

complete Complete or carry out.

His range of skills made him the **complete** footballer.

conversantWell informed about or knowing thoroughly.

You need someone who is **conversant** with the new technology.

Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential

entire especially not damaged.

entirety The state of being total and complete.

She would have to stay in her room for the **entirety** of the weekend.

fully Completely or entirely; to the fullest extent.

They were **fully** or amply fed.

The lowest note in the gamut scale.

The orchestral **gamut**.

generic Applicable to an entire class or group.

The **generic** name.

instantaneously Without any delay.

Soldiers must be ready to react **instantaneously**.

outright Immediately or instantly.

They decided to buy the company **outright**.

Used for emphasis, especially in order to assert something that has been

perfectly challenged or doubted.

A **perfectly** idiotic idea.

Depend on with full trust or confidence.

The charity has to **rely** enti**rely** on public donations.

Cause to ripen or develop fully.

The sun ripens the fruit.

Not involving anyone or anything else; only.

Did it **solely** for money.

stark Stiff, rigid, or incapable of movement.

Stark staring mad.

sufficient Enough; adequate.

unrelated Not connected by kinship.

Unrelated facts.

unsuited Not right or appropriate.

He was totally **unsuited** for the job.

utterly Completely and without qualification; absolutely.

He looked **utterly** ridiculous.

whole Acting together as a single undiversified whole.

A whole person again.
