<b>bit</b>	The cutting part of a drill usually pointed and threaded and is replaceable in a brace or bitstock or drill press. <i>He had a <b>bit</b> of good luck.</i>
<b>change</b>	Money given in exchange for the same sum in larger units. <i>He attributed the <b>change</b> to their marriage.</i>
<b>coin of the realm</b>	A flat metal piece (usually a disc) used as money.
<b>coinage</b>	A system or type of coins in use. <i>The recent <b>coinage</b> Eurointellectuals.</i>
<b>coins</b>	A flat metal piece (usually a disc) used as money.
<b>copper</b>	Any of various small butterflies of the family Lycaenidae having coppery wings. <i>She had <b>copper</b> coloured hair.</i>
<b>coppers</b>	A copper penny.
<b>gold</b>	Coins or other articles made of gold. <i>He proved to be a rabid seeker for <b>gold</b> and power.</i>

**piece** A financial share.  
*Each employee owns a **piece** of the company.*

**silver** A shiny grey white colour or appearance like that of silver.  
*Thieves stole 5 000 worth of **silver**.*

**small change** A garment size for a small person.

- *Make (coins) by stamping metal.*

## Synonyms of "Coin" as a verb (22 Words)

### cast

Form by pouring e.g. wax or hot metal into a cast or mold.

**Cast** a spell.

### conceive

Form or devise (a plan or idea) in the mind.

My daughter was **conceived** in Christmas Day.

### **create**

Create or manufacture a man-made product.

Little kids **create** because they hate being ignored.

### devise

Leave (something, especially real estate) to someone by the terms of a will.

A training programme should be **devised**.

### **die**

Die one after another until few or none are left.

My secret will **die** with me.

### **dream up**

Experience while sleeping.

### **fabricate**

Concoct something artificial or untrue.

You will have to **fabricate** an exhaust system.

<b><u>forge</u></b>	Make or shape (a metal object) by heating it in a fire or furnace and hammering it. <i>He <b>forged</b> ahead.</i>
<b><u>formulate</u></b>	Express (an idea) in a concise or systematic way. <i>The argument is sufficiently clear that it can be <b>formulated</b> mathematically.</i>
<b><u>invent</u></b>	Create or design (something that has not existed before); be the originator of. <i>He <b>invented</b> an improved form of the steam engine.</i>
<b>make</b>	Make or cause to be or to become. <i><b>Make</b> an estimate.</i>
<b>make up</b>	Form by assembling individuals or constituents.
<b>manufacture</b>	Make up something artificial or untrue. <i>Firms who <b>manufacture</b> ball bearings.</i>
<b>mint</b>	Form by stamping, punching, or printing.
<b>mould</b>	Form in clay, wax, etc. <i>Take the marzipan and <b>mould</b> it into a cone shape.</i>
<b><u>originate</u></b>	Come into existence; take on form or shape. <i>A new religious movement <b>originated</b> in that country.</i>
<b>produce</b>	Cultivate by growing, often involving improvements by means of agricultural techniques. <i>No conventional drugs had <b>produced</b> any significant change.</i>
<b>punch</b>	Drive forcibly as if by a punch. <i>The nail <b>punched</b> through the wall.</i>
<b>stamp</b>	Affix a stamp to. <i>Traditionally medals are <b>stamped</b> with dies or cast from a mould.</i>
<b>stamp out</b>	Form or cut out with a mold, form, or die.
<b><u>strike</u></b>	Undertake strike action against an employer. <i>The opponent refused to <b>strike</b>.</i>
<b>think up</b>	Dispose the mind in a certain way.

<b>anna</b>	A former copper coin of Pakistan and India.
<b>bicentennial</b>	The 200th anniversary (or the celebration of it). <i>A year long celebration marking the <b>bicentennial</b> of Poe s birth.</i>
<b><u>briefcase</u></b>	A case with a handle; for carrying papers or files or books.
<b>bus</b>	Send or move around by bus. <i>The fenders had fallen off that old <b>bus</b>.</i>
<b>cent</b>	A small sum of money. <i>He hadn t yet earned a <b>cent</b>.</i>
<b>coinage</b>	The invention of a new word or phrase. <i>The volume of <b>coinage</b> in circulation.</i>
<b><u>collectible</u></b>	Subject to or requiring payment especially as specified. <i>A <b>collectible</b> bill.</i>



<b>collecting</b>	The act of gathering something together.
<b>commemorative</b>	An object such as a stamp or coin made to mark an event or honour a person. <i>A <b>commemorative</b> plaque.</i>
<b>currency</b>	The metal or paper medium of exchange that is presently used. <i>No claim had been made during the <b>currency</b> of the policy.</i>
<b>dime</b>	Street name for a packet of illegal drugs that is sold for ten dollars. <i>He didn't have a <b>dime</b>.</i>
<b>dollar</b>	A United States coin worth one dollar. <i>The <b>dollar</b> sign means little to him.</i>
<b>drachma</b>	A unit of apothecary weight equal to an eighth of an ounce or to 60 grains.
<b>keepsake</b>	A small item kept in memory of the person who gave it or originally owned it. <i>She was wearing the medal he gave her as a <b>keepsake</b>.</i>
<b>medal</b>	Decorate or honour with a medal. <i>He was <b>medalled</b> by the Michigan Photographers Association.</i>
<b>minimum</b>	The least or smallest amount or quantity possible, attainable, or required. <i>Clients with a <b>minimum</b> of 500 000 to invest.</i>
<b>neologism</b>	A newly coined word or expression.
<b>numismatist</b>	A collector and student of money (and coins in particular).
<b>obelisk</b>	A mountain tree or other natural object resembling an obelisk in shape.
<b>paperback</b>	A book bound in stiff paper or flexible card. <i>The shelves were stacked with well thumbed <b>paperbacks</b>.</i>
<b>penny</b>	Used for emphasis to denote no money at all. <i>We didn't get paid a <b>penny</b>.</i>
<b>pickpocket</b>	A person who steals from people's pockets. <i>I think someone <b>pickpocketed</b> me in Brighton on my way to the station.</i>
<b>pucker</b>	Draw together into folds or puckers. <i>The child's face <b>puckered</b> ready to cry.</i>
<b>purse</b>	A sum of money spoken of as the contents of a money purse. <i>The <b>purse</b> barely covered the winner's expenses.</i>
<b>souvenir</b>	Something of sentimental value. <i>The recording provides a <b>souvenir</b> of a great production.</i>

<b>stamp</b>	A mark or pattern made by a stamp especially one indicating official validation. <i>John <b>stamped</b> off muttering.</i>
<b>sterling</b>	British money especially the pound sterling as the basic monetary unit of the UK. <i>Issues of <b>sterling</b> bonds.</i>
<b>ticket</b>	Of a passenger be issued with a travel ticket. <i>Passengers can now get electronically <b>ticketed</b>.</i>
<b>token</b>	Insignificantly small a matter of form only tokenish is informal. <i>The patronizing treatment of the <b>token</b> Middle Eastern character.</i>
<b>wallet</b>	A pocket-sized flat folding case for holding money and plastic cards.
