**jointly** In conjunction with; combined.

**together with** At the same time.

## Associations of "Collectively" (30 Words)

<b>absolutely</b>	Used to express and emphasize one's assent or agreement. <i>He <b>absolutely</b> adores that car.</i>
<b>all</b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>Became <b>all</b> attention.</i>
<b>altogether</b>	With everything included or counted. <i><b>Altogether</b> it was a great evening.</i>
<b>amply</b>	Sufficiently; more than adequately. <i>These voices were <b>amply</b> represented.</i>
<b>complete</b>	Complete or carry out. <i>His range of skills made him the <b>complete</b> footballer.</i>
<b>completely</b>	Totally; utterly. <i>It was <b>completely</b> different from what we expected.</i>

<u>conversant</u>	Well informed about or knowing thoroughly. <i>You need someone who is <b>conversant</b> with the new technology.</i>
entire	Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential especially not damaged. <i>My plans are to travel the <b>entire</b> world.</i>
entirely	Solely. <i>A school devoted <b>entirely</b> to the needs of problem children.</i>
entirety	The state of being total and complete. <i>She would have to stay in her room for the <b>entirety</b> of the weekend.</i>
<u>every</u>	Each and all of the members of a group considered singly and without exception. <i><b>Every</b> two hours.</i>
fully	Completely or entirely; to the fullest extent. <i>They were <b>fully</b> or amply fed.</i>
gamut	The lowest note in the gamut scale. <i>The orchestral <b>gamut</b>.</i>
generic	Applicable to an entire class or group. <i>The <b>generic</b> name.</i>
instantaneously	Without any delay. <i>Soldiers must be ready to react <b>instantaneously</b>.</i>
<u>outright</u>	Immediately or instantly. <i>They decided to buy the company <b>outright</b>.</i>
perfectly	Used for emphasis, especially in order to assert something that has been challenged or doubted. <i>A <b>perfectly</b> idiotic idea.</i>
<u>rely</u>	Depend on with full trust or confidence. <i>The charity has to <b>rely</b> <i>entirely</i> on public donations.</i>
ripen	Cause to ripen or develop fully. <i>The sun <b>ripens</b> the fruit.</i>
<u>solely</u>	Not involving anyone or anything else; only. <i>Did it <b>solely</b> for money.</i>
<u>stark</u>	Stiff, rigid, or incapable of movement. <i><b>Stark</b> staring mad.</i>
<u>sufficient</u>	Enough; adequate. <i>They had <b>sufficient</b> resources to survive.</i>

<u><b>thoroughly</b></u>	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly. <i>She was soon <b>thoroughly</b> bored.</i>
<u><b>total</b></u>	A quantity obtained by the addition of a group of numbers. <i>They were left with debts <b>totalling</b> 6 260.</i>
<u><b>totally</b></u>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent ('whole' is often used informally for 'wholly'). <i>A <b>totally</b> new situation.</i>
<u><b>unrelated</b></u>	Not connected by kinship. <i><b>Unrelated</b> facts.</i>
<u><b>unsuited</b></u>	Not right or appropriate. <i>He was totally <b>unsuited</b> for the job.</i>
<u><b>utterly</b></u>	Completely and without qualification; absolutely. <i>He looked <b>utterly</b> ridiculous.</i>
<u><b>whole</b></u>	Acting together as a single undiversified whole. <i>A <b>whole</b> person again.</i>
<u><b>wholly</b></u>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>She found herself given over <b>wholly</b> to sensation.</i>
