily offended or upset. <i>I suppose I shouldn t be so sensitive.</i>
<u>sentient</u>	Endowed with feeling and unstructured consciousness- T.E.Lawrence. <i>The living knew themselves just sentient puppets on God s stage.</i>
<u>subconsciously</u>	From the subconscious mind. <i>Maybe subconsciously I was trying to sabotage the deal.</i>
wakefulness	The process of paying close and continuous attention. <i>Wakefulness watchfulness and bellicosity make a good hunter.</i>
waking	The state of being awake. <i>He hangs between sleeping and waking.</i>
wary	Marked by keen caution and watchful prudence. <i>They were wary in their movements.</i>
