## Coma as a Noun

### Definitions of "Coma" as a noun

- *A state of extreme lethargy or sleepiness.*
- *A usually terminal tuft of bracts (as in the pineapple) or tuft of hairs (especially on certain seeds).*
- *The luminous cloud of particles surrounding the frozen nucleus of a comet; forms as the comet approaches the sun and is warmed.*
- *A state of deep and often prolonged unconsciousness; usually the result of disease or injury.*
- *(botany) a usually terminal tuft of bracts (as in the pineapple) or tuft of hairs (especially on certain seeds).*
- *(astronomy) the luminous cloud of particles surrounding the frozen nucleus of a comet; forms as the comet approaches the sun and is warmed.*



## Synonyms of "Coma" as a noun (6 Words)

<b>comatoseness</b>	A state of deep and often prolonged unconsciousness; usually the result of disease or injury.
<b>inertia</b>	The tendency of a body to maintain its state of rest or uniform motion unless acted upon by an external force. <i>The power required to overcome friction and the <b>inertia</b> of the moving parts.</i>
<b>insensibility</b>	Unconsciousness. <i>Lady Grafton s <b>insensibility</b> bordered on cruelty.</i>
<b><u>oblivion</u></b>	Amnesty or pardon. <i>They drank themselves into <b>oblivion</b>.</i>
<b><u>stupor</u></b>	A state of near-unconsciousness or insensibility. <i>Someone stole his wallet while he was in a drunken <b>stupor</b>.</i>
<b><u>unconsciousness</u></b>	The state of being uninformed or unaware. <i>Someone gave me a crack across the head and I slipped into <b>unconsciousness</b>.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Coma" as a noun

- *After the film I settled into a coma.*



## Associations of "Coma" (30 Words)

<b>amaze</b>	Surprise (someone) greatly; fill with astonishment. <i>Your ability to speak six languages <b>amazes</b> me.</i>
<b>amnesia</b>	A partial or total loss of memory. <i>They were suffering from <b>amnesia</b>.</i>
<b>analgesia</b>	Absence of the sense of pain without loss of consciousness. <i>She was able to take <b>analgesia</b> orally.</i>
<b>astonish</b>	Surprise or impress (someone) greatly. <i>You never fail to <b>astonish</b> me.</i>
<b>awake</b>	Regain consciousness. <i>The noise might keep you <b>awake</b> at night.</i>
<b>comatose</b>	Extremely lethargic or sleepy. <i>She had been <b>comatose</b> for seven months.</i>

<b>daze</b>	To cause someone to lose clear vision, especially from intense light. <i>His mother's death left him in a <b>daze</b>.</i>
<b>dementia</b>	Mental deterioration of organic or functional origin.
<b>diabetic</b>	Someone who has diabetes. <i>A <b>diabetic</b> clinic.</i>
<b>distract</b>	Having the attention diverted especially because of anxiety. <i>He seemed oddly <b>distract</b>.</i>
<b>faint</b>	Lose consciousness for a short time because of a temporarily insufficient supply of oxygen to the brain. <i>There is a <b>faint</b> chance that the enemy may flee.</i>
<b>faze</b>	Disturb the composure of. <i>She was not <b>fazed</b> by his show of anger.</i>
<b>forgetful</b>	Not mindful or attentive- G.B.Shaw. <i>I m a bit <b>forgetful</b> these days.</i>
<b>forgetfulness</b>	Unawareness caused by neglectful or heedless failure to remember. <i>His <b>forgetfulness</b> increased as he grew older.</i>
<b>ill</b>	Ill is often used as a combining form in a poor or improper or unsatisfactory manner not well. <i><b>Ill</b> effects.</i>
<b>induce</b>	Succeed in persuading or leading (someone) to do something. <i>None of these measures <b>induced</b> a change of policy.</i>
<b>limbo</b>	(theology) in Roman Catholicism, the place of unbaptized but innocent or righteous souls (such as infants and virtuous individuals). <i>These prisoners are in <b>limbo</b> no one is responsible for their welfare.</i>
<b>medically</b>	Involving medical practice. <i>Patients may be treated <b>medically</b> or surgically.</i>
<b>oblivion</b>	The state of being forgotten, especially by the public. <i>He sought the great <b>oblivion</b> of sleep.</i>
<b>oblivious</b>	Failing to keep in mind. <i><b>Oblivious</b> old age.</i>
<b>paralyze</b>	Cause to be paralyzed and immobile. <i>Fear <b>paralyzed</b> her.</i>
<b>smitten</b>	Marked by foolish or unreasoning fondness. <i>Conscience <b>smitten</b>.</i>
<b>stun</b>	Overcome as with astonishment or disbelief. <i>The news <b>stunned</b> her.</i>

- stupefy** Astonish and shock.  
*The amount they spend on clothes would appal their parents and **stupefy** their grandparents.*
- stupor** Marginal consciousness.  
*A drunken **stupor**.*
- unaware** Having no knowledge of a situation or fact.  
*Seemed **unaware** of the scrutiny.*
- unconscious** (followed by `of') not knowing or perceiving.  
*The boy was beaten **unconscious**.*
- unconsciousness** A state lacking normal awareness of the self or environment.  
*Someone gave me a crack across the head and I slipped into **unconsciousness**.*
- unmindful** Lacking conscious awareness of.  
*Not **unmindful** of the heavy responsibility.*
- vertigo** A sensation of whirling and loss of balance, associated particularly with looking down from a great height, or caused by disease affecting the inner ear or the vestibular nerve; giddiness.
