<b>aware</b>	Bearing in mind; attentive to. <i>Became <b>aware</b> of her surroundings.</i>
<b>cognizant</b>	Having or showing knowledge or understanding or realization or perception. <i>Statesmen must be <b>cognizant</b> of the political boundaries within which they work.</i>

<b>awaken</b>	Make aware. <i>He sighed but did not <b>awaken</b>.</i>
<b>aware</b>	Concerned and well informed about a particular situation or development. <i>Was <b>aware</b> of his opponent's hostility.</i>
<b>awareness</b>	State of elementary or undifferentiated consciousness. <i>The crash intruded on his <b>awareness</b>.</i>
<b><u>cognition</u></b>	A perception sensation idea or intuition resulting from the process of cognition.
<b>cognitive</b>	Of or being or relating to or involving cognition. <i>The <b>cognitive</b> processes involved in reading.</i>
<b>cognizance</b>	A distinctive emblem or badge formerly worn by retainers of a noble house. <i>The Renaissance <b>cognizance</b> of Greece was limited.</i>
<b>conscious</b>	Intentionally conceived. <i>Few voters seem <b>conscious</b> of the issue's importance.</i>
<b>consciously</b>	In a deliberate and intentional way. <i>We don't <b>consciously</b> perceive everything that happens to us.</i>
<b><u>consciousness</u></b>	The state of being aware of and responsive to one's surroundings. <i>She failed to regain <b>consciousness</b> and died two days later.</i>
<b>dimly</b>	With a faint light; not brightly. <i>A <b>dimly</b> lit room.</i>
<b>informed</b>	Having or showing knowledge of a subject or situation. <i>Obtaining <b>informed</b> consent from research participants is central to ethical research practice.</i>
<b><u>inkling</u></b>	A slight suggestion or vague understanding. <i>The records give us an <b>inkling</b> of how people saw the world.</i>
<b>know</b>	The fact of being aware of information that is known to few people. <i>A man who had <b>known</b> better times.</i>
<b>knowledge</b>	The psychological result of perception and learning and reasoning. <i>He denied all <b>knowledge</b> of the incidents.</i>
<b>memory</b>	The area of cognitive psychology that studies memory processes. <i>He can do it from <b>memory</b>.</i>
<b><u>mindful</u></b>	Inclined or willing to do something. <i>Ever <b>mindful</b> of her health.</i>

<b>perception</b>	The process of perceiving. <i>The <b>perception</b> of pain.</i>
<b>receptiveness</b>	Willingness or readiness to receive (especially impressions or ideas). <i>He was testing the government s <b>receptiveness</b> to reform.</i>
<b>recognize</b>	Perceive to be the same. <i>Julia hardly <b>recognized</b> Jill when they met.</i>
<b>retentive</b>	(of a substance) able to absorb and hold moisture. <i>He had a highly <b>retentive</b> memory and was an accomplished speaker.</i>
<b>semiconscious</b>	Partially conscious; not completely aware of sensations.
<b>sensate</b>	Perceiving or perceived by the senses. <i><b>Sensate</b> creatures.</i>
<u>sensitive</u>	Easily offended or upset. <i>I suppose I shouldn t be so <b>sensitive</b>.</i>
<u>sentient</u>	Endowed with feeling and unstructured consciousness- T.E.Lawrence. <i>The living knew themselves just <b>sentient</b> puppets on God s stage.</i>
<u>subconsciously</u>	From the subconscious mind. <i>Maybe <b>subconsciously</b> I was trying to sabotage the deal.</i>
<b>wakefulness</b>	The process of paying close and continuous attention. <i><b>Wakefulness</b> watchfulness and bellicosity make a good hunter.</i>
<b>waking</b>	The state of being awake. <i>He hangs between sleeping and <b>waking</b>.</i>
<b>wary</b>	Marked by keen caution and watchful prudence. <i>They were <b>wary</b> in their movements.</i>
