- *The quality of forming a unified whole.*



Synonyms of "Coherence" as a noun (10 Words)

- coherency** Logical and orderly and consistent relation of parts.
- cohesion** The intermolecular force that holds together the molecules in a solid or liquid.
*The work at present lacks **cohesion**.*
- cohesiveness** The quality of forming a united whole.
*The film lacks **cohesiveness**.*
- consistency** The quality of achieving a level of performance which does not vary greatly in quality over time.
*A rambling argument that lacked any **consistency**.*
- good sense** Benefit.
- logicality** Correct and valid reasoning.
- orderliness** A male hospital attendant who has general duties that do not involve the medical treatment of patients.

organization	A group of people who work together. <i>He still remembers the organization of the club.</i>
soundness	The state of being in good condition; robustness. <i>We will win because of the soundness of our arguments.</i>
unity	Each of the three dramatic principles requiring limitation of the supposed time of a drama to that occupied in acting it or to a single day unity of time use of one scene throughout unity of place and concentration on the development of a single plot unity of action. <i>He took measures to insure the territorial unity of Croatia.</i>

Usage Examples of "Coherence" as a noun

- *The group began to lose coherence and the artists took separate directions.*
- *This raises further questions on the coherence of state policy.*

Associations of "Coherence" (30 Words)

balanced	(especially of food) having different elements in the correct proportions. <i>A properly balanced symphony orchestra.</i>
cling	A clingstone peach. <i>You are clinging to him for security.</i>
cohere	Come or be in close contact with; stick or hold together and resist separation. <i>Religion can cohere social groups.</i>
coherent	Capable of thinking and expressing yourself in a clear and consistent manner. <i>They failed to develop a coherent economic strategy.</i>
connection	An arrangement or opportunity for catching a connecting train, bus, aircraft, etc. <i>The plane was late and he missed his connection in Atlanta.</i>
consecutive	In a consecutive manner. <i>We numbered the papers consecutively.</i>
consistent	Marked by an orderly logical and aesthetically consistent relation of parts. <i>I have decided that the course of conduct which I am following is consistent with my sense of responsibility as president in time of war.</i>
constant	Steadfast in purpose or devotion or affection. <i>In constant pain.</i>

continuity	The maintenance of continuous action and self-consistent detail in the various scenes of a film or broadcast. <i>The BBC continuity announcer.</i>
continuous	Continuing in time or space without interruption. <i>There are continuous advances in design and production.</i>
homogeneity	The quality of being of uniform throughout in composition or structure. <i>There is a remarkable homogeneity between the two companies.</i>
<u>link</u>	Link with or as with a yoke. <i>The walls are held together with metal links placed in the wet mortar during construction.</i>
<u>logical</u>	Marked by an orderly logical and aesthetically consistent relation of parts. <i>The information is displayed in a simple and logical fashion.</i>
maintain	Maintain for use and service. <i>He maintained his innocence.</i>
one	Being a single entity made by combining separate components. <i>They had lunch at one.</i>
qualitatively	With regard to the quality or qualities of something rather than its quantity. <i>Security levels can be qualitatively assessed.</i>
<u>recurrence</u>	The fact of occurring again. <i>A drug used to prevent the recurrence of breast cancer.</i>
referent	Having reference. <i>Judgments referent to the indictment.</i>
relation	The principle that an act done at a later time is deemed by law to have occurred at an earlier time. <i>International relations.</i>
seriatim	In a series; one after another. <i>It is proposed to deal with these matters seriatim.</i>
storehouse	A building used for storing goods. <i>Storehouses were built close to the docks.</i>
<u>subject</u>	A person who is subjected to experimental or other observational procedures someone who is an object of investigation. <i>He subjected her to a terrifying ordeal.</i>
succession	The action or process of inheriting a title, office, property, etc. <i>A succession of stalls offering soft drinks.</i>
tangency	(electronics) a junction where things (as two electrical conductors) touch or are in physical contact.

<u>thematic</u>	Relating to the collecting of postage stamps with designs connected with the same subject. <i>Some languages use special affixes to mark thematic and non thematic elements.</i>
unceasing	Not coming to an end; continuous. <i>Man s unceasing warfare with drought and isolation.</i>
<u>unchanging</u>	Conforming to the same principles or course of action over time. <i>The party stood for unchanging principles.</i>
undifferentiated	Not differentiated. <i>By six weeks the sexual glands are as yet undifferentiated between male and female.</i>
<u>unified</u>	Operating as a unit. <i>A unified system of national education.</i>
<u>uniformity</u>	The quality of lacking diversity or variation (even to the point of boredom). <i>An attempt to impose administrative and cultural uniformity.</i>
