## Synonyms of "Coherence" as a noun (10 Words)

<b>coherency</b>	Logical and orderly and consistent relation of parts.
<b>cohesion</b>	The intermolecular force that holds together the molecules in a solid or liquid. <i>The work at present lacks <b>cohesion</b>.</i>
<b><u>cohesiveness</u></b>	The quality of forming a united whole. <i>The film lacks <b>cohesiveness</b>.</i>
<b><u>consistency</u></b>	The quality of achieving a level of performance which does not vary greatly in quality over time. <i>A rambling argument that lacked any <b>consistency</b>.</i>
<b>good sense</b>	Benefit.
<b>logicality</b>	Correct and valid reasoning.
<b>orderliness</b>	A male hospital attendant who has general duties that do not involve the medical treatment of patients.

<b>organization</b>	A group of people who work together. <i>He still remembers the <b>organization</b> of the club.</i>
<b>soundness</b>	The state of being in good condition; robustness. <i>We will win because of the <b>soundness</b> of our arguments.</i>
<u><b>unity</b></u>	Each of the three dramatic principles requiring limitation of the supposed time of a drama to that occupied in acting it or to a single day unity of time use of one scene throughout unity of place and concentration on the development of a single plot unity of action. <i>He took measures to insure the territorial <b>unity</b> of Croatia.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Coherence" as a noun

- *The group began to lose coherence and the artists took separate directions.*
- *This raises further questions on the coherence of state policy.*

## Associations of "Coherence" (30 Words)

<b>balanced</b>	(especially of food) having different elements in the correct proportions. <i>A properly <b>balanced</b> symphony orchestra.</i>
<u><b>cling</b></u>	A clingstone peach. <i>You are <b>clinging</b> to him for security.</i>
<u><b>cohere</b></u>	Come or be in close contact with; stick or hold together and resist separation. <i>Religion can <b>cohere</b> social groups.</i>
<u><b>coherent</b></u>	Capable of thinking and expressing yourself in a clear and consistent manner. <i>They failed to develop a <b>coherent</b> economic strategy.</i>
<b>connection</b>	An arrangement or opportunity for catching a connecting train, bus, aircraft, etc. <i>The plane was late and he missed his <b>connection</b> in Atlanta.</i>
<u><b>consecutive</b></u>	In a consecutive manner. <i>We numbered the papers <b>consecutively</b>.</i>
<u><b>consistent</b></u>	Marked by an orderly logical and aesthetically consistent relation of parts. <i>I have decided that the course of conduct which I am following is <b>consistent</b> with my sense of responsibility as president in time of war.</i>
<b>constant</b>	Steadfast in purpose or devotion or affection. <i>In <b>constant</b> pain.</i>

<b>continuity</b>	The maintenance of continuous action and self-consistent detail in the various scenes of a film or broadcast. <i>The BBC <b>continuity</b> announcer.</i>
<b>continuous</b>	Continuing in time or space without interruption. <i>There are <b>continuous</b> advances in design and production.</i>
<b>homogeneity</b>	The quality of being of uniform throughout in composition or structure. <i>There is a remarkable <b>homogeneity</b> between the two companies.</i>
<a href="#"><u>link</u></a>	Link with or as with a yoke. <i>The walls are held together with metal <b>links</b> placed in the wet mortar during construction.</i>
<a href="#"><u>logical</u></a>	Marked by an orderly logical and aesthetically consistent relation of parts. <i>The information is displayed in a simple and <b>logical</b> fashion.</i>
<b>maintain</b>	Maintain for use and service. <i>He <b>maintained</b> his innocence.</i>
<b>one</b>	Being a single entity made by combining separate components. <i>They had lunch at <b>one</b>.</i>
<b>qualitatively</b>	With regard to the quality or qualities of something rather than its quantity. <i>Security levels can be <b>qualitatively</b> assessed.</i>
<a href="#"><u>recurrence</u></a>	The fact of occurring again. <i>A drug used to prevent the <b>recurrence</b> of breast cancer.</i>
<b>referent</b>	Having reference. <i>Judgments <b>referent</b> to the indictment.</i>
<b>relation</b>	The principle that an act done at a later time is deemed by law to have occurred at an earlier time. <i>International <b>relations</b>.</i>
<b>seriatim</b>	In a series; one after another. <i>It is proposed to deal with these matters <b>seriatim</b>.</i>
<b>storehouse</b>	A building used for storing goods. <i><b>Storehouses</b> were built close to the docks.</i>
<a href="#"><u>subject</u></a>	A person who is subjected to experimental or other observational procedures someone who is an object of investigation. <i>He <b>subjected</b> her to a terrifying ordeal.</i>
<b>succession</b>	The action or process of inheriting a title, office, property, etc. <i>A <b>succession</b> of stalls offering soft drinks.</i>
<b>tangency</b>	(electronics) a junction where things (as two electrical conductors) touch or are in physical contact.

<b><u>thematic</u></b>	Relating to the collecting of postage stamps with designs connected with the same subject. <i>Some languages use special affixes to mark <b>thematic</b> and non <b>thematic</b> elements.</i>
<b>unceasing</b>	Not coming to an end; continuous. <i>Man s <b>unceasing</b> warfare with drought and isolation.</i>
<b><u>unchanging</u></b>	Conforming to the same principles or course of action over time. <i>The party stood for <b>unchanging</b> principles.</i>
<b>undifferentiated</b>	Not differentiated. <i>By six weeks the sexual glands are as yet <b>undifferentiated</b> between male and female.</i>
<b><u>unified</u></b>	Operating as a unit. <i>A <b>unified</b> system of national education.</i>
<b><u>uniformity</u></b>	The quality of lacking diversity or variation (even to the point of boredom). <i>An attempt to impose administrative and cultural <b>uniformity</b>.</i>
