Definitions of "Coma" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “coma” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A prolonged state of deep unconsciousness, caused especially by severe injury or illness.*
- *A state of extreme lethargy or sleepiness.*
- *A usually terminal tuft of bracts (as in the pineapple) or tuft of hairs (especially on certain seeds).*
- *The luminous cloud of particles surrounding the frozen nucleus of a comet; forms as the comet approaches the sun and is warmed.*
- *A state of deep and often prolonged unconsciousness; usually the result of disease or injury.*
- *(botany) a usually terminal tuft of bracts (as in the pineapple) or tuft of hairs (especially on certain seeds).*
- *(astronomy) the luminous cloud of particles surrounding the frozen nucleus of a comet; forms as the comet approaches the sun and is warmed.*



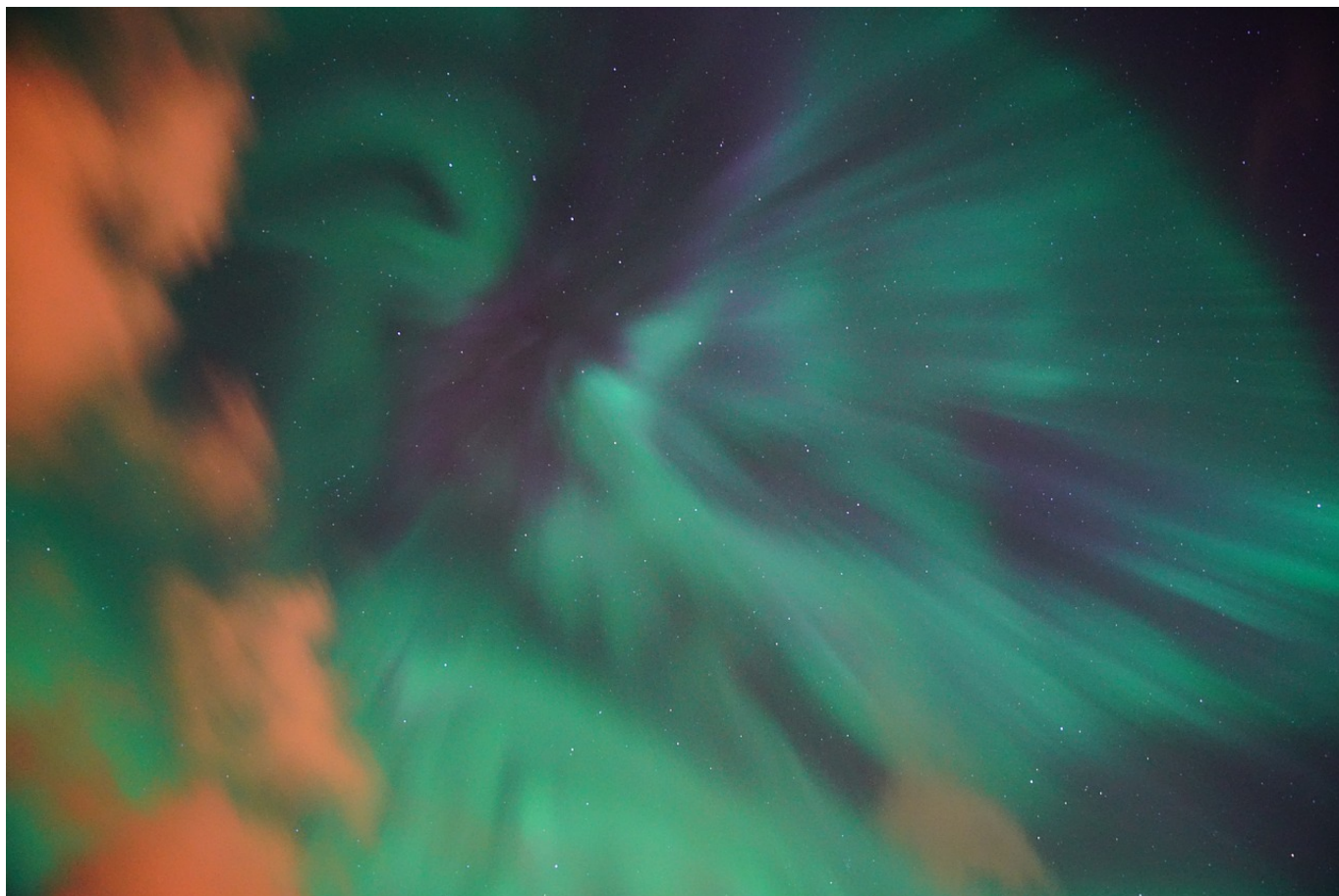
Synonyms of "Coma" as a noun (6 Words)

