**unchanging**

Conforming to the same principles or course of action over time.

*The party stood for **unchanging** principles.*

Not differentiated.

**undifferentiated** *By six weeks the sexual glands are as yet **undifferentiated** between male and female.*

**unified**

Operating as a unit.

*A **unified** system of national education.*

**uniformity**

The quality of lacking diversity or variation (even to the point of boredom).

*An attempt to impose administrative and cultural **uniformity**.*
