Collision as a Noun

Definitions of "Collision" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “collision” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A conflict between opposing ideas, interests, or factions.*
- *A conflict of opposed ideas or attitudes or goals.*
- *An instance of two or more records being assigned the same identifier or location in memory.*
- *A brief event in which two or more bodies come together.*
- *(physics) a brief event in which two or more bodies come together.*
- *An instance of one moving object or person striking violently against another.*
- *An accident resulting from violent impact of a moving object.*
- *An instance of simultaneous transmission by more than one node of a network.*



Synonyms of "Collision" as a noun (14 Words)

- accident** An unfortunate mishap; especially one causing damage or injury.
*Four people were killed in a road **accident**.*
- bump** A swelling on the skin, especially one caused by illness or injury.
*The children were given the **bumps**.*
- clash** An incompatibility leading to disagreement.
*A **clash** of cymbals.*
- conflict** An open clash between two opposing groups (or individuals)-Thomas Paine.
*He was immobilized by **conflict** and indecision.*
- contradiction** A situation in which inconsistent elements are present.
*The statement he is brave and he is not brave is a **contradiction**.*
- crash** A sudden failure which puts a computer system out of action.
*The **crash** of the company meant that 150 jobs would go.*

<u>disagreement</u>	A difference between conflicting facts or claims or opinions. <i>Disagreement between the results of the two assessments.</i>
hit	A conspicuous success. <i>Few structures can withstand a hit from a speeding car.</i>
impact	The violent interaction of individuals or groups entering into combat. <i>Our regional measures have had a significant impact on unemployment.</i>
incompatibility	(immunology) the degree to which the body's immune system will try to reject foreign material (as transfused blood or transplanted tissue). <i>The incompatibility between industry and nature.</i>
knock	The sound of knocking as on a door or in an engine or bearing. <i>The sudden knock floored him.</i>
<u>opposition</u>	The major political party opposed to the party in office and prepared to replace it if elected. <i>Despite opposition from the newspapers he went ahead.</i>
<u>strike</u>	A pitch that passes through the strike zone. <i>The threat of nuclear strikes.</i>
<u>variance</u>	A quantity equal to the square of the standard deviation. <i>A zoning variance.</i>



Usage Examples of "Collision" as a noun

- *The collision of the two ships resulted in a serious oil spill.*
- *Three passengers were killed in the collision.*
- *The collision of the particles resulted in an exchange of energy and a change of direction.*
- *A collision of interests.*
- *His car was in collision with a lorry.*

- *A mid-air collision between two aircraft.*

bump	In a race gain a bump against. <i>Her mosquito bites had come up in huge red bumps.</i>
clang	Make or cause to make a clang. <i>The steel door slammed shut with a clang.</i>
clash	Meet and come into violent conflict. <i>The Euro 2000 clash between England and Germany.</i>
collapse	Cause a lung or blood vessel to collapse. <i>Tabulation programs can be used to collapse this list in various ways.</i>
collide	Cause to collide. <i>The physicists collided the particles.</i>
conflict	Be in conflict. <i>Parents and children s interests sometimes conflict.</i>
confrontation	Discord resulting from a clash of ideas or opinions. <i>Four months of violent confrontation between government and opposition forces.</i>
crash	Cause to crash. <i>My computer crashed last night.</i>
damage	Inflict damage upon. <i>The snow damaged the roof.</i>
demolish	Eat up completely, as with great appetite. <i>I looked forward keenly to demolishing my opponent.</i>
deterrent	A thing that discourages or is intended to discourage someone from doing something. <i>Britain s nuclear deterrent.</i>
displace	Take the place of or have precedence over. <i>He seems to have displaced some vertebrae.</i>
encounter	A confrontation or unpleasant struggle. <i>She felt totally unnerved by the encounter.</i>
excrescence	A distinct outgrowth on a body or plant, resulting from disease or abnormality. <i>The bony excrescence between its horns.</i>

friction	The resistance that one surface or object encounters when moving over another. <i>The friction of braking.</i>
hit	Hit with a missile from a weapon. <i>It hit her that I wanted to settle down here.</i>
impact	Influencing strongly. <i>High interest rates have impacted on retail spending.</i>
jut	Extend out, over, or beyond the main body or line of something. <i>She put up her head and jutted out her chin with determination.</i>
mangle	Press with a mangle. <i>The car was mangled almost beyond recognition.</i>
protrusion	Something that protrudes; a protuberance. <i>A protrusion of rock jutted from the mountainside.</i>
protuberance	The fact or state of protruding. <i>The large size and protuberance of the incisors.</i>
relegate	Assign to a lower position; reduce in rank. <i>United were relegated to division two.</i>
rubbing	The action of rubbing something. <i>Dab at the stain vigorous rubbing could damage the carpet.</i>
ruin	Destruction achieved by causing something to be wrecked or ruined. <i>Carriages go ruining over the brink from time to time.</i>
shatter	Damage or destroy (something abstract). <i>The wine glass shattered.</i>
smash	An act or sound of something smashing. <i>He smashed a 3 run homer.</i>
vie	Compete eagerly with someone in order to do or achieve something. <i>The athletes were vying for a place in the British team.</i>
