Synonyms of "Colloquially" as an adverb (2 Words)

conversationally With the use of colloquial expressions.

informally In a casual style.
*He is dressed **informally** in jeans and a lumberjack shirt.*

- *The storms hit several states along a corridor colloquially referred to as ‘tornado alley.*
- *This building is colloquially referred to as The Barn.*

colloquialism	The use of colloquialisms. <i>The colloquialisms of the streets.</i>
colloquy	Formal conversation. <i>They broke off their colloquy at once.</i>
communication	The imparting or exchanging of information by speaking, writing, or using some other medium. <i>A communications network.</i>
<u>confer</u>	Have a conference in order to talk something over. <i>The officials were conferring with allies.</i>
conversational	Consisting of or relating to conversation. <i>She spoke fluent conversational English.</i>
delivery	The acknowledgement by the maker of a deed that they intend to be bound by it. <i>Allow up to 28 days for delivery.</i>
<u>dialect</u>	A particular version of a programming language. <i>The immigrants spoke an odd dialect of English.</i>
<u>discourse</u>	Written or spoken communication or debate. <i>She could discourse at great length on the history of Europe.</i>
eloquence	Fluent or persuasive speaking or writing. <i>A preacher of great power and eloquence.</i>
fluently	In a way that progresses smoothly. <i>She speaks fluently and convincingly on the need for more controls.</i>
idiom	An expression whose meanings cannot be inferred from the meanings of the words that make it up. <i>He had a feeling for phrase and idiom.</i>
<u>indicative</u>	A verb in the indicative mood. <i>Actions indicative of fear.</i>
informal	Having or fostering a warm or friendly and informal atmosphere. <i>Peru's huge and dense informal sector of street vendors and cottage industries.</i>
<u>interact</u>	Act together or towards others or with others. <i>People who interact daily.</i>
jargon	Special words or expressions used by a profession or group that are difficult for others to understand. <i>Legal jargon.</i>
<u>linguistic</u>	Relating to language or linguistics. <i>Linguistic behavior.</i>

locution	A word or phrase, especially with regard to style or idiom. <i>His impeccable locution.</i>
loquacious	Full of trivial conversation. <i>Never loquacious Sarah was now totally lost for words.</i>
message	Send as a message. <i>I was messaged by a Californian contact for some information.</i>
multilingual	In or using several languages. <i>A multilingual dictionary.</i>
orate	Make a speech, especially pompously or at length. <i>Lend me your ears Fred orated.</i>
parlance	A manner of speaking that is natural to native speakers of a language. <i>Dated terms that were once in common parlance.</i>
phrase	Divide combine or mark into phrases. <i>It s important to phrase the question correctly.</i>
saying	A word or phrase that particular people use in particular situations. <i>This is stated in the sayings of the Prophet.</i>
speech	The exchange of spoken words. <i>Her speech was barren of southernisms.</i>
spoken	Speaking in a specified way. <i>A blunt spoken man.</i>
talk	Deliver a lecture or talk. <i>They won t talk to the regime that killed their families.</i>
talking	The action of talking speech or discussion. <i>I ll do the talking you just back me up.</i>
tone	A steady sound without overtones. <i>A certain amount of daily exercise is essential to maintain proper body tone and function.</i>
vernacular	(of language) spoken as one's mother tongue; not learned or imposed as a second language. <i>Gardening vernacular.</i>
