absentee	One that is absent or not in residence. <i>Absentee pupils.</i>
accordingly	Because of the reason given. <i>We have to discover what his plans are and act accordingly.</i>
arrive	Reach a destination arrive by movement or progress. <i>We arrived at his house and knocked at the door.</i>
<u>away</u>	An away match or win. <i>She landed badly and crawled away.</i>
<u>back</u>	Of or at the back of something. <i>The team was five points back.</i>
by	So as to go past. <i>He let only a moment go by.</i>
comer	Someone who arrives (or has arrived). <i>Many in the party see tax relief as a comer.</i>
<u>exhale</u>	Give out (breath or an odor). <i>She sat back and exhaled deeply.</i>
<u>facade</u>	The face or front of a building. <i>The house has a half timbered facade.</i>
<u>facing</u>	A protective covering that protects the outside of a building. <i>The bricks were used as a facing on a concrete core.</i>
follow	Follow with the eyes or the mind. <i>He followed his lecture with a question and answer period.</i>
get	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>His lying really gets me.</i>
<u>here</u>	In or at this place where the speaker or writer is. <i>Is everyone here.</i>

home	Return home accurately from a long distance. <i>Pigeons who do not home will win no prizes.</i>
landing	An instance of coming or bringing something to land, either from the air or from water. <i>The D Day landings.</i>
location	The act of putting something in a certain place. <i>The movie was filmed entirely on location.</i>
look	Of a building or room have an outlook in a specified direction. <i>The room looks out over Mylor Harbour.</i>
<u>omit</u>	Prevent from being included or considered or accepted. <i>He modestly omits to mention that he was a pole vault champion.</i>
outward	Outwards. <i>An outward display of friendliness.</i>
reach	Reach a goal e.g. <i>Government reaches out to the people.</i>
recover	Get or find back recover the use of. <i>Many companies recovered their costs within six months.</i>
<u>restitution</u>	A sum of money paid in compensation for loss or injury. <i>Upon the restitution of the book to its rightful owner the child was given a tongue lashing.</i>
restoration	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The altar paintings seem in need of restoration.</i>
retrace	To go back over again. <i>I've tried to retrace some of her movements.</i>
retrieval	The cognitive operation of accessing information in memory. <i>The investigation was completed after the retrieval of plane wreckage.</i>
return	The key on electric typewriters or computer keyboards that causes a carriage return and a line feed. <i>They set out on their return to the base camp.</i>
<u>trace</u>	Discover traces of. <i>Through the binoculars I traced the path I had taken the night before.</i>
track	Of wheels run so that the back ones are exactly in the track of the front ones. <i>The pickup's stylus must faithfully track undulations.</i>
unprepossessing	Not attractive or appealing to the eye. <i>Despite his unprepossessing appearance he had an animal magnetism.</i>
