combining	The act of combining things to form a new whole.
trust	Something as property held by one party the trustee for the benefit of another the beneficiary. <i>I used only primary sources taking nothing on trust.</i>





Combines as a Verb

Definitions of "Combines" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "combines" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Gather in a mass, sum, or whole.
- Join for a common purpose or in a common action.
- Add together from different sources.
- Combine so as to form a whole; mix.
- Put or add together.
- Mix together different elements.
- Have or possess in combination.





Synonyms of "Combines" as a verb (13 Words)

<u>aggregate</u>	Amount in the aggregate to. Socio occupational groups aggregate men sharing similar kinds of occupation.
blend	Blend or harmonize. Blend the nuts and raisins together.
<u>coalesce</u>	Combine (elements) in a mass or whole. The puddles had coalesce d into shallow streams.
commingle	Mix together different elements. The part of the brain where the senses commingle .
<u>compound</u>	Make (something bad) worse; intensify the negative aspects of. A dialect compound ed of Spanish and Dutch.
<u>conflate</u>	Mix together different elements. <i>The urban crisis</i> conflates <i>a number of different economic political and social issues.</i>



<u>flux</u>	Treat a metal object with a flux to promote melting.
<u>fuse</u>	Equip with a fuse provide with a fuse. The two nuclei move together and fuse into one nucleus.
immix	Mix together different elements.
<u>meld</u>	Lose its distinct outline or shape; blend gradually. <i>Australia s winemakers have melded modern science with traditional art.</i>
<u>merge</u>	Absorb (a title or estate) in another. <i>The cells merge.</i>
mix	Mix together different elements. Peppercorns are sometimes mix ed with other spices.
unite	Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief.





Usage Examples of "Combines" as a verb

- These forces combined with others.
- Combine resources.



Associations of "Combines" (30 Words)

alliance	A formal agreement establishing an association or alliance between nations or other groups to achieve a particular aim. A defensive alliance between Australia and New Zealand.
<u>ally</u>	Become an ally or associate as by a treaty or marriage. <i>He was forced to dismiss his closest political ally.</i>
amalgamate	To bring or combine together or with something else. Numerous small British railway companies amalgamate d.
<u>annex</u>	Add or attach as a condition or consequence. Extreme anointing hath neither ordinance of God to be grounded on nor promise of grace annex ed.



associate	Having partial rights and privileges or subordinate status. <i>First was the lightning and then its thunderous</i> associate .
<u>coalesce</u>	Combine (elements) in a mass or whole. The puddles had coalesce d into shallow streams.
coalesced	Joined together into a whole.
coalescing	Growing together, fusing.
combination	A sequence of numbers or letters that opens a combination lock. The combination of recession and falling property values proved fatal to the business community.
combined	Made or joined or united into one.
commingle	Mix; blend. His book commingle s sarcasm and sadness.
concerted	Involving the joint activity of two or more. Concerted action.
confederacy	A secret agreement between two or more people to perform an unlawful act. The Italian confederacy known as the Lombard League.
conjoin	Take in marriage. An approach which conjoin s theory and method.
<u>consolidate</u>	Combine (a number of things) into a single more effective or coherent whole. Consolidate one s hold on first place.
federate	Relating to a federated state or organization. The country was federate d after the civil war.
<u>fusion</u>	Correction of an unstable part of the spine by joining two or more vertebrae; usually done surgically but sometimes done by traction or immobilization. <i>Fusion</i> cuisine.
incorporate	Make into a whole or make part of a whole. <i>Incorporate</i> this document with those pertaining to the same case.
incorporation	Including by incorporating. A law allowing incorporation as a company.
integrate	Become one become integrated. She was anxious to integrate well into her husband s family.
integration	The action of incorporating a racial or religious group into a community. <i>Visuomotor integration</i> .



join	Cause to become joined or linked. <i>The two roads join here.</i>
<u>meld</u>	A thing formed by melding a combination. Australia s winemakers have meld ed modern science with traditional art.
<u>merge</u>	Combine or cause to combine to form a single entity. <i>We merged our resources.</i>
reunify	Unify again, as of a country. Will Korea reunify .
synthesis	Reasoning from the general to the particular (or from cause to effect. The synthesis of methanol from carbon monoxide and hydrogen.
<u>unify</u>	Become one. Opposition groups struggling to unify around the goal of replacing the regime.
<u>union</u>	A part of a flag with an emblem symbolizing national union typically occupying the upper corner next to the staff. <i>A currency union between the two countries.</i>
unite	Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief. <i>They are united by their love of cars.</i>
<u>united</u>	Joined together politically, for a common purpose, or by common feelings. <i>Women acting together in a united way.</i>
