brood	The young of an animal cared for at one time. <i>The male pheasant tailed jacana takes over once the eggs are laid and broods them.</i>
bunch	Form into a bunch. <i>She bunched her fingers into a fist.</i>
centurion	The commander of a century in the ancient Roman army.
cheering	Giving comfort or support. <i>A cheering crowd.</i>
cluster	Form a cluster or clusters. <i>They stood there in a frightened cluster.</i>
considerable	(of a person) having merit or distinction. <i>Went to considerable trouble for us.</i>
crowd	Cause to herd drive or crowd together. <i>A huge crowd gathered in the street outside.</i>
entourage	The group following and attending to some important person. <i>An entourage of loyal courtiers.</i>
flock	Of birds congregate in a flock. <i>A flock of sheep.</i>
gang	Of a number of people form a group or gang. <i>A gang of bank robbers.</i>
heap	Form a heap. <i>They climbed back in the heap and headed home.</i>
hive	A beehive. <i>The beekeeper hived the swarm.</i>
horde	An army or tribe of nomadic warriors. <i>A horde of beery rugby fans.</i>
infestation	A swarm of insects that attack plants. <i>Infestation with head lice is widespread.</i>
large	Fairly large or important in effect influential. <i>A large city.</i>
legion	A division of 3,000-6,000 men, including a complement of cavalry, in the ancient Roman army. <i>Her fans are legion.</i>
lot	Divide into lots as of land for example. <i>A vacant lot.</i>
mass	Join together into a mass or collect or form a mass. <i>Stellar objects of intermediate mass.</i>

<u>multitude</u>	A large number of people or things. <i>Father Peter addressed the multitude.</i>
numerous	Consisting of many members. <i>The family was numerous.</i>
<u>plurality</u>	The number by which plurality exceeds the number of votes cast for the candidate placed second. <i>A plurality of critical approaches.</i>
retinue	A group of advisers, assistants, or others accompanying an important person. <i>The rock star s retinue of security guards and personal cooks.</i>
scads	A large number or amount. <i>They raised scads of children.</i>
shouting	Uttering a loud inarticulate cry as of pain or excitement. <i>It s all over but the shouting.</i>
<u>swarm</u>	Of flying insects move in or form a swarm. <i>The garden was swarming with bees.</i>
tribune	(ancient Rome) an official elected by the plebeians to protect their interests.
<u>vermin</u>	Parasitic worms or insects. <i>Cereals must be protected from mice and other vermin.</i>
