- *A regular section of a newspaper or magazine devoted to a particular subject or written by a particular person.*
- *(architecture) a tall vertical cylindrical structure standing upright and used to support a structure.*
- *A tall vertical cylindrical structure standing upright and used to support a structure.*
- *Anything that approximates the shape of a column or tower.*
- *A vertical glass tube used in column chromatography; a mixture is poured in the top and washed through a stationary substance where components of the mixture are*

adsorbed selectively to form colored bands.

- *A page or text that is vertically divided.*
- *A line of units following one after another.*
- *A narrow-fronted deep formation of troops in successive lines.*
- *An article giving opinions or perspectives.*
- *Any tubular or pillar-like supporting structure in the body.*

baluster	Of a furniture leg or other decorative item having the form of a baluster. <i>Baluster legs in English oak.</i>
buttress	A structure of stone or brick built against a wall to strengthen or support it. <i>The cathedral s massive buttresses.</i>

carcade	A procession of motor vehicles, typically carrying and escorting a famous or important person. <i>Roads to be used by the PM s carcade were cordoned off and placed in the restricted area category.</i>
cavalcade	A procession of people traveling on horseback. <i>The royal cavalcade proceeded through the city.</i>
<u>chain</u>	A decorative chain worn round the neck as jewellery or as a badge of office. <i>A chain of daisies.</i>
chromatography column	An article giving opinions or perspectives.
commentary	An expression of opinions or offering of explanations about an event or situation. <i>An editorial commentary.</i>
<u>composition</u>	Art and technique of printing with movable type. <i>Royalists redeemed their sequestered estates by paying compositions.</i>
convoy	A group of ships or vehicles travelling together, typically one accompanied by armed troops, warships, or other vehicles for protection. <i>A convoy of lorries.</i>
cortège	The group following and attending to some important person.
criticism	The analysis and judgement of the merits and faults of a literary or artistic work. <i>He received a lot of criticism.</i>
critique	An essay or article that gives a critical evaluation (as of a book or play). <i>A critique of Marxist historicism.</i>
editorial	The parts of a newspaper or magazine which are not advertising. <i>We are giving readers more for their money quality editorial and more colour.</i>
essay	A trial design of a postage stamp yet to be accepted. <i>A misjudged essay in job preservation.</i>
feature	A prominent attribute or aspect of something. <i>An expression of pleasure crossed his features.</i>
<u>file</u>	A set of related records (either written or electronic) kept together. <i>What progress has the Prime Minister made on the unity file.</i>

item	A piece of news or information. <i>They reduced the price on many items.</i>
leader	The principal player in a music group. <i>A leader in the use of video conferencing.</i>
line	A line marking the starting or finishing point in a race. <i>The superintendent was thinking along the same lines.</i>
motorcade	A procession of people traveling in motor cars.
newspaper column	A business firm that publishes newspapers.
notice	Polite or favorable attention. <i>The jobs were advertised in a notice posted in the common room.</i>
parade	A parade ground. <i>A parade of witnesses.</i>
piece	An instance of some kind. <i>She bought a lovely piece of china.</i>
piece of writing	An artistic or literary composition.
pier	A support for two adjacent bridge spans.
pilaster	A rectangular column that usually projects about a third of its width from the wall to which it is attached.
pile	A nuclear reactor that uses controlled nuclear fission to generate energy. <i>He placed the books in a neat pile.</i>
piling	A large number or amount or extent. <i>Wooden piling supporting a complex of waterfront buildings.</i>
<u>pillar</u>	Something shaped like a pillar. <i>A thin pillar of smoke betrayed their campsite.</i>
pole	A long fiberglass sports implement used for pole vaulting. <i>They are at opposite poles.</i>
post	A goalpost. <i>In England they call mail the post.</i>
procession	A relentless succession of people or things. <i>Magistrates complain that they see a procession of recidivist minor offenders.</i>
<u>progression</u>	A passage or movement from one note or chord to another. <i>A blues progression.</i>
prop	A propeller that rotates to push against air. <i>Before every scene he ran down his checklist of props.</i>

