According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "combines" as a verb can have the following definitions:

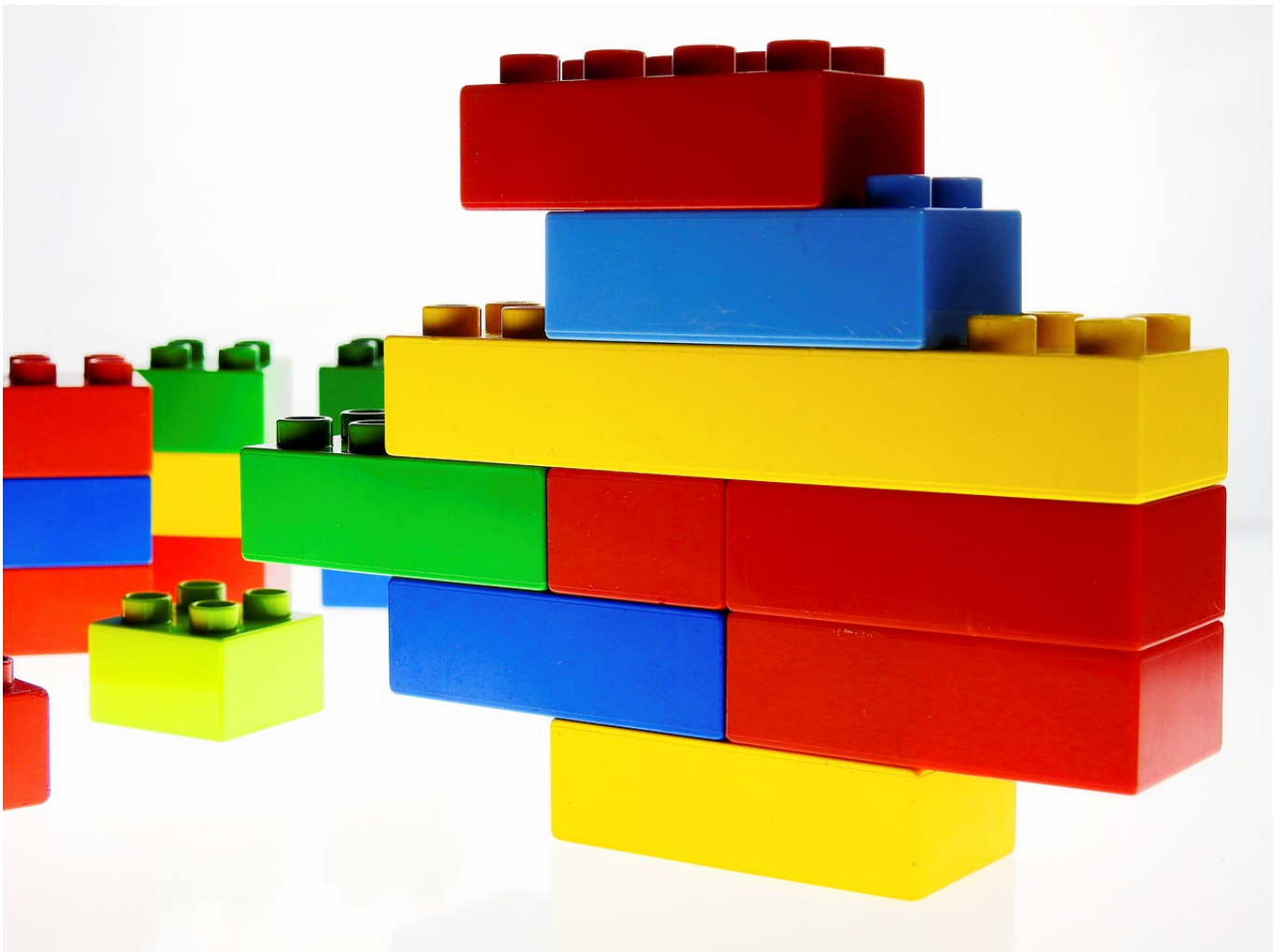
- *Gather in a mass, sum, or whole.*
- *Join for a common purpose or in a common action.*
- *Add together from different sources.*
- *Combine so as to form a whole; mix.*
- *Put or add together.*
- *Mix together different elements.*
- *Have or possess in combination.*



Synonyms of "Combines" as a verb (13 Words)

