collaboration	Something produced in collaboration with someone. <i>He faces charges of <b>collaboration</b></i> .
complicity	Guilt as an accomplice in a crime or offense. <i>They were accused of <b>complicity</b> in the attempt to overthrow the</i> <i>government</i> .
connivance	Tacit approval of someone's wrongdoing. This infringement of the law had taken place with the <b>connivance</b> of officials.
<u>conspiracy</u>	A secret agreement between two or more people to perform an unlawful act. They were cleared of <b>conspiracy</b> to pervert the course of justice.



intrigue	A mysterious or fascinating quality. <i>Within the region s borders is a wealth of interest and <b>intrigue</b>.</i>
plotting	A chart or map showing the movements or progress of an object.
scheming	A schematic or preliminary plan. His own colleagues accused him of <b>scheming</b> .
secret understanding	Something that should remain hidden from others (especially information that is not to be passed on.

# Associations of "Collusion" (30 Words)

<u>abet</u>	Encourage or assist someone to commit (a crime. <i>He was not guilty of murder but was guilty of aiding and abet</i> ting others.
accomplice	A person who joins with another in carrying out some plan (especially an unethical or illegal plan. An <b>accomplice</b> in the murder.
allegation	A claim or assertion that someone has done something illegal or wrong, typically one made without proof. An <b>allegation</b> of malpractice.
allied	Connected; related. <i>The allied fleet.</i>
<u>assassin</u>	A member of the Nizari branch of Ismaili Muslims at the time of the Crusades, when the newly established sect ruled part of northern Persia (1094–1256). They were renowned as militant fanatics, and were popularly reputed to use hashish before going on murder missions. <i>Assassin ators of kings and emperors.</i>
assassination	An attack intended to ruin someone's reputation. A failed <b>assassination</b> attempt.
attempted	Tried unsuccessfully. <i>Attempted murder</i> .
<u>commit</u>	Refer a parliamentary or legislative bill to a committee. They were reluctant to <b>commit</b> themselves to an opinion.



complicity	The fact or condition of being involved with others in an activity that is unlawful or morally wrong. They were accused of <b>complicity</b> in the attempt to overthrow the government.
<u>confederate</u>	Form a group or unite. Some local groups united to form <b>confederate</b> councils.
connivance	Tacit approval of someone's wrongdoing. This infringement of the law had taken place with the <b>connivance</b> of officials.
<u>conspiracy</u>	A plot to carry out some harmful or illegal act (especially a political plot. They were cleared of <b>conspiracy</b> to pervert the course of justice.
conspirator	A member of a conspiracy. <b>Conspirator</b> s had planned to seize the state.
<u>conspire</u>	Make secret plans jointly to commit an unlawful or harmful act. They <b>conspire</b> d against him.
<u>crime</u>	An action or activity considered to be evil, shameful, or wrong. They condemned apartheid as a <b>crime</b> against humanity.
<u>distrust</u>	Doubt about someone's honesty. The public s <b>distrust</b> of politicians.
fraud	A person who makes deceitful pretenses. Mediums exposed as tricksters and <b>fraud</b> s.
<u>hoax</u>	Subject to a playful hoax or joke. A <b>hoax</b> 999 call.
homicide	The unlawful killing of one person by another. Knives account for a third of all <b>homicide</b> s.
illegality	Unlawfulness by virtue of violating some legal statute. <i>Proceedings will be required to establish the <b>illegality</b> of the act.</i>
<u>implicate</u>	Show (someone) to be involved in a crime. Viruses are known to be <b>implicate</b> d in the development of certain cancers.
<u>liability</u>	A person or thing whose presence or behaviour is likely to put one at a disadvantage. Once you contact the card protection scheme your <b>liability</b> for any loss ends.
matricide	A person who kills their mother. A man suspected of <b>matricide</b> .
patricide	A person who kills their father.



<u>perpetrate</u>	Carry out or commit (a harmful, illegal, or immoral action. A crime has been <b>perpetrate</b> d against a sovereign state.
<u>suspicion</u>	A very slight trace. <i>He tried to shield me from <b>suspicion</b>.</i>
swindle	Obtain (money) fraudulently. <i>He was said to have</i> <b>swindle</b> <i>d 62 5 million from the state owned cement industry.</i>
<u>testimony</u>	A solemn protest or declaration. His effort was <b>testimony</b> to his devotion.
unlawful	Not conforming to legality, moral law, or social convention. <i>The use of <b>unlawful</b> violence.</i>
