## Collision as a Noun

### Definitions of "Collision" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “collision” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A conflict between opposing ideas, interests, or factions.*
- *A conflict of opposed ideas or attitudes or goals.*
- *An instance of two or more records being assigned the same identifier or location in memory.*
- *A brief event in which two or more bodies come together.*
- *(physics) a brief event in which two or more bodies come together.*
- *An instance of one moving object or person striking violently against another.*
- *An accident resulting from violent impact of a moving object.*
- *An instance of simultaneous transmission by more than one node of a network.*



## Synonyms of "Collision" as a noun (14 Words)

- accident** An unfortunate mishap; especially one causing damage or injury.  
*Four people were killed in a road **accident**.*
- bump** A swelling on the skin, especially one caused by illness or injury.  
*The children were given the **bumps**.*
- clash** An incompatibility leading to disagreement.  
*A **clash** of cymbals.*
- conflict** An open clash between two opposing groups (or individuals)-Thomas Paine.  
*He was immobilized by **conflict** and indecision.*
- contradiction** A situation in which inconsistent elements are present.  
*The statement he is brave and he is not brave is a **contradiction**.*
- crash** A sudden failure which puts a computer system out of action.  
*The **crash** of the company meant that 150 jobs would go.*

<b><u>disagreement</u></b>	A difference between conflicting facts or claims or opinions. <i><b>Disagreement</b> between the results of the two assessments.</i>
<b>hit</b>	A conspicuous success. <i>Few structures can withstand a <b>hit</b> from a speeding car.</i>
<b>impact</b>	The violent interaction of individuals or groups entering into combat. <i>Our regional measures have had a significant <b>impact</b> on unemployment.</i>
<b>incompatibility</b>	(immunology) the degree to which the body's immune system will try to reject foreign material (as transfused blood or transplanted tissue). <i>The <b>incompatibility</b> between industry and nature.</i>
<b>knock</b>	The sound of knocking as on a door or in an engine or bearing. <i>The sudden <b>knock</b> floored him.</i>
<b><u>opposition</u></b>	The major political party opposed to the party in office and prepared to replace it if elected. <i>Despite <b>opposition</b> from the newspapers he went ahead.</i>
<b><u>strike</u></b>	A pitch that passes through the strike zone. <i>The threat of nuclear <b>strikes</b>.</i>
<b><u>variance</u></b>	A quantity equal to the square of the standard deviation. <i>A zoning <b>variance</b>.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Collision" as a noun

- *Three passengers were killed in the collision.*
- *The collision of the particles resulted in an exchange of energy and a change of direction.*
- *A collision of interests.*
- *His car was in collision with a lorry.*

- *A mid-air collision between two aircraft.*

<b>bulge</b>	Bulge outward. <i>The advance created an eastward facing <b>bulge</b> in the line.</i>
<b>bump</b>	In a race gain a bump against. <i>Her mosquito bites had come up in huge red <b>bumps</b>.</i>
<b>clang</b>	Make or cause to make a clang. <i>The steel door slammed shut with a <b>clang</b>.</i>
<b>clash</b>	Meet and come into violent conflict. <i>The Euro 2000 <b>clash</b> between England and Germany.</i>
<b>collapse</b>	Cause a lung or blood vessel to collapse. <i>Tabulation programs can be used to <b>collapse</b> this list in various ways.</i>
<b>collide</b>	Cause to collide. <i>The physicists <b>collided</b> the particles.</i>
<b>conflict</b>	Be in conflict. <i>Parents and children s interests sometimes <b>conflict</b>.</i>
<b>confrontation</b>	Discord resulting from a clash of ideas or opinions. <i>Four months of violent <b>confrontation</b> between government and opposition forces.</i>
<b>crash</b>	Cause to crash. <i>My computer <b>crashed</b> last night.</i>
<b>damage</b>	Inflict damage upon. <i>The snow <b>damaged</b> the roof.</i>
<b>demolish</b>	Eat up completely, as with great appetite. <i>I looked forward keenly to <b>demolishing</b> my opponent.</i>
<b>deterrent</b>	A thing that discourages or is intended to discourage someone from doing something. <i>Britain s nuclear <b>deterrent</b>.</i>
<b>displace</b>	Take the place of or have precedence over. <i>He seems to have <b>displaced</b> some vertebrae.</i>
<b>encounter</b>	A confrontation or unpleasant struggle. <i>She felt totally unnerved by the <b>encounter</b>.</i>
<b>excrescence</b>	A distinct outgrowth on a body or plant, resulting from disease or abnormality. <i>The bony <b>excrescence</b> between its horns.</i>

<b>friction</b>	The resistance that one surface or object encounters when moving over another. <i>The <b>friction</b> of braking.</i>
<b>hit</b>	Hit with a missile from a weapon. <i>It <b>hit</b> her that I wanted to settle down here.</i>
<b>impact</b>	Influencing strongly. <i>High interest rates have <b>impacted</b> on retail spending.</i>
<b>jut</b>	Extend out, over, or beyond the main body or line of something. <i>She put up her head and <b>jutted</b> out her chin with determination.</i>
<b>mangle</b>	Press with a mangle. <i>The car was <b>mangled</b> almost beyond recognition.</i>
<b>protrusion</b>	Something that protrudes; a protuberance. <i>A <b>protrusion</b> of rock jutted from the mountainside.</i>
<b>protuberance</b>	The fact or state of protruding. <i>The large size and <b>protuberance</b> of the incisors.</i>
<b>relegate</b>	Assign to a lower position; reduce in rank. <i>United were <b>relegated</b> to division two.</i>
<b>rubbing</b>	The action of rubbing something. <i>Dab at the stain vigorous <b>rubbing</b> could damage the carpet.</i>
<b>ruin</b>	Destruction achieved by causing something to be wrecked or ruined. <i>Carriages go <b>ruining</b> over the brink from time to time.</i>
<b>shatter</b>	Damage or destroy (something abstract). <i>The wine glass <b>shattered</b>.</i>
<b>smash</b>	An act or sound of something smashing. <i>He <b>smashed</b> a 3 run homer.</i>
<b>vie</b>	Compete eagerly with someone in order to do or achieve something. <i>The athletes were vying for a place in the British team.</i>