rank	The people belonging to or constituting a group or class. <i>They were drawn up outside their barracks in long ranks.</i>
report	The act of informing by verbal report. <i>His father signed his report card.</i>
review	A new appraisal or evaluation. <i>All areas of the company will come under review.</i>
row	The act of rowing as a sport. <i>Her villa stood in a row of similar ones.</i>
stanchion	Any vertical post or rod used as a support.
standard	A board measure = 1980 board feet. <i>They live by the standards of their community.</i>
story	A plot or storyline. <i>The film is based on a true story.</i>
<u>string</u>	The stringed instruments in an orchestra. <i>Taylor lost to third string Baines.</i>
study	A room used for reading and writing and studying. <i>He is a quick study.</i>
succession	Acquisition of property by descent or by will. <i>The succession to the Crown was disputed.</i>
support	A musical part vocal or instrumental that supports or provides background for other musical parts. <i>She clutched the sideboard for support.</i>
<u>tower</u>	A fortress or stronghold in the form of or including a tower. <i>A tower of dust rose above the horizon.</i>
<u>trail</u>	A trailer for a film or broadcast. <i>We drove down in a trail of tourist cars.</i>
<u>train</u>	A procession (of wagons or mules or camels) traveling together in single file. <i>A minister and his train of attendants.</i>
upright	An upright piano. <i>A first class upright that would satisfy an amateur pianist.</i>
vertical	A vertical structural member as a post or stake. <i>The resort claims a vertical of 2 100 metres.</i>

<u>base</u>	Serving as or forming a base. <i>The town's economic base collapsed.</i>

basis	The justification for or reasoning behind something. <i>The whole argument rested on a basis of conjecture.</i>
behemoth	A huge or monstrous creature. <i>Shoppers are now more loyal to their local shops than to faceless behemoths.</i>
brick	Bricks collectively as a building material. <i>The doors have been bricked up.</i>
bridge	Make a bridge across. <i>Bridge a river.</i>
buttress	Provide a building or structure with buttresses. <i>We buttressed the wall as it was showing signs of cracking and collapse.</i>
carillon	A tune played on a carillon.
corinthian	Of or relating to or characteristic of Corinth or its inhabitants.
forwarding	The act of sending on to another destination. <i>The Royal Mail s forwarding service.</i>
keystone	The central building block at the top of an arch or vault. <i>Cooperation remains the keystone of the government s security policy.</i>
leviathan	Monstrous sea creature symbolizing evil in the Old Testament. <i>It was a leviathan among redwoods.</i>
lighthouse	A tower or other structure containing a beacon light to warn or guide ships at sea.
marble	Stain or streak something so that it looks like marble. <i>I thought she d lost her marbles asking a question like that.</i>
masonry	Freemasonry. <i>Masonry nails.</i>
mast	A tall upright post, spar, or other structure on a ship or boat, in sailing vessels generally carrying a sail or sails.
obelisk	A mountain tree or other natural object resembling an obelisk in shape.
pagoda	An ornamental imitation of a Hindu or Buddhist pagoda.
pillar	Something shaped like a pillar. <i>He is a pillar of the community.</i>
prop	A propeller that rotates to push against air. <i>Before every scene he ran down his checklist of props.</i>
pylon	A structure on the wing of an aircraft used for supporting an engine or carrying a weapon, fuel tank, or other load. <i>Power pylons are a favorite target for terrorists.</i>

<u>sculpture</u>	A work of art made by sculpture. <i>Ammonite shells with external sculpture near the aperture.</i>
<u>spire</u>	A tapering conical or pyramidal structure on the top of a building, typically a church tower. <i>Spires of delphiniums.</i>
<u>stone</u>	Remove the stone from a fruit. <i>You should remove the stones from prunes before cooking.</i>
structure	Give a structure to. <i>The structure consisted of a series of arches.</i>
support	The action of supporting something or someone or the state of being supported. <i>They called for artillery support.</i>
<u>tower</u>	Anything that approximates the shape of a column or tower. <i>The south west tower is a wonderful example of late Gothic.</i>
trestle	Each of a pair of horizontal pieces on a sailing ship's lower mast supporting the topmast.
