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| arrest | The act of apprehending (especially apprehending a criminal). <i>The negotiations were in arrest.</i> |
| band | Jewelry consisting of a circlet of precious metal (often set with jewels) worn on the finger. <i>A narrow band of gold was her only jewellery.</i> |
| catch | Anything that is caught especially if it is worth catching. <i>The window catch was rusty.</i> |
| choker | An extremely upsetting experience. <i>He could win if he wasn't a choker.</i> |
| collet | A band or collar that holds an individual stone in a jewelry setting. |
| dog collar | Metal supports for logs in a fireplace. |

| shoe collar | Necklace that fits tightly around a woman's neck. |
| sleeve | The part of a garment that wholly or partly covers a person's arm. <i>A shirt with the sleeves rolled up.</i> |
| taking into custody | The act of someone who picks up or takes something. |