- aggregate** Amount in the aggregate to.
*Socio occupational groups **aggregate** men sharing similar kinds of occupation.*
- blend** Blend or harmonize.
***Blend** the nuts and raisins together.*
- coalesce** Combine (elements) in a mass or whole.
*The puddles had **coalesced** into shallow streams.*
- commingle** Mix together different elements.
*The part of the brain where the senses **commingle**.*
- compound** Make (something bad) worse; intensify the negative aspects of.
*A dialect **compounded** of Spanish and Dutch.*
- conflate** Mix together different elements.
*The urban crisis **conflates** a number of different economic political and social issues.*

- flux** Treat a metal object with a flux to promote melting.
- fuse** Equip with a fuse provide with a fuse.
*The two nuclei move together and **fuse** into one nucleus.*
- immix** Mix together different elements.
- meld** Lose its distinct outline or shape; blend gradually.
*Australia s winemakers have **melded** modern science with traditional art.*
- merge** Absorb (a title or estate) in another.
*The cells **merge**.*
- mix** Mix together different elements.
*Peppercorns are sometimes **mixed** with other spices.*
- unite** Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief.
*The two Germanys officially **united**.*

- *These forces combined with others.*
- *Combine resources.*



Associations of "Combines" (30 Words)

alliance	A formal agreement establishing an association or alliance between nations or other groups to achieve a particular aim. <i>A defensive alliance between Australia and New Zealand.</i>
ally	Become an ally or associate as by a treaty or marriage. <i>He was forced to dismiss his closest political ally.</i>
amalgamate	To bring or combine together or with something else. <i>Numerous small British railway companies amalgamated.</i>
annex	Add or attach as a condition or consequence. <i>Extreme anointing hath neither ordinance of God to be grounded on nor promise of grace annexed.</i>

associate	Having partial rights and privileges or subordinate status. <i>First was the lightning and then its thunderous associate.</i>
coalesce	Combine (elements) in a mass or whole. <i>The puddles had coalesced into shallow streams.</i>
coalesced	Joined together into a whole.
coalescing	Growing together, fusing.
combination	A sequence of numbers or letters that opens a combination lock. <i>The combination of recession and falling property values proved fatal to the business community.</i>
combined	Made or joined or united into one.
commingle	Mix; blend. <i>His book commingles sarcasm and sadness.</i>
concerted	Involving the joint activity of two or more. <i>Concerted action.</i>
confederacy	A secret agreement between two or more people to perform an unlawful act. <i>The Italian confederacy known as the Lombard League.</i>
conjoin	Take in marriage. <i>An approach which conjoins theory and method.</i>
consolidate	Combine (a number of things) into a single more effective or coherent whole. <i>Consolidate one's hold on first place.</i>
federate	Relating to a federated state or organization. <i>The country was federated after the civil war.</i>
fusion	Correction of an unstable part of the spine by joining two or more vertebrae; usually done surgically but sometimes done by traction or immobilization. <i>Fusion cuisine.</i>
incorporate	Make into a whole or make part of a whole. <i>Incorporate this document with those pertaining to the same case.</i>
incorporation	Including by incorporating. <i>A law allowing incorporation as a company.</i>
integrate	Become one become integrated. <i>She was anxious to integrate well into her husband's family.</i>
integration	The action of incorporating a racial or religious group into a community. <i>Visuomotor integration.</i>

join	Cause to become joined or linked. <i>The two roads join here.</i>
<u>meld</u>	A thing formed by melding a combination. <i>Australia's winemakers have melded modern science with traditional art.</i>
<u>merge</u>	Combine or cause to combine to form a single entity. <i>We merged our resources.</i>
reunify	Unify again, as of a country. <i>Will Korea reunify.</i>
synthesis	Reasoning from the general to the particular (or from cause to effect). <i>The synthesis of methanol from carbon monoxide and hydrogen.</i>
<u>unify</u>	Become one. <i>Opposition groups struggling to unify around the goal of replacing the regime.</i>
<u>union</u>	A part of a flag with an emblem symbolizing national union typically occupying the upper corner next to the staff. <i>A currency union between the two countries.</i>
unite	Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief. <i>They are united by their love of cars.</i>
<u>united</u>	Joined together politically, for a common purpose, or by common feelings. <i>Women acting together in a united way.</i>
