Associations of "Come across" (30 Words)

along	Used to refer to the passage of time or the making of progress. <i>Move along.</i>
antipodal	Relating to or denoting cells formed at the chalazal end of the embryo sac. <i>Antipodal regions of the earth.</i>
arrive	Reach a destination arrive by movement or progress. <i>We will be in touch with them when the time arrives.</i>
ashore	To or on the shore or land from the direction of the sea. <i>We spent the day ashore.</i>
bridge	The central part of a pair of glasses fitting over the bridge of the nose. <i>His letters provided a bridge across the centuries.</i>
circumambulate	Walk around something. <i>They used to circumambulate the perimeter wall.</i>
cross	Pass the ball across the field towards the centre when attacking. <i>She has crossed the Atlantic twice.</i>
drawbridge	A bridge that can be raised to block passage or to allow boats or ships to pass beneath it. <i>There was a rattle of chains as the drawbridge was lowered.</i>
escalator	A moving staircase consisting of an endlessly circulating belt of steps driven by a motor, which conveys people between the floors of a public building.
go	Go through in search of something search through someone s belongings in an unauthorized way. <i>Come on Tony it s your go.</i>
here	In or at this place where the speaker or writer is. <i>What are we all doing here.</i>

horizon	The great circle on the celestial sphere whose plane passes through the sensible horizon and the center of the Earth. <i>The upper horizon of the site showed an arrangement of two rows of features.</i>
immigrate	Come to live permanently in a foreign country. <i>An Australian who immigrated to Britain in 1982.</i>
landing	The act of coming down to the earth (or other surface). <i>The D Day landings.</i>
other	Denoting a person or thing that is different or distinct from one already mentioned or known about. <i>This is our last resort there s no other way of reaching an agreement.</i>
overpass	A bridge by which a road or railway line passes over another. <i>Did not its sublimity overpass a little the bounds of the ridiculous.</i>
pass	Pass by. <i>Things came to such a pass that these gentlemen sat coldly at the meetings not daring to speak out freely and honestly.</i>
path	A line or route along which something travels or moves. <i>Genius usually follows a revolutionary path.</i>
pedestrian	A person walking rather than travelling in a vehicle. <i>The road is so dangerous pedestrians avoid it.</i>
racetrack	A racecourse.
railway	A set of tracks for other vehicles. <i>A railway line.</i>
retrace	Go back over (the same route that one has just taken). <i>We retraced the route we took last summer.</i>
road	A railroad. <i>Clara had to walk in the road to avoid black plastic rubbish sacks.</i>
route	Send via a specific route. <i>The many routes to a healthier diet will be described.</i>
staircase	A set of stairs and the rooms leading off it in a large building, especially a school or college. <i>A mirrored staircase.</i>
station	A bus or coach station. <i>Married above her station.</i>
track	The act of participating in an athletic competition involving running on a track. <i>The undercarriage was fully retractable inwards into the wing with a 90 inch track.</i>

transverse Extending or lying across; in a crosswise direction; at right angles to the long axis.

***Transverse** colon.*

traverse An area of land surveyed with a traverse.

*There were three jewels in the **traverse** of the cross and four in the body.*

walkway A passage or path for walking along, especially a raised passageway connecting different sections of a building or a wide path in a park or garden.
