fused	(of a material or object) joined to something else by being melted with intense heat. <i>Fused glass ornaments.</i>
<u>homogeneous</u>	Consisting of parts all of the same kind. <i>Homogeneous catalysis.</i>
homogenized	Formed by blending unlike elements especially by reducing one element to particles and dispersing them throughout another substance. <i>A homogenized society.</i>
joined	Of or relating to two people who are married to each other.
<u>logical</u>	Marked by an orderly logical and aesthetically consistent relation of parts. <i>Rain was a logical expectation given the time of year.</i>
<u>lucid</u>	(of a dream) experienced with the dreamer feeling awake, aware of dreaming, and able to control events consciously. <i>A lucid moment in his madness.</i>
merged	Formed or united into a whole.
meshed	(of a geometric object) represented by an arrangement of a finite number of geometric components. <i>Fine meshed sieves.</i>
ordered	Having a systematic arrangement; especially having elements succeeding in order according to rule. <i>An ordered sequence.</i>
rational	Consistent with or based on or using reason. <i>Rational numbers.</i>
reasonable	As much as is appropriate or fair; moderate. <i>It seems a reasonable enough request.</i>
reasoned	Based on logic or good sense. <i>A reasoned judgement.</i>
sound	Complete; thorough. <i>Sound advice.</i>
tenacious	Stubbornly unyielding. <i>A mind not gifted to discover truth but tenacious to hold it.</i>
<u>unified</u>	Made uniform or whole; united. <i>A unified system of national education.</i>
<u>united</u>	Of or relating to two people who are married to each other. <i>Women acting together in a united way.</i>
well reasoned	In good health especially after having suffered illness or injury.

<u>coherence</u>	The state of cohering or sticking together. <i>The group began to lose coherence and the artists took separate directions.</i>
<u>consistent</u>	In agreement or consistent or reliable. <i>The injuries are consistent with falling from a great height.</i>
constant	Steadfast in purpose or devotion or affection. <i>A constant lover.</i>
<u>continually</u>	Repeated frequently in the same way; regularly. <i>I was continually moving around.</i>
continued	Without stop or interruption. <i>To insure the continued success of the war.</i>
continuously	At every point. <i>These images loop continuously.</i>
endless	Having the ends united so as to form a continuous whole. <i>An endless chain.</i>
equable	Not easily irritated. <i>He could look sterner than his equable temperament would suggest.</i>
homogeneity	The quality of being of uniform throughout in composition or structure. <i>There is a remarkable homogeneity between the two companies.</i>
<u>homogeneous</u>	Of the same kind; alike. <i>If all jobs and workers were homogeneous.</i>

immutable	Unchanging over time or unable to be changed. <i>The view of that time was that all species were immutable created by God.</i>
incessant	(of something regarded as unpleasant) continuing without pause or interruption. <i>The incessant beat of the music.</i>
indestructible	Not able to be destroyed. <i>Indestructible plastic containers.</i>
invariable	(of a quantity) constant. <i>His invariable courtesy.</i>
invariant	A function, quantity, or property which remains unchanged when a specified transformation is applied. <i>The pattern of cell divisions was found to be invariant.</i>
<u>logical</u>	Marked by an orderly logical and aesthetically consistent relation of parts. <i>Her logical mind.</i>
<u>nonstop</u>	Occurring without stops. <i>How many nonstops are there to Dallas.</i>
perpetual	Never ending or changing. <i>Their perpetual money worries.</i>
qualitatively	In a qualitative manner. <i>Security levels can be qualitatively assessed.</i>
seamless	(of a fabric or surface) smooth and without seams or obvious joins. <i>The seamless integration of footage from different sources.</i>
<u>steadily</u>	In a controlled or unwavering manner. <i>The mountain got steadily steeper.</i>
sustained	Continuing for an extended period or without interruption. <i>Several years of sustained economic growth.</i>
unceasing	Not coming to an end; continuous. <i>The unceasing efforts of the staff.</i>
<u>unchangeable</u>	Not changeable or subject to change. <i>A fixed and unchangeable part of the germ plasm.</i>
<u>unchanging</u>	Showing little if any change. <i>The party stood for unchanging principles.</i>
uninterrupted	Continuing in time or space without interruption. <i>Moving midweek holidays to the nearest Monday or Friday allows uninterrupted work weeks.</i>

unrelenting Not giving way to kindness or compassion.
Unrelenting opponents.

unwavering Not showing abrupt variations.
Unwavering loyalty.