comatoseness	A state of deep and often prolonged unconsciousness; usually the result of disease or injury.
inertia	The tendency of a body to maintain its state of rest or uniform motion unless acted upon by an external force. <i>The power required to overcome friction and the inertia of the moving parts.</i>
insensibility	Unconsciousness. <i>Lady Grafton s insensibility bordered on cruelty.</i>
<u>oblivion</u>	Amnesty or pardon. <i>They drank themselves into oblivion.</i>
<u>stupor</u>	A state of near-unconsciousness or insensibility. <i>Someone stole his wallet while he was in a drunken stupor.</i>
<u>unconsciousness</u>	The state of being uninformed or unaware. <i>Someone gave me a crack across the head and I slipped into unconsciousness.</i>

- *She went into a coma.*
- *After the film I settled into a coma.*



Associations of "Coma" (30 Words)

amaze

Surprise (someone) greatly; fill with astonishment.

*Your ability to speak six languages **amazes** me.*

amnesia

A partial or total loss of memory.

*They were suffering from **amnesia**.*

analgesia

Absence of the sense of pain without loss of consciousness.

*She was able to take **analgesia** orally.*

astonish

Surprise or impress (someone) greatly.

*You never fail to **astonish** me.*

awake

Regain consciousness.

*The noise might keep you **awake** at night.*

comatose

Extremely lethargic or sleepy.

*She had been **comatose** for seven months.*

daze	To cause someone to lose clear vision, especially from intense light. <i>His mother's death left him in a daze.</i>
dementia	Mental deterioration of organic or functional origin.
diabetic	Someone who has diabetes. <i>A diabetic clinic.</i>
distract	Having the attention diverted especially because of anxiety. <i>He seemed oddly distract.</i>
faint	Lose consciousness for a short time because of a temporarily insufficient supply of oxygen to the brain. <i>There is a faint chance that the enemy may flee.</i>
faze	Disturb the composure of. <i>She was not fazed by his show of anger.</i>
forgetful	Not mindful or attentive- G.B.Shaw. <i>I m a bit forgetful these days.</i>
forgetfulness	Unawareness caused by neglectful or heedless failure to remember. <i>His forgetfulness increased as he grew older.</i>
ill	Ill is often used as a combining form in a poor or improper or unsatisfactory manner not well. <i>Ill effects.</i>
induce	Succeed in persuading or leading (someone) to do something. <i>None of these measures induced a change of policy.</i>
limbo	(theology) in Roman Catholicism, the place of unbaptized but innocent or righteous souls (such as infants and virtuous individuals). <i>These prisoners are in limbo no one is responsible for their welfare.</i>
medically	Involving medical practice. <i>Patients may be treated medically or surgically.</i>
oblivion	The state of being forgotten, especially by the public. <i>He sought the great oblivion of sleep.</i>
oblivious	Failing to keep in mind. <i>Oblivious old age.</i>
paralyze	Cause to be paralyzed and immobile. <i>Fear paralyzed her.</i>
smitten	Marked by foolish or unreasoning fondness. <i>Conscience smitten.</i>
stun	Overcome as with astonishment or disbelief. <i>The news stunned her.</i>

stupefy	Astonish and shock. <i>The amount they spend on clothes would appal their parents and stupefy their grandparents.</i>
<u>stupor</u>	Marginal consciousness. <i>A drunken stupor.</i>
<u>unaware</u>	Having no knowledge of a situation or fact. <i>Seemed unaware of the scrutiny.</i>
<u>unconscious</u>	(followed by `of') not knowing or perceiving. <i>The boy was beaten unconscious.</i>
<u>unconsciousness</u>	A state lacking normal awareness of the self or environment. <i>Someone gave me a crack across the head and I slipped into unconsciousness.</i>
unmindful	Lacking conscious awareness of. <i>Not unmindful of the heavy responsibility.</i>
<u>vertigo</u>	A sensation of whirling and loss of balance, associated particularly with looking down from a great height, or caused by disease affecting the inner ear or the vestibular nerve; giddiness.
