pledge	Someone accepted for membership but not yet fully admitted to the group. <i>The conference ended with a joint pledge to limit pollution.</i>
security	A department responsible for the security of the institution's property and workers. <i>A matter of national security.</i>
surety	One who provides a warrant or guarantee to another. <i>The surety of my impending fatherhood.</i>

corroborative	Serving to support or corroborate.
corroboratory	Serving to support or corroborate.
derivative	Originating from, based on, or influenced by. <i>A highly derivative prose style.</i>
derived	Formed or developed from something else; not original. <i>The belief that classes and organizations are secondary and derived.</i>
ensuant	Following or accompanying as a consequence. <i>The ensuant response to his appeal.</i>
equidistant	The same distance apart at every point. <i>The line joins together all points which are equidistant from the two axes.</i>
incidental	Occurring with or following as a consequence. <i>Snags incidental to the changeover in management.</i>
indirect	Descended from a common ancestor but through different lines. <i>An indirect advantage.</i>
resultant	Occurring or produced as a result of something. <i>Restructuring and the resultant cost savings.</i>
resulting	Occurring or following as the consequence of something. <i>Talk of a general election and the resulting political uncertainty.</i>
secondary	Denoting or relating to organisms in a particular community that belong to the second trophic level among its consumers, and consume primary consumers. <i>A secondary source.</i>
sequent	Occurring with or following as a consequence. <i>Some of the inferences are not sequent on the premises.</i>
side by side	Located on a side.
subordinate	Unable to stand alone syntactically as a complete sentence. <i>In adventure stories character must be subordinate to action.</i>
substantiating	Serving to support or corroborate.
substantiative	Serving to support or corroborate.
unintended	Not planned or meant. <i>The unintended consequences of people's actions.</i>
validating	Serving to support or corroborate.
validatory	Serving to support or corroborate.
verificatory	Serving to support or corroborate.
verifying	Serving to support or corroborate.

arrears	The state of being behind in payments. Mortgage arrears .
auctioneer	Sell at an auction.
broker	Act as a broker. Fighting continued despite attempts to broker a ceasefire.
cash	Exchange for cash. There is a desperate shortage of hard cash .

foreclosure	The action of taking possession of a mortgaged property when the mortgagor fails to keep up their mortgage payments. <i>Assistance for mortgage borrowers facing foreclosure.</i>
funding	The action or practice of providing funding. <i>The public funding of litigation remains a core question.</i>
guarantor	One who provides a warrant or guarantee to another. <i>The role of the police as guarantors of public order.</i>
honorarium	A payment given for professional services that are rendered nominally without charge.
lend	(of a thing) be suitable for. <i>No one would lend him the money.</i>
lender	An organization or person that lends money. <i>A mortgage lender.</i>
loan	The temporary provision of money (usually at interest). <i>The computer was loaned to us by the theatre.</i>
marketer	A person or company that advertises or promotes something. <i>A leading manufacturer and marketer of medical products.</i>
mortgage	The amount of money borrowed in a mortgage. <i>I put down a hundred thousand in cash and took out a mortgage for the rest.</i>
owe	Owe something especially money to. <i>Champagne houses owe their success to brand image.</i>
pawnbroker	A person who lends money at interest on the security of an article pawned.
rates	A local tax on property (usually used in the plural).
refinance	Renew the financing of. <i>Companies must refinance 20 billion of warrants and bonds.</i>
repayment	Payment of a debt or obligation. <i>Minimum monthly repayments.</i>
requital	An act of requiting; returning in kind.
speculator	Someone who risks losses for the possibility of considerable gains. <i>Speculators are driving the price of oil higher.</i>
surety	Something clearly established. <i>The magistrate granted bail with a surety of 500.</i>
tenant	Occupy property as a tenant. <i>The landlord can evict a tenant who doesn't pay the rent.</i>
underwrite	Accept (a liability or risk) under the terms of an insurance policy. <i>They were willing to underwrite in part the construction of a ship.</i>
